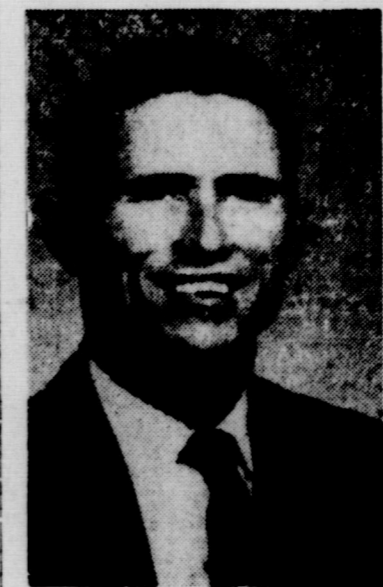
Holt pointed out that parents of boys owning b-b guns should caution them and explain the vital part the storm cellar plays in protecting Wheeler residents.

Edward, Mayor Pro-Tem

Following the regular business, such as paying bills and etc., Wayne Edwards, senior member of the council, was selected by the other council members to serve as mayor pro-tem. He will act as mayor in the event Mayor Thomas Daughtry is not present.

Payment To Risner

Payment to Jim Risner, water superintendent, for the use of his pickup during the past month was discussed; no decision was reached as to the amount of the payment.

Water Well Motor

Mayor Daughtry advised the group that the water well motor, which was recently struck by lightning, was insured and had been replaced.

New Tar Heater

At Dorcie Hutchison's suggestion the group voted to purchase a tar heater to be used in the repair of city streets.

Will Build Pool

Following a report made by Daughtry on the cost and building details of the White Deer swimming pool the council members voted to definitely build a swimming pool if the financing could be successfully arranged.

They voted to check on the possibilities of issuing deficiency warrants against the gross receipt tax and investigate the possibilities of voting revenue bonds to build the pool.

Future Projects

Suggested projects for the future was the laying out of alleys throughout the city.

Officials of Texas A. & M. College this week notified State Representative Grainger McIlhany that they will set up on-the-farm crop demonstrations in Wheeler County this year.

This program is designed to test the yield and growth characteristics of new varieties of crops within particular areas and also to demonstrate improved farming methods.

These demonstration are authorized by legislation that was sponsored by Rep. McIlhany. This program is currently being carried on in Collingsworth and rural counties and has been highly successful.

The tests in Wheeler County will be under the supervision of County Agent Bryan Swam. Key personnel from the A. & M. extension and research service will hold a meeting within the county soon to work out details of the local program.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL NEWS CONSERVATION

It is about time to move cattle off pastures that are to be deferred this summer. Heavy grazing of winter grasses and early weeds helps reduce the amount of weedy plants next year. Native grasses of the better kinds are getting up enough for grazing. They should have some time to make a good spring growth so that the seed crop will mature when it is time for them to seed.

R. O. Lister has rested some sand lovegrass on his place west of Kelton and allowed it to make seed. The grass is thickening up and has made a beautiful pasture. T. G. Puryear has a good example of the benefits of summer resting. His bottomland pasture east of Wheeler has been rested two summers out of the last five years. HOME DEMONSTRATION WEEK

The first week in May is designated as Home Demonstration Week.

In writing or speaking of home demonstration work we are inclined to tell of its beginning and past history. Let us consider some of the present work and advantages of extension work.

Extension service, through the county home demonstration agent is available to all people, not just members of home demonstration clubs.

In the office of the home demonstration agent will be found the latest bulletins from the extension service and other sources. These are bulletins on all phases of food raising, preservation and preparation. Bulletins on making clothes and accessories, on landscaping and on many other interests and problems of homemaking. Call at your home demonstration agent's office and tell her your needs, the bulletins and other information are there for you.

Through the home demonstration club work women are acquiring a continuing education in home management, sewing, food preservation and preparation. Many changes have been made in all these phases of homemaking in the past few years. One time most foods were preserved by canning or drying. Now much of it is frozen. Through extension work the women learn the latest methods of food preservation, as well as many other home needs and interests.

Many changes have been made in demonstration club work since its beginning in 1918. We are told that there will be more changes in the future. Now the women give good demonstrations to other people after learning the demonstration from the home agent, or some other person. This is helping women to keep up with, and use, the latest methods.

More young married women should avail themselves of the home demonstration service. The lessons learned in home economics classes can be kept up to date and more useful through home demonstration work. Let us use the service for our own advancement. At present Wheeler county does not have a home demonstration agent. We hope one is hired soon as the 4-H girls cannot enter some district and state contests if the county does not have a home demonstration agent. Let us give our girls the best advantages as we give the boys. Join or organize a home demonstration club.

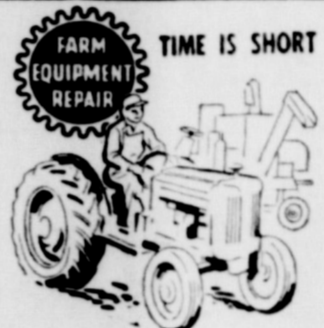

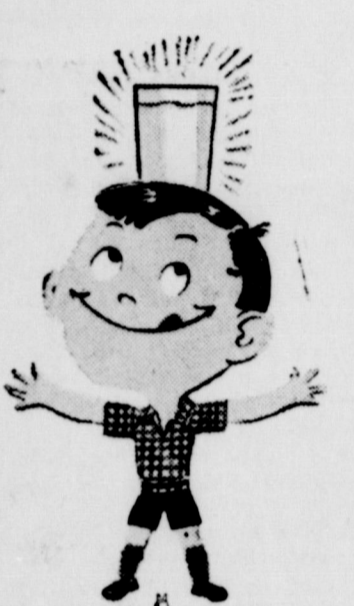

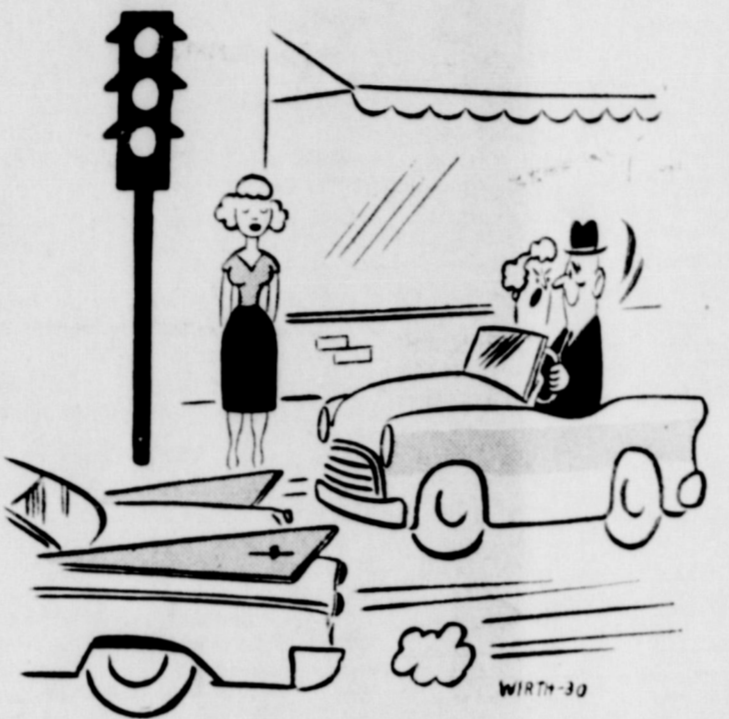

fundamental principles. These are:

1. Government should be of laws, rules or principles and not people. Men should be instruments of government guided by principles.
2. Texas should take the lead in restoring state rights through exercising strong and able state government. The best government is that nearest to the scene of the governed.
3. Freedoms (Economic, Political, Academic, Religions) are in one bundle. One cannot be surrendered without jeopardizing the others.
4. Moral restraint is still a more powerful control than legal restraint. Passing more laws (legal restraint) is not always the right answer to solving our problems.
5. Economic justice can best be won by free men through a free enterprise system.
6. There are many necessary government expenditures but not all are sacred. Relating spending to equitable and reasonable taxation is necessary to prevent ultimate confiscation of property and incomes.
