


The new deposit rate will not affect present residents of the city. Thenew rates were put into affect immediately. Anyone moving into Wheeler or anyone making a deposit for a newly purchased or newly opened business will be expected to

amo unt. The residential deposit is for two months minimum charge. The commercial and laundry minimum is a two month average.

In other business, it was decided to place a guard rail in front of the new city office and around the air conditioning unit.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR: Long Binh, Viet Nam 3-22-68 Dear Editor,


I see in the March 14 edition of the "Times" that you are making a list of servicemen in this God forsaken place that arelonely and would like to hear from the people back home.


