Highway 152 To Be Completed Sept. 1

By Mrs. Osie Wilson Wheeler County's bridge over Sweetwater Creek on Federal Highway 83, the road from Wheeler to Canadian, was completed on May 30th at a cost of \$115,606.61, according to Assistant District Engineer R. L. Nabers with the Texas Highway Department at Childress. This new bridge is a replacement for one that washed out more than two years ago. The new bridge is 352 feet long. Into it went: 454 yards of concrete, 75,082 pounds of steel, 192,738 Ibeams, 2,344.4 feet of concrete piling, and 115 gallons of paint. It has 700 feet of railing, and is a more substantial bridge than the

one that washed away. From Wellington were Clyde Drake, engineer, and Grant Woolridge, inspector; from Wheeler was Curtis Kidwell, construction foreman; and from Amarillo were the contractors, Gilvin, Terrill Inc. It took about six months to complete the bridge.

Highway 152 Federal Highway 152, an alter-

nate route to Oklahoma City is also under construction to the Oklahoma line. This will be a twolane highway, 151/2 miles long. The contract price on it is \$40,897.45. A. L. Sheppard of Vernon is the contractor and Clyde Drake is the engineer. This two-lane highway will have a road bed of 13 feet, each with 8 feet of asphalt surfaced shoulders. The cost of 152 is paid 50/50 from state and Federal funds. The road is about 50% complete. It is expected to be open by September 1. At the present busses are routed around this construction job.

Farm to Market Road 2167, The bridge over the North Fork of Red River that carried traffic from Farm to Ma Texas was the announcer. Charlie washed out several years ago. It was the old road to Magic City and Kellerville, the direct route. And the distance from Wheeler to this bridge was about 12 miles. Now the people who live across the river in this vicinity have to drive 45 miles around by Shamrock in order to get to Wheeler to pay their taxes.

According to Palmer Sivage at the Court House the old bridge was dangerous before it washed (Continued On Page 8 No. 3)





tions are many. One is longevity. Outfielders last longer. They do not have to take the body-contact beating of an infielder and their chances of injury, limited mostly to collision with a fence or another outfielder, are less than any position on a club.

To be an outfielder you must be a player who delivers at the plate. You must be a good hitter, consistently in the 300 class; but you should not try to enter the door of modern, streamlined baseball through offense alone. You should be capable of doing something besides hit and catch a fly ball.

The term "flychaser," often applied to outfielders, is one of baseball's most glaring misnomers. Outfielding should be as much a specialty as playing shortstop or second

misnomers. Outfielding should be as much a specialty as playing shortstop or second base. An outfielder is called upon to field as many ground balls as he is flies, and the improper fielding of them causes more errors and allows more runs than missed fly balls.

You must be gifted with a good arm because you are called upon to make long throws. Also, speed of foot is essential, particularly if you are going to be a center fielder. If you have speed you can learn to run.

The fellow with a nervous disposition should be an infielder or catcher. A player who has to be "doing something enterwind the ground once. This has been argued pro and con. Most catchers think it does and prefer a ball that skips in.

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



IMPROVING THE PERSONALITY

The individual who becomes a child of God and lives the Christian life will certainly improve his personality. We are commanded to do many things that lead in this direction. Phil. 4:8, "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." We should be willing to improve our personalities that we might use them to the glory of God. With this personality we are to win others to Christ, not to ourselves. Through improving our personalities, we do the things that are necessary to the salvation of our

How are we to improve our personalities?

1. Be an optimist. An optimist is one who looks on the brighter side of life. It has been stated that the difference between an optimist and a pessimist is: The optimist can see an opportunity in a difficulty, while the pessimist will see a difficulty in an opportunity. Paul said to the Phillipians to "think on these things". Read Phil. 4:8 again. Carefully notice the things the Christian is to look on. Better than 80% of the things we are unhappy about would not be problems at all, if we look to the brighter things.

2. Don't look for something to be unhappy about. It seems strange, but there are some who do not seem to be happy unless they are unhappy. Soloman said, "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." If we fill our minds with misery, we are bound to be miserable. We can be sick, both mentally and physically, by thinking about cares, envies, jealousies, and other evils.

3. Learn to adjust yourself to be happy under adverse conditions. You might work hard to correct this adverse condition, but unhappiness will not correct it. There is a difference between the terms, satisfied and happy. A man might be happy in trying to obtain a certain object, but satisfaction comes in obtaining this object. Happiness can help you gain satisfaction, by causing others to be willing to help you. This is using your personality. To have a radiant personality, you must be happy. Happiness is largely a Solomon said, "A merry heart maketh a cheerful countenance'. If you are cheerful you radiate cheerfulness. You then have a cheerful surrounding.

4. Stay away from fault finding and unfavorable criticism. If you continually find fault, people will stay away from you, so you want to stay away from fault finding. A personality is something that will make others desire your company. That something that will make them glad when they see you coming for a visit. Definitely then fault finding will injure a personality.

5. Prov. 15:1; "A soft answer turneth away wrath: But grievous words stir up anger." Here Solomon not only mentions the type of words we use, but the tone of your voice. You might use choice words to show that you are not angry, but your tone can betray The other individual may be angry, but if you can control your words and the tone of your voice, you can control the situation and will turn away his wrath. Rom. 12:21; "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good". We cannot return evil for evil and be right in the sight of God. Then regardless of how angry he may be, regardless of his words, we must "Overcome evil with good."

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
