The City sponsored Rabies he has not had any cases Clinic for the vaccination of of Rabies in dogs. However pets in Wheeler will be held earlier this year. The clinic will be at the Fire Station May 1, 1968, from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Dr. Byron Range, Shamrock Veterinarian will be at the fire station to give rabies vaccinations to all dogs, cats and other pets brought to the station.

Pets may be immunized for one year or 39 months. The one year immunization which may be given to any age animal will cost \$2.50. The 39 month vaccination is optional on all dogs above 5 2 months of age, but cannot be given to cats. The 39 month immunization will cost \$3.00

Vaccination tags and certificates will be given each animal immunized.




