TEXAS POLITICS

By Rep. Malouf Abraham

I'm writing this at the end of the week and it seems like Monday was about two weeks ago. We took up the House Appropriations bill and it wasn't really too bad a bill. However, there were a number of items in there that I didn't like and we tried to make some changes without success.

It's smaller than the Senate bill so now a Conference Committee of five members from each house will work out the differences. It will be real interesting to see just what comes out. remember last session that they came up with about 30 million dollars more money and a bunch of things that were not in either of the bills.

We had a rough day Wednesday which included a 5-hour Revenue & Taxation Committee hearing on the proposed chemical tax. We had something like 34 people appear from all types of industry including a number of farmers. I think that this bill won't get any where

That's the funny thing not really funny - that very few of the tax bills we have chance of passing as presented. But the fact still remains that we are going to have to figure out some way

to come up with a bunch. Maybe next week I can have a little more to say about taxes and the teachers pay

Now, let's talk about the amendment to allow Liquor-by-the-Drink on a local option basis. You may remember that I have given you quite a bit of information about this proposal and it has been areal difficult decision with lots of pressure. They needed 100 votes on final reading to pass it. Wednesday they got 95 votes and then with a lot of work they would up with 101 votes Thursday.

I votes "NO" both times. Here is how our District voted in the referendum last Hansford - For - 319; Again-



ACROSS the FENCE

After a brief return to winter last week, folks were wondering whether this was really spring or not. Hail thinned out our peach crop. We'll still have enough for a peach pie or two this summer. The fruit that's left should be of real quality.

A lot of home fruit orchardists have been inquiring about fruit rot and warms in peachers. To overcome these drawbacks, you need to start spraying with fungic ides and insectic ides, following through with a scheduled spray program. A lot of this information is in the fruit and nut tree spray schedule at my office.

The 7th Annual State 4-H Har se Show will be held in Sweetwater, August 14-16 at the Nolan County Coliseum. The announcement was made this week by John F. Hutchison, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and President Wade Forester of the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce. Yeates, Extension horse specialist and show manager. A cutting horse contest will be included for the first times.


