## Fire Dept. Called To Five Area Fires

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department has been kept on its toes this week with five fires in as many days. A considerable amount of property was destroyed in the fires.

The plague of fires began Friday evening at 7:00. The motor of an empty trailer truck caught fire at the stop light.

The siren again sounded Sunday afternoon at 1:50 for the men to fight a fire twelve miles north and east of Wheeler on the Hank Miller place. A grass fire of undetermined origin burned a good number of acres of grass.

Before the return of the fire fighters, the whistle called the standby crew into action to fight a fire at the North Texas Milk barn. This small grass fire on the west side of the building was quickly extinguished.

Tuesday afternoon at 3:15 a fire was called in from Kelton. Burns on the lot at the Kelton Gin had caught fire from trash burning at the Kelton School. The quick action of the Wheeler and Shamrock Fire Departments and K.D. Ford with a county maintainer brought the fire under control.

The Edward Wafford Apartments west of town was the scene of Tuesday evening's fire. The hot water heater in the apartment caused a fire inflicting heavy smoke and water damage to the east apartment of the duplex.

## Allison FHA Girls Bean Supper

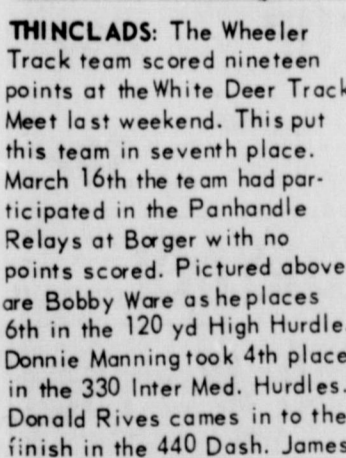
Allison FHA Girls will sponsor a bean supper in the Allison School Cafeteria Tuesday, April 2, at 7:00 p.m.

## City Aldermen Raise Deposits

The Wheeler City Council met Monday, March 18 to transact the city's business for the month.

Discussion was held on the raising of water deposits. The council voted to raise water deposits to \$15.00 for residential, \$25.00 for commercial and \$50.00 for Laundries.

The new deposit rate will not affect present residents of the city. The new rates were put into effect immediately. Anyone moving into Wheeler or anyone making a deposit for a newly purchased or newly opened business will be expected to deposit the above listed amount.

The residential deposit is for two months minimum charge. The commercial and laundry minimum is a two month average.

In other business, it was decided to place a guard rail in front of the new city office and around the air conditioning unit.

Long Binh, Viet Nam 3-22-68

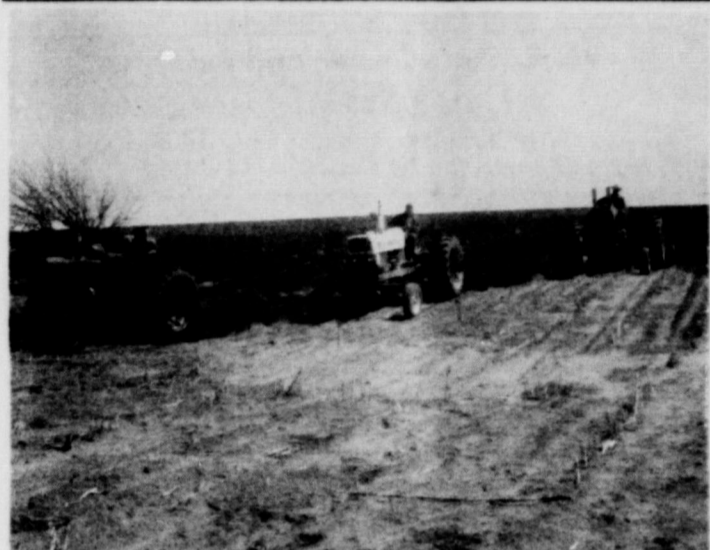
Dear Editor,

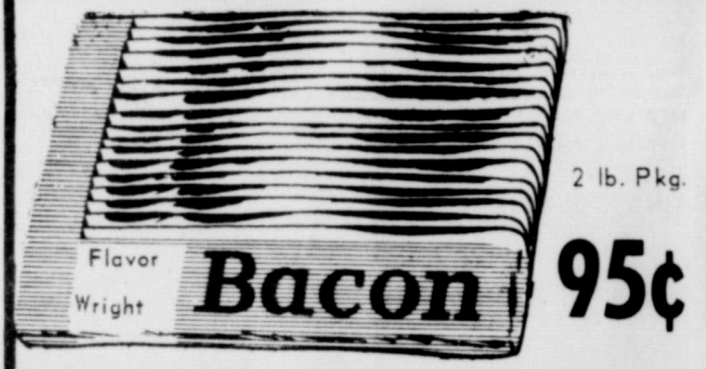

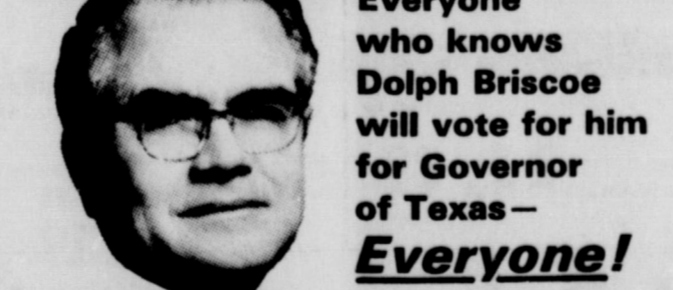
