active membership. Membership on the National Honor Society has become recognized nationally as the nighest honor that can be bestowed upon a high school student. This is true because it represents achievement in the total field of education, not just in some specific field. Membership is evaluated by the faculty, according to national regulations on the basis of four demensions: character, service, leadership

and scholarship. The first requirement for mem bership is that the student must have a B average or better. To rate high in leadership, the student must take a constructive lead in classroom and school activities, contribute constructive ideas and show initiative in his studies. Service is rated on the basis of contribution not for personal gain, but for the class, school and community; on courtesy to all and on representation in various types of competition. Character is judged by the responsibility of meeting obligations to the school and to the teachers; by highest standards of attitude toward honest, reliability, fairness and tolerance for others; by willing cooperation with all

The evaluation of these dimensions was made by the entire faculty and then averaged for ratings. 
