THE PURSUIT OF PEACE

In the world of unrest and confusion, with war clouds and sin on every side, the Human heart is crying for "peace and rest".

There comes the blessed words of our Lord Jesus in St. John 14:27 "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: Not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let Not your heart be troubled, Neither let it be afraid." Also again we here him speak concerning the conditions of life in St. John 16:33. "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world."
