E. HENDERSON RESIGNS AS DEMO NOMINEE

Ernest Henderson has resigned as the Democratic nominee for County Commissioner in Precinct 4, as a result of impending court action by Dean McMurtry, whom Henderson defeated in the August 23 Primary election by a margin of 2 votes.

Mr. Henderson said last Thursday that he had handed his resignation to County Judge Geo. W. Hefley Wednesday. He said he took the action after learning unofficially that Mr. McMurtry was going to file an official contest in district court, asking official review of election procedure in the handling of absentee ballots.

"Because of the closeness of the vote and the embarrassment of dragging elderly and sick voters into court, I do not think the job is worth it," said Mr. Henderson. "I was duly elected by the Wheeler County Democratic Committee and as far as I know and as far as the officials could tell, the voting procedure including absentee balloting was handled in a legal and customary manner. If there were any technical mistakes made either by voters or election officials, I am sure it was unintentional. And the law of averages in the handling of so many ballots would surely make this possible in the case of my opponent as well as myself.

"I appreciate the victory given me and I thank all the voters and election officials, but the job does not mean enough to me to drag all these good people into court and have their integrity questioned. There would be hard feelings (Continued on Page 8 No. 2)

Former Commissioner Dies in Clarendon; Services Held Monday

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the First Methodist Church in Clarendon for Joseph Henry Hurn with Rev. C. M. Ryan, Dr. E. D. Landroth of Amarillo and Rev. Carlton Thomas of Wheeler officiating. Mr. Hurn, 90, longtime farmer and rancher of Clarendon, died Sunday afternoon in Adair hospital. He fell the previous Sunday at his home and broke his hip. He was born in England May 29, 1868 and came to the United States as a baby with his parents. The family first settled in Pennsylvania and then moved to Clay County in 1877. COMMITTEE TO PICK NOMINEE SATURDAY

Wheeler County Democratic Chairman A. B. Crump announced this morning that he has scheduled a meeting of the Wheeler County Democratic Executive Committee for 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning in the Wheeler County courthouse.

The meeting has been called to select a county commissioner precinct four nominee to run in the November general election.

Crump explained that this action was necessary due to the resignation handed in last week by Henderson. "Any qualified voter in precinct four is now eligible for appointment as democratic nominee. Both Henderson and his opponent Dean McMurtry are eligible for the nomination."

Qualified residents of precinct four who wish to be considered for the nomination must submit their application to a member of the democratic executive committee Crump said. However, if the committee does not reach a decision on the nominee voters of precinct 4 will have to choose their next County Commissioner by the write-in method in the November general election.

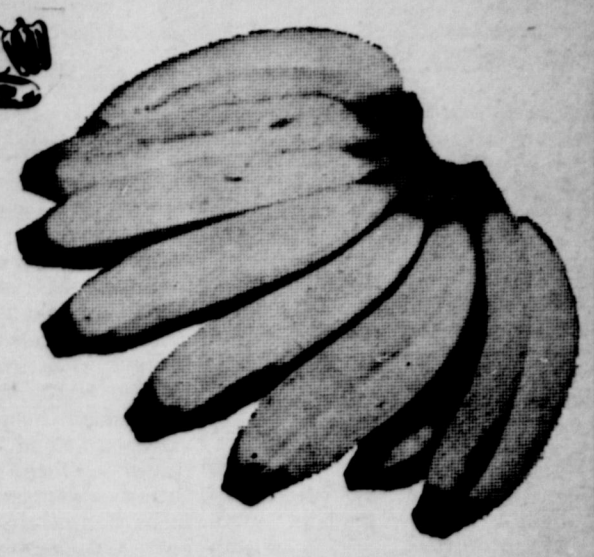

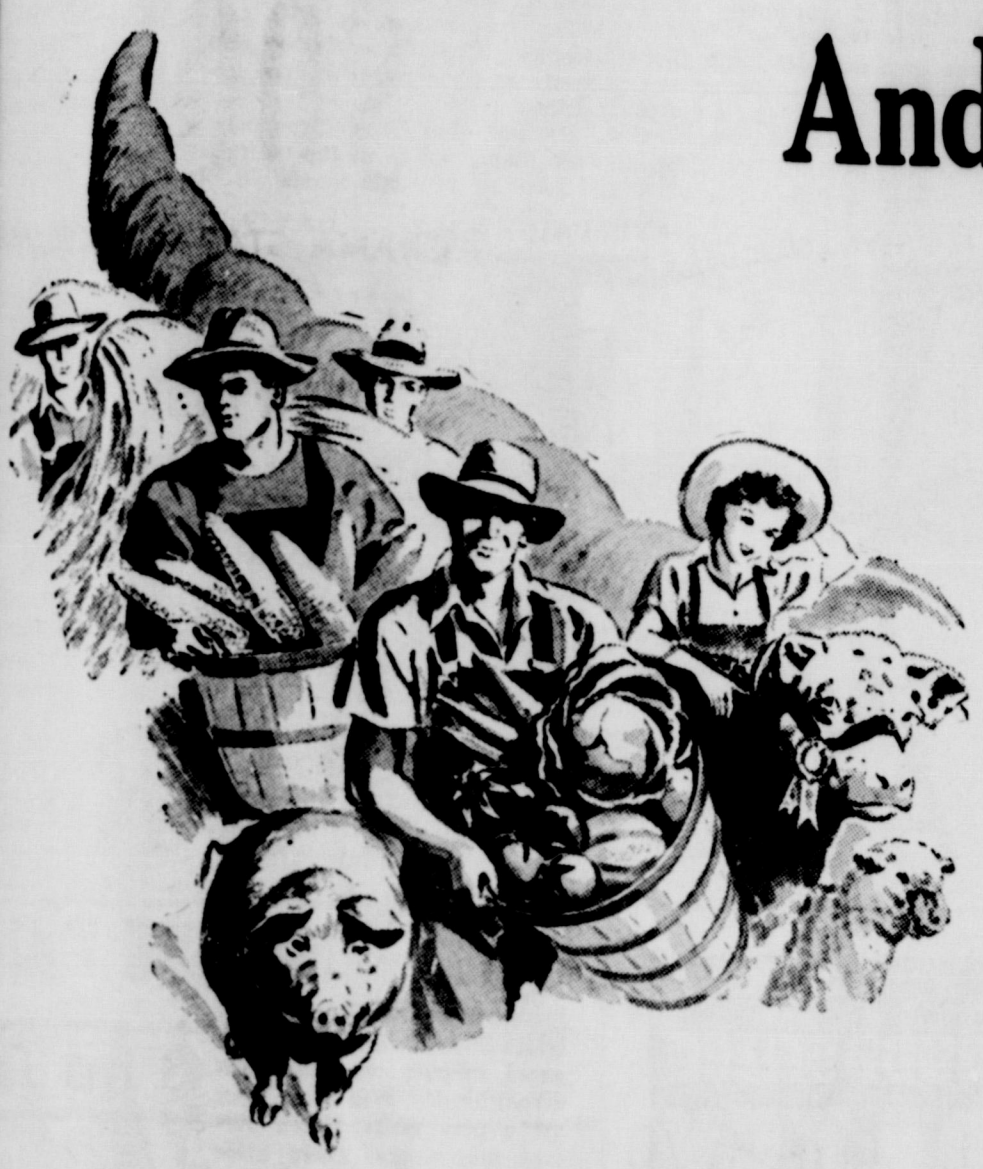

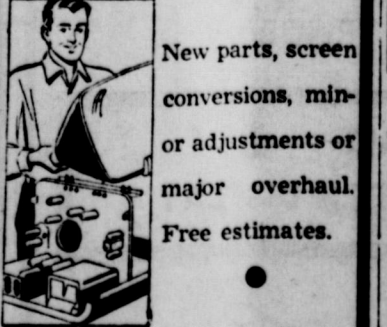

Sept. 15. These include raising the minimum pay for teachers \$595 a year (from \$3205 to \$3800) and releasing state property taxes to allow for more local district collections.

Hale-Aikin Committee is a 24-member study group of lawmakers and private citizens set up by the last legislature to study public schools and make recommendations to the 1959 session. Grass-roots discussion has been going on for nearly a year in cities and counties over the state. Proposals being made now result from sifting and weighing hundreds of ideas urged by educators and interested citizens.

Committee members are not blind to the likelihood of stiff legislative resistance to the additional money - spending called for by most of the proposals. Cost of the state minimum fundation program for the present school year is estimated at \$349,416,000. H-A Committee's "enrichment" suggestions could add from \$50,000,000 to \$150,000,000 to that figure.

Most lawmakers already are feeling financially gloomy because of a predicted \$140,000,000 gap between state revenue and cost of present programs - without any kind of improvement anywhere.

One committee member suggested that, while all the proposals might not be put into effect right away, they could serve as "a pattern for years to come."
