





Promise: Bollworms and tobacco budworms in cotton may be more resistant to des. available insecticides these days, but they are no match for one of nature's equalizers -- insecticides on our cotton the larva of the green lacewing, a natural predator.

Two USDA entomologists at Texas A&M University have

obtained a 96 percent reduction of bollworms and budworms by releasing great numbers of the Chrysopa larvae into a cotton field. The larvae, also known as aphid lions, showed a respectable tolerance to insecticides. The entomologists, Dr. R.L. Ridgway and S.L. Jones, said the practice was still in the experimental stage and is not meant to replace but to reduce the use of insectici-

consider using oil-water emulsion sprays for applying atrazine to grain sorghum this season. On small weeds one to two pounds of a trazine in one to two gallons of a non-toxic oil should give good weed control. The oil should contain an adequate amount of emul-

sifier for 20 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. If weeds are large and the sorghum is more than six inches tall, higher rates or water, oil and atrazine should be used.

Store only clean clothes. harder to remove if they stay on the garment all summer.

Also moth damage is more likely on soiled clothes, too. Wash and dry thoroughly all washable garments--don't use starch. Dry clean other soiled garments.

To insure against moths, moth eggs and larvae, brush and hang in the sun as well as clean. For added protection spray the clean garment with methoxxychlor, chlordane, Stroband or Perthane before storage (follow directions and observe cautions given on the containerlabel.) Remove plastic buttons, buckles or other plastic ornaments before storing and avoid using plastic hangers. The plastic may stain or melt into the fabric, especially if the garments are stored in warm, dry places such as an attic or if "moth balls" are put with the clothes.

Furs usually should be cleaned professionally and stored in fur storage vaults where the temperature is low. Summer heat in home closets tend to dry the skins. Mixture C: Felt and yarn hats should be brushed thoroughly. Stuff the crowns of the hats with tissue paper and place in uncrowded boxes.



Apricot-Beef Timbale

Combine in saucepan and simmer over low gas flame one minute: 1/2 cup chopped diced apricots and 1/2 cup water

Mix lightly: 2 pounds gound meat (mixture of beef, pork and veal), 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 egg, 1/4 cup sour cream, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper.

Stir in lightly: 2 cups bread stuffing mix, ¹4 cup chopped celery, 1 tablespoons melted butter or margarine 4 teaspoon salt, dash cayenne and cooked apricots.

Mold meat mixture in eight custard cups and turn out onto shallow baking pan. Wrap each timbale with bacon slice. Bake in over (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes or until browned. Makes eight servings.
