## Manhunt Wednesday Morn.

A man hunt south of Wheeler was underway from 12:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. Wednesday. Two men wanted for burglary in Lipscomb County filed on foot, leaving their car between Wheeler and Shamrock, Wednesday morning when officers attempted to apprehend them.

Officers immediately began trailing the pair and continued until the morning rain and hail storm washed out the tracks. The posse of 15 to 20 men trailed one of the fugitives to the east side of Wheeler, where the trail ended.

## Postal Facility Plans Aired

Plans to acquire a new post office building in Wheeler were announced recently by Postmaster General Winston M. Blount.

"The new building is designed to carry out the Post Office Department's objective of a more efficient postal service combined with improving working conditions for our employees," Mr. Blount said.

The building in Wheeler will be located on the north-east corner of intersection of Canadian and Sixth Sts. Preliminary plans call for 2,522 square feet of floor space with an area of 7,744 square feet for parking and movement of postal vehicles.

The Postmaster General said the building will be constructed under the Department's Lease Construction Program, with the Government's capital investment limited substantially to postal equipment. While leased to the Government, the building will remain under private ownership and the owner will pay local real estate taxes.

Plans and specifications for the new building, as well as bidding forms and other pertinent data, will be made available to prospective bidders at an early date, at which time the Department will advertise for bids.

The site option will be assigned to the successful bidder, who will purchase the land, construct the building and lease it to the Department.

## NGPL Plans Plant Expansion

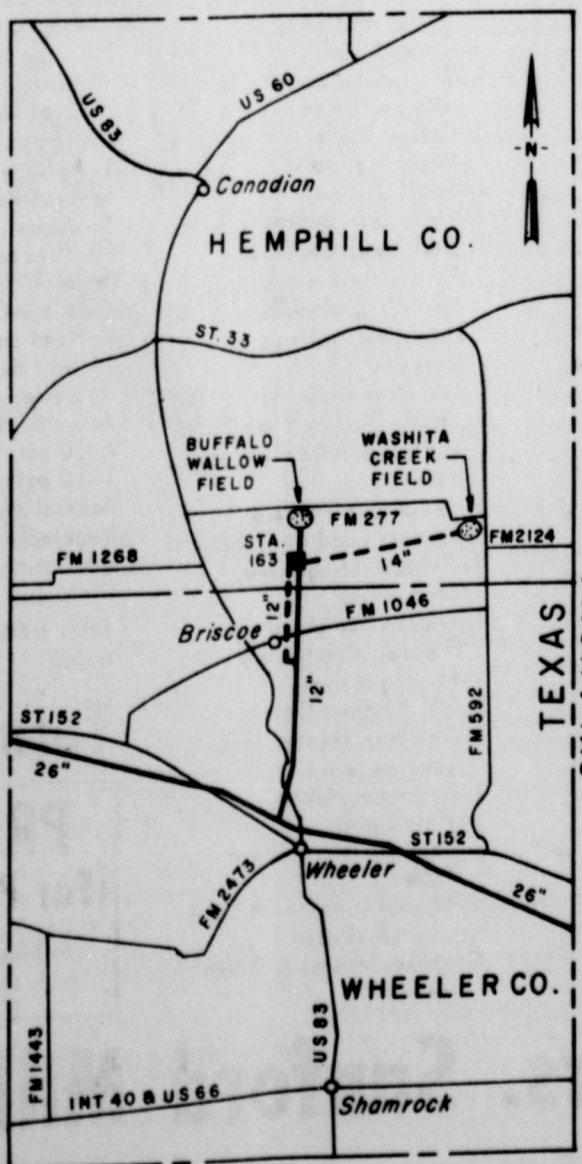
Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America, Chicago, today announced it plans to receive 1 million cubic feet of gas daily from Phillips Petroleum Co. in Phillips Co., Texas, and it has recently completed arrangements to take 1 mmcf of gas per day from Paso Natural Gas Co. in Ward County, Texas.

In an application March 10 to the Federal Power Commission, NGPL filed to construct facilities to receive gas from Phillips in the Washita Creek field in Hemphill County. Reserved dedicated to the Phillips-NGPL contract are estimated to be 6 billion cubic feet.

Proposed were 6 1/2 miles of 14 inch pipeline leading from the Washita field to the new NGPL gas treatment plant in Hemphill County's Buffalo Wallow field, and 4 1/2 miles of pipeline looping to the present 12-inch line which connects the plant with NGPL's Oklahoma expansion pipeline. NGPL also would expand the Buffalo Wallow purification plant with a 2.7 million dollar addition to quadruple the plant's capacity from 50 million cubic feet per day to 200 million cubic feet. The plant currently is treating gas from the Buffalo Wallow field only.

When the pipeline is completed, approximately three months from the beginning of construction, NGPL would begin receiving about 10 mmcf of gas a day

from the Washita field, after one year, when the plant addition is finished, NGPL would increase its "take" to 140 million cubic feet daily.

# Across the Fence

Funds are rolling for brush control and range improvement. County chairman, Clarence Zybach says all community committeemen are encouraged by the enthusiastic response of county landowners who are joining together with ranchers from all over the state to raise funds to try to find a cheaper, more effective way on controlling brush and improving range and pasture land. Their plan is to solicit one cent per acre from each Texas landowner each year for five years.

If you haven't sent in your contribution yet, do so at your earliest convenience. We are going to need the help and cooperation of every landowner to fight brush invasion, which is one of Texas' major agricultural problems. Watch Out For Screwworms: Veterinarians in USDA's Agricultural Research Service anticipate one of the worst outbreaks in the 7 year history of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. They hope the increased production of sterile screwworm flies may blunt a massive spring buildup. The resurgence is blamed on 17 months of ideal weather for the pests and on relaxed preventive measures by many ranchers. Ranchers are asked to carry on an intensive preventive program in the months ahead.

Herd should be inspected regularly, suspected larvae should be collected for identification and all wounds treated with approved smears. Plant Quality Seed for Top Cotton Crop: Cotton farmers should make an extra effort to select and plant high quality seed this spring. Careful seed selection is important since there was a large amount of low germinating seed produced last year. Much of this seed came from hail damaged as well as late maturing cotton.

The best germinating seed was produced under dryland conditions in the southern portion of the High Plains. Fields receiving extra or late irrigations often produced seed of low germination, especially in northern areas. Both high and low germinating seed may be found in one location in the area. But growers should make sure they know the quality of the seed they are planting. The analysis tag on the bag tells the story regarding germination. Here the farmer will find the germination percent and date of the test. If you can't fight it - join it. This is a good rule to follow if Johnsongrass invades your hay pasture, according to one extension agronomist with Texas A&M University. Costs of herbicides to control the 'weed' are much more than fertilizer costs, Dr. J. Neal Pratt points out. Result Demonstrations set up through our Northwest Texas Research Demonstration program shows more profits from Johnsongrass than some other improved grasses.

Nutrient value of Johnsongrass is comparable to many of the cultivated grasses grown for forage or hay and livestock can utilize it as well. If the Johnsongrass is to be baled, it should be cut in the 'boot' stage, or right before seed heads form. An application of fertilizer according to soil tests will help it grow rapidly and maintain nutrients. Geraniums are excellent plants for mass effects in the landscape. They may be planted any time after the night temperature remains above 50 degrees Fahrenheit. Geraniums are easily grown and will tolerate a wide range of conditions providing sound, healthy pl-

ants are obtained. Plants of the new All-America selections should be available in the nursery and garden center outlets at this time. These All-America Seed selections include the following varieties: Care-free Bright Pink, Care-free Deep Salmon and Care-free Deep Scarlet.

Any good, well-drained soil with several inches of coarse peat moss spaded into the top six inches will produce good geraniums. Two to three pounds of complete fertilizer, such as 8-8-8 or 12-12-12, should be incorporated into the soil with the peat moss.

Even though the plants are small when you set them out, be sure to allow ample space for them to grow and develop. A minimum of 15 inches should be allowed between plants. If the plants are watered and fertilized at regular intervals, they will soon provide a solid blanket of green foliage topped with attractive flowers over the entire bed. Although it is often advocated, pinching the top out of geranium plants is not necessary if ample room is provided to start with. It is only crowded plants that produce the tall, leggy growth.

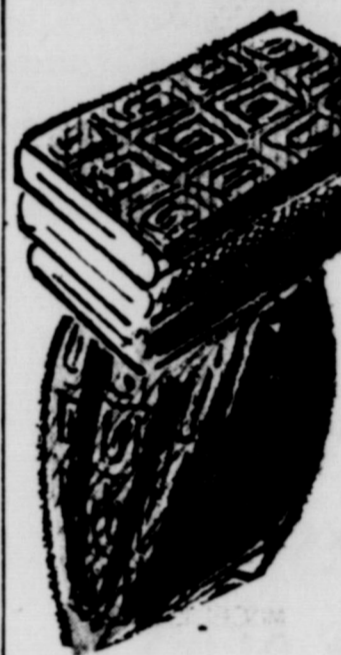

We went back into session Tuesday after Easter and have been rolling along. The committees are all hard at it hearing the various bills. We had 11 last week in Revenue and Taxation and got them all heard in 4 hours although two of them were tabled.

It gets almost humorous how everyone who has been mentioned for higher taxes is already paying more than his part. We really have our work cut out for us in trying to raise the additional money necessary.

The House Appropriations bill has been laid out and we will take it up Monday (the 14th). This provides for an increase of \$238 million from General Revenue and a total increase of \$624 million for the upcoming two year period, over the last two years.

This makes it about \$60 million less than the Senate Bill. Of course these bills are more of a guideline and do not include the teacher pay raise and several other items. So, it's way too early yet to know just what our financial requirements will be.

They are trying to get enough votes to pass the Constitutional amendment for Annual Sessions. They need 100 votes to get this on the ballot and the last time we voted they got 99. So they are sort of delaying, trying to make sure they can get enough votes.

I have opposed this as I think the more we are down here the more of your money will be spent. It also makes it necessary to neglect your business even more and makes it more difficult for a lot of us to serve. I also think that West Texas will be better off with things like they are.

The country down here is sure beautiful at this time of the year. The Azalea are most beautiful and the Blue

Bonnets are starting to bloom. So, if you want to see South Texas, now is a perfect time.

We are all holding our breath over the danger of having to re-district again. This would make a Special Session necessary and June and July are terrible here. It would sure create a lot of problems especially in that we will have to re-district next session anyhow under the new census. So far, we are getting along pretty good.

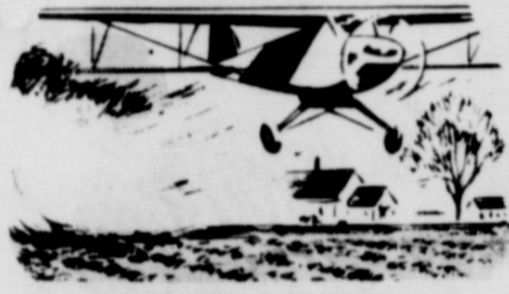
