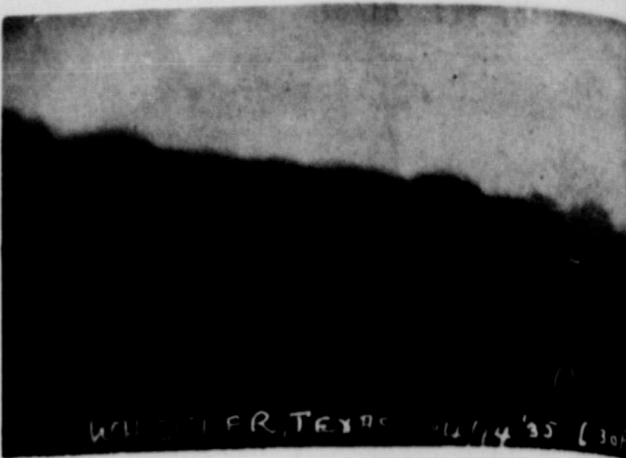

Your Hospital And YOU

This will be the final article, for now anyway, regarding Parkview Hospital. We have tried, in the past few weeks, to explain how your hospital operates and to inform you of some of the details and requirements that we must meet in order to be of service to you, the public. We felt that since this is your hospital and that you are paying taxes to support it, you should have at least a partial understanding of how things work.

As we said last week, we will give you a list of most of the costs involved in a 30 day period of operations.

First of all, our biggest expense is salaries for employees. Our salaries for our sample month amounts to \$7,527.00.

From here on, we will list our expenses in order of the most amount:

Drugs, \$1,438; Food, \$875.00; Misc. medical supplies, \$546.00; Utilities, \$438.00; Laboratory supplies, \$342.00; Laundry, \$314.00; Housekeeping supplies, \$257.00; Telephone service, \$217.00; Reports from outside consulting laboratories, \$196.00.

And our list goes on and on and on. To make a long story short, our total expenses for our sample month was \$16,008.39 and believe it or not this is just an average month. We have had some months that are much higher.

This then, should give you some idea on hospital costs. And you might remember these costs go on whether our patient accounts are to us or not. Our patients pay their bills so we can operate, in that respect, we to operate like any other business. According to the Legal Council of the Texas Hospital Association, all patients are required to pay their own way except those that have been legally declared charity or indigent.

We hope you have been enlightened.

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ACROSS THE FENCE

Looks like the greenbug's getting up a little - prospects for a good wheat crop look promising. As long as weather conditions remain cool and wet, we can expect continued damage from insects. The alfalfa pea aphid continued its buildup this past week. Clyde Whittle, Shamrock, said last week that the aphids were killing alfalfa and he was considering initiating control measures. Most greenbug spraying was completed in the early part of last week. P.A. Martin, Briscoe area,

says that spraying activities was concentrated in his area last week. Many wheat plants over there were already dead.

Had a big turnout for the annual Wheeler County Agricultural Clinic this past Monday at the Shamrock High School. Close to 200 heard the program and ate barbecue courtesy of the Agricultural Committee of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce and the following sponsors: C & H Supply, J.W. Fields Oil Co., Hofmann Sales Co., Shamrock Coop Gin, West Texas Utility Co., James Reneau Seed Co., Harrison 66 Oil Co., and Cantrell Fuel and Supply. Local talks making introductions for the program included Seibert Worley, James Verden, Bill Cantrell, James Reneau, Doyce Cochran, Jerry Hnacia and John Manning. Lois Grayson, ASCS Office Manager, explained the Wildlife Brochure and questionnaire, a USDA Technical Action Project sponsored by local Chamber of Commerce groups. The planning and carrying out of the Agricultural Clinic was done by the Livestock-Crops Subcommittee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is going to dedicate the Missouri Beef Packers Packing Plant this coming Saturday April 20. Their open house will be on Sunday from 11 til 5 p.m. We understand it will be the largest beef packing plant in the United States and that it will do approximately 150 million dollars worth of business the first year of its operation. We look for this plant to improve our local markets. Four 4-H members and adult leaders are issued a special invitation, according to Ted Weaver, Manager.

Fire Blight of Pears: We look for this disease to be on the increase this year on apple and pear plantings. Damage looks like a blow torch has been utilized to kill back the growing tips. It's usually a problem when moisture is available and

weather conditions are favorable. It's a bacterial disease. Spraying with Zineb or antibiotics will give good control if it is accompanied by sanitary pruning, sterilizing shears after each cut.

Outstanding Conservation Program: S.W. Williams, Mobeetie Lions Club, tells us that they plan to honor this year's Outstanding Conservation Farmer at their ladies Night program to be held at the Mobeetie Methodist Church this coming Tuesday night at 7:30, April 23. Past Conservation Winners for 1965 and 1966 will be presented plaques by the Shamrock Lions Club, according to Gene Allison, Chairman. Selection of Outstanding Conservation Farmers is an annual activity of the Board of Supervisors of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District. Dusan Pagan is Chairman. 1966 winner was Dean Tipps of Briscoe and 1965 winner was Gordon Whitener of Wheeler. Selection is based on contributions made toward an outstanding conservation program on their farms and ranches following District suggestions and innovations of their own to conserve soil and water.

The Wheeler Kiwanis Club will hear the winners of this year's County 4-H Public Speaking Contest at their April 22 meeting at the Methodist Church in Wheeler. Dana Luttrell, Jr. Division Girl Winner, will speak on "The Challenge of Youth Today." Geniva Shugart, the Senior Girl's Division will speak on "An American." The Shamrock Kiwanis Club will be presented a program on April 23 by the Shamrock Public Speaking Club, featuring winners of County Contests. The winners of

the public speaking contest will represent Wheeler County at the District 1 4-H Contests April 27 at West Texas State University at Canyon, Texas.

Chemical weed control in cotton hasn't caught the eye of many farmers in our county yet. But the chances are that it will, because farmers who have used it and experiment station people too, say this new method has a lot of advantages that make it practical for farm use.

Some farmers have been skeptical about getting results but most who have tried chemicals have been more than satisfied. "Treflan" is one of the most commonly used chemicals. For the most part it has been sprayed on broadcast and disked in lightly before planting. E.B. Stevens, Wheeler, got good results last year using this method.

However, the costs which runs from \$3.50 to \$7.50 an acre, depending on whether you've got a sand or tight soil, have some farmers considering banding. Rex Miller, Allison cotton farmer, for example has been banding treflan on his cotton for the last two years and wouldn't do it any other way. In fact, he'll band treflan again this year. Last year he banded 60 acres, "I didn't spend but two evenings hoeing that field", says Miller. Before spraying, he was spending about \$3 an acre hoeing and spent \$15 an acre a few years ago. Banding treflan, he says, costs him only about \$1 an acre, using only two quarts to 16 acres. The key seems to be in incorporating the material correctly. He doesn't use a press wheel. The spray is directed nearly over and just behind the opener dropping the seed. The disc covers incorporates the material a little and a drag finishes the job. Plowing is done as quickly as can be done without disturbing the band.

Of course there are some cases where banding doesn't work too well. Allen Reynolds of Allison found that out last year. "Perhaps it

would work better on land with not too much of a weed or grass problem", says Reynolds, who tried banding on some "laid-out" land infested with crabgrass. He reported good results in spots, but other places were real grassy. The big problem, he said, on his land, was that when it rained, you had to get in and do something to keep the soil from blowing. "Otherwise, it would work pretty good if you didn't have to get right in and do something with it," he added.

For the most part, broadcast treflan applied before planting and disked in will be the most universal usage here. In cases when costs may be prohibitive in tighter soils, banding will be considered. Where weeds and grasses are not much of a problem, regular cultivation with a rotary hoe will probably be the most economical. That Prairie Dog bait has been doing us a good job. Loyd Jones got a 99% kill on 120 acres of "dog town" on his place. The first appli-

cation cut down about 80% and a couple of other doses got the rest. By the way, we've still got some left.

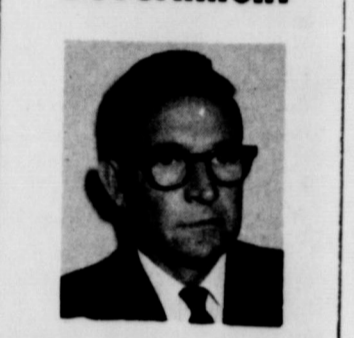

Veterans News

The bill which President Johnson signed into law, March 29, 1968 will protect nearly a quarter of a million veterans, widows and parents against any reduction in Veterans Administration pension or dependency and indemnity compensation due to the recent Social Security increase, Jack Coker, manager of the Waco VA Regional Office said today.

The measure will also result in added VA payments, beginning Jan. 1, 1969 to more than 1.1 million on VA pension rolls, Coker emphasized.

VA now pays out approximately \$2.3 billion annually to these two groups of beneficiaries and to some 600,000 pensioners under a prior protected law.

Coker explained that pensions are paid to veterans whose total and permanent disabilities are not related to military service and to widows, who, like eligible veterans, meet low income limitations.

He noted that in two messages to Congress on America's servicemen and veterans, the President recommended legislation to "protect the veteran against disproportionate losses that could result from increases in other income, such as Social Security."

Veterans, widows and parents are assured by the new law signed on March 28 of no reductions in VA benefits through 1969, because of increased Social Security payments which went into effect this month, Coker said.

According to the Waco VA Regional Office Manager, added VA benefits beginning next January for more than 1.1 million pensioners will result from restructuring of the entire VA pension and dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) program, as provided in the new law.

Effective January 1, 1969, Coker explained, income limitations, which govern financial eligibility for VA pensions and dependency benefits, will be raised \$200 for all beneficiaries. This increase is particularly important to "old law" pensioners since it will mean that the recent Social Security income hike will cause no loss in VA payments.

Also starting next year, Coker said, income levels, which determine the amount of current law VA pension and DIC benefits, will be computed in \$100 increments with maximum payments going to those with the lowest income. VA benefits will be reduced only a fraction of each \$100 increase in income up to the new ceilings.

Currently, there are only three to five income levels used in determining the amount of benefits a recipient may be paid. There are no graduated benefits for income between these levels.

Coker emphasized that under the restructured VA pension and dependency indemnity compensation program, there will be from 13 to 28 income levels used to compute a recipient's pension or dependency benefit.

Any veteran, widow or parents having any question or needing help in connection with the new pension law recently signed by the President are invited to call or come by the Waco VA Regional Office for information or assistance, Manager Coker said.

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FHA News

A total of \$2,262,030 in loan funds has been used in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties to support family farms since the Farmers Home Administration was expanded three years ago, John L. Manning, local supervisor for the rural credit agency said today.

Approximately \$694,110 was advanced in 1967. Currently 140 farmers in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties are using the supervised credit services of the Farmers Home Administration.

The supply of Farmers Home Administration credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other private credit sources is one of the measures recommended by President Johnson to provide family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income.

"These loans have enabled farmers to stay in business who would otherwise have had to give up and go to the city. They have helped young farmers get established. They have enabled farmers to keep going after natural disaster such as drought, hail and cost price squeeze and etc. brought about the need for emergency loans in the county," Mr. Manning noted.

Farmers Home Administration loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms.

The income of farmers using Farmers Home Administration credit in Wheeler, Hemphill, and Roberts Counties in 1967 totaled approximately \$1,500,000.

Typical of the progress made with the aid of the supervised credit program is the record of the Robert Trostle family of Wheeler County Lela Community.

Robert Trostle's family started with an operating loan in 1955 to buy out his fathers operating, refinance other debts and lease the Trostle estate. At that time they owned 150 acres of land bought through the Texas Veterans Land Board, 13 cows and 1 tractor. This loan was used to purchase adequate cattle and equipment to farm the enlarged unit. In 1962 they obtained a Farm Ownership loan from this agency to purchase an additional 530 acres of land, remodel their dwelling, build a new barn, improve the farm land with new fences and terraces and control brush as was needed to make an efficient farm.

The have been successful enough that they have graduated to other credit for operation expenses and the land notes are current even after several years of wheat crop

failures in their particular community. Their net worth is approximately 20 times what it was when they came to Farmers Home Administration for their first supervised loan 13 years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Trostle stated that they appreciate very much the assistance they have received from Farmers Home Administration in getting started to farming and the help in expanding as the trend in agriculture required for efficient farm management. They give F.H.A. credit for their being in the farming business today.

Loans are made to families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources. The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.
