Mr. Wilson who is quite a cynic about the writing business says that we'd have been better off to have stayed at home and given the books away. If you listen to your men, ladies, you'll never get more than a few steps beyond your kitchen door!

And this brings me to a discussion of the ROCKY ROAD of FINANCE. When I was fifteen I bought myself an \$80 coat, a high price back in the '20's. I bought it on the installment plan. My two younger brothers and I all but starved to pay for that coat. Our parents were dead and the three of us were working our way through high school. Because of this one bad financial purchase my brothers fell ill of malnutrition and dropped out of school. At the time I didn't think about it much. My myself, I could find a nicer place to stay in a private home. But, as the years have passed I keep remembering the break-up with my brothers. It has become a kind of beast of burden on my conscience. We all remember our misdeeds; so the psychiatrists tell us. We ought to forget them and forgive ourselves!

In colleges now courses in finance are offered. They are tough, hard courses, and few girls take them. The stockmarket exchange in Amarillo offers short one-day courses in alternate summers.

I have had all the courses on this subject that I can get, and one in accounting that has been helpful. Most courses start out by establishing the individual's objectives: Safety of principal, assurance of an adequate income, and growth. 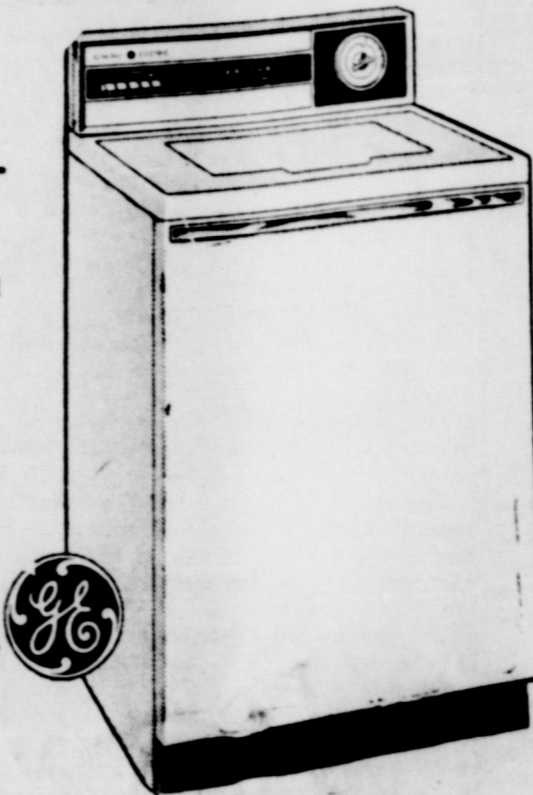

If there is a deficit it will be closed.

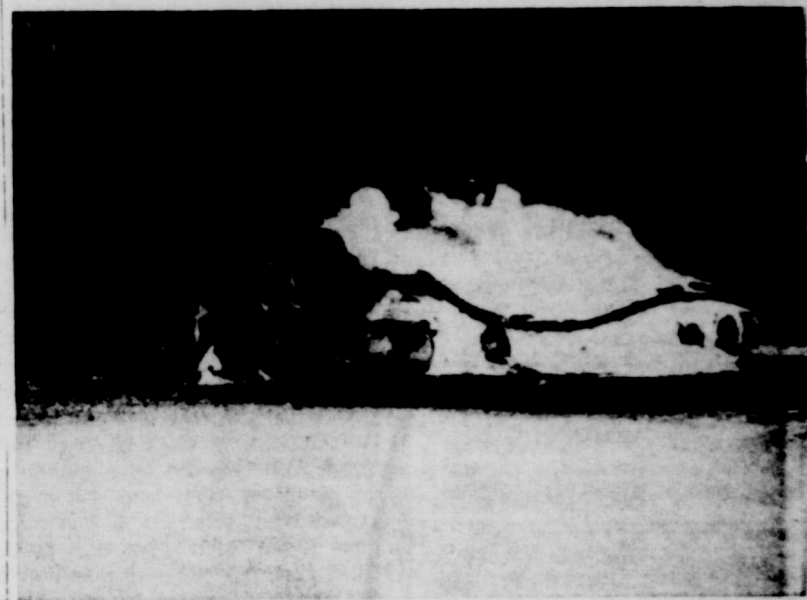

HEAR YE HIM

"Then answered Peter, and said unto Jesus, Lord it is good for us to be here: if thou wilt, let us make here three tabernacles; one for thee and one for Moses, and one for Elias. While he yet spake, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them: and behold a voice out of the cloud which said, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased, HEAR YE HIM." Matt. 17: 4,5.

Men are always wondering why there is so much confusion and so many differences of belief in the religious world today. The answer to this would be that too many people rely on the words of their ministers, creeds or doctrines for guidance, but God simply said, "This is my beloved son, in whom I am well pleased, you hear him."

If we would all take only the Bible or the words of Christ we could come to an agreement and wouldn't have so many differences. But then too many try to infuse their feelings and conscience into the matter of salvation saying that if your feelings are pure God will accept you. Paul stated that he lived with good feelings and a pure conscience while he was persecuting Christians and was still the chief of all sinners.

If we are wrong why not do something about it, instead of delaying and relying on the conscience. Just remember that Jesus said that no man could come to the Father except by Him and that the Father said to listen to Him.

Now it is our duty to search the scriptures to find the true way to get into Christ or into that way.
