In the event Wheeler citizens need to take shelter. the fire whistle will sound two 30 second blasts. If the electricity should be off at the time the town needs to be alerted, the fire trucks will be driven up and down the streets making as much noise as possible.

The fire alarm consists of eleven 15 second blasts. With the tornado season in full swing, it would be wise for all new arrivals in Wheeler to find a "fraid hole." We hope you never need to use it, but it is good to know where you can go.

Mayonnaise or Salad Dressing

By Brenda Hofmann, CHDA Do you know the difference in mayonnaise and salad dressing? Both contain the same ingredients - vegetable oil, an acidifying ingredient, as lemon juice or vinegar, egg and seasonings. The difference is that the oil in mayonnaise must total 65% of its weight. The oil in salad dressing must be a minimum total weight of 30%. Therefore the mayonn-

aise contains more oil. The American Hobby Federation said in a recent teen survey that the favorites among 13-19 year olds were meat loaf, potato chips, apple pie and football. If any of you are planning to sew on wash and wear, durable press or thin synthetic fiber fabric, keep this in available for the sewing mach ine and the sharpest dressmaker pins. Make sure too that all notions are wash and wear to match the fabrics. Since the idea is to skip ironing after laundering, every little detail must come out of the washer and dryer as smooth as the garmet itself. Sewing machine adjustment is all important on these

fabrics. To insure proper sewing machine adjustment test the tension on a scrap of material. Cust a six inch square, then fold it over exactly from corner to corner so the base is a true bias fold. Now stitch a seam on the machine 4 inch from the fold and pull the bias until the seam breakes. With proper tension, both threads should break at the same time. If one thread breaks first - either from the bobbin or spool - it is too tight.

A neat way to clean ventian blinds is to wear a light-weight canvas glove to dust them. Slide gloved fingers along several slats at a time. The tape may be cleaned with a vacuum cleaner attachment. It is not recommended to soak them in water. Waxing the slats protects them and allows easier cleaning

Properplanting rates are also an important consideration. On irrigated acreage, planting at the rate of eight pounds per seed per acre is yields. Hybrid's vary some in seed size but this amounts to about eight seed per foot of 40 inch row. With limited irrigation, five to six pounds per acre is normally suffic-

About two and one-half pounds of seed per acre is

increase yields as much as 20 percent. This means planting double rows 10 to 18 to 20 inches apart on a 40 inch bed or on single beds 26,28 or 30 inches apart. In this case, planting rates should be kept the same or increased not more than 25 percent. To obtain the most benefit from narrow-row spacing, adequate fertilizer and moisture levels must be maintained.

The time for planting maize is here and farmers should consider certain cultural practices which can improve overall production and production officiency.






