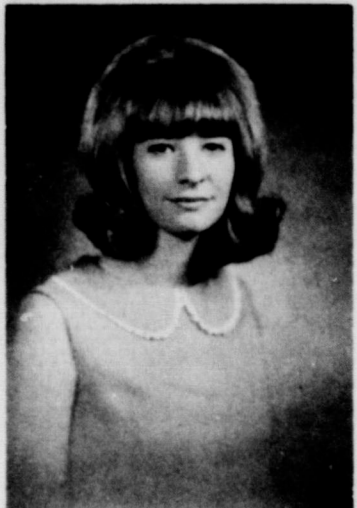
The term "57 Varieties" has been the trademark of Heinz foods since 1896. It was originated by H. J. Heinz who founded the international food processing company in 1869.

# ACROSS THE FENCE

Better plant that cotton between showers. Some cotton is up and most folks say it's about three weeks behind now. Duane Scott's field trial plots planted in our variety plots planted but we're not optimistic about long-staple varieties

like De Cena and Acala having time to make. Doctor Porter over at the Bushland Experiment Station tells me they'll have their field day June 11 at 1 p.m. The field day'll feature wheat. Visitors will see experimental short wheat varieties hybrid wheat trials, crossing

blocks of male sterile wheat, short barley varieties and irrigation tests on wheat. Triticales, a cross between wheat and rye, which is proposed to be bred to "feed the world" will be seen. Also the new Red River 68. We encourage producers of wheat to attend.

Spring and early summer storms frequently cause con-

siderable wind damage to trees. When should this damage be repaired? Damaged branches or limbs should be removed immediately. Make the cut flush with the tree trunk or limb from which it is growing. Paint all wounds with a good tree wound dressing to prevent the entrance of disease and/or insects. A few suggestions for removing a heavy limb pre-

vent tearing of the bark include--the making of a cut from the underside about 8 inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least one-third of the way through the branch or until the saw binds. Make the second cut from above and several inches further out on the trunk. Continue cutting until the branch is removed. Make the final cut flush and parallel to the main trunk. Apply tree wound dressing to the exposed surface.

### Chemicals Available for Good Weed Control in Maize

As that new crop of grain sorghum emerges, weeds will likely be springing up too unless pre-emergence herbicidal treatment has been used.

If not, numerous herbi-

cides are available for post-emergence applications. These include atrazine, diuron, 2, 4-D, dicamba (Banvel D) and MCPA. The type used depends primarily on the sorghum and weed size.

Atrazine is widely used and gives good control of both small and large carelessly. At one to two pounds per acre, plus one-half percent surfactant, this herbicide will control carelessly weeds less than one inch tall. Apply it in 20 to 40 gallons of water per acre with one to two pints of surfactant.

For large carelessly, we recommend using one to two pounds of atrazine in one to two gallons of special agricultural oil containing enough emulsifier for

complete emulsification of 10 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. If weeds are difficult to kill, higher rates of oil, water and atrazine may be necessary. Weeds larger than six inches may not be killed if they are under moisture stress.

Sorghum should be at least two inches tall on silty clay loam and loam soil and six inches tall on fine sandy loam soil before atrazine treatment is used. If two pounds of atrazine is applied with two gallons of oil in an oil-water emulsion, sorghum should be at least six inches tall. Do not apply atrazine or any of other herbicides over the top of sorghum in boot or flowering stage.

Furthermore, do not use atrazine on loamy sand and sandy soils.

Aerial application of one to two pounds of atrazine per acre is an oil-water emulsion containing five to ten percent oil give good weed kill. Limit the total carrier to a minimum of one gallon for each pound of atrazine applied.

Band or broadcast treatments, either directed at the soil or over the crop, also gives effective weed control. Do not feed sorghum forage to livestock until 60 days after treatment. Plant only sorghum, corn or winter wheat the year following atrazine application. Drift at the time of atrazine application is not toxic to cotton.

Dicamba and 2, 4-D are effective for killing small annual broadleaf weeds. Yields were reduced considerably last year due to improper timing of application of these herbicides. They should be applied when sorghum is 6 to 15 inches tall. Use caution with larger sorghum. Do not treat after the seed head is beginning to emerge into the tip of the boot. Severe head blasting will occur if sorghum is sprayed over the top after this stage.

Apply dicamba at a rate of one-fourth to three-eighths pound per acre broadcast over the top of sorghum. Sprays directed at the base of the sorghum will likely cause lodging. Dicamba will drift if wind and application pressure is high although it is not as toxic to cotton as 2,4-D.

With regards to 2,4-D, one-half pound per acre of any of the formulations offers good weed control. Do not treat wheatland parentage hybrids as serious yields reductions and lodging may occur in some of these.

Since 2,4-D formulations are highly volatile and drift easily, sensitive crops such as cotton can be seriously damaged. Reduce spray drift by using high gallonage (10-20 gallons per acre) and low pressure (15-20 pounds per square inch).

Diuron is another good herbicide for controlling small broadleaf weeds in 15-inch sorghum, apply it as a directed spray to weeds at a rate of two-tenths to four-tenths pounds per acre

in 20 to 40 gallons of water containing one-half percent surfactant. This treatment controls carelessly weed emergence after late irrigation.

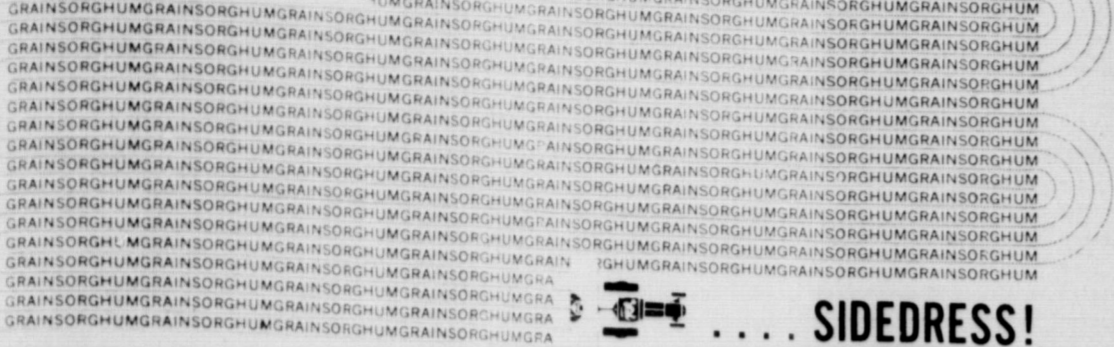
MCPA is a new herbicide that is similar to 2,4-D. However, it is somewhat safer and is less toxic to cotton. Treatment and precautions with this herbicide are the same as with 2,4-D.

Remember, time of application is the critical item with regards to post-emergence weed control in grain sorghum. Severe yield reduction can occur if sorghum is too large. Also, get better weed kill by directing the spray on smaller weeds along rather than over the sorghum.

### LAWNS:

Avoid mowing wet grass whenever possible. Dry grass cuts easier, does not ball up and clog the mower and gives a more finished appearance to the lawn.

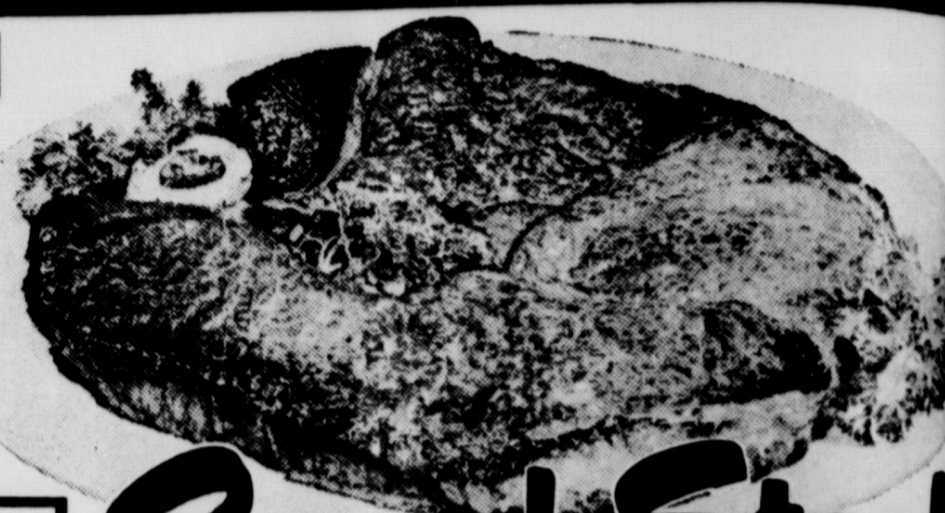

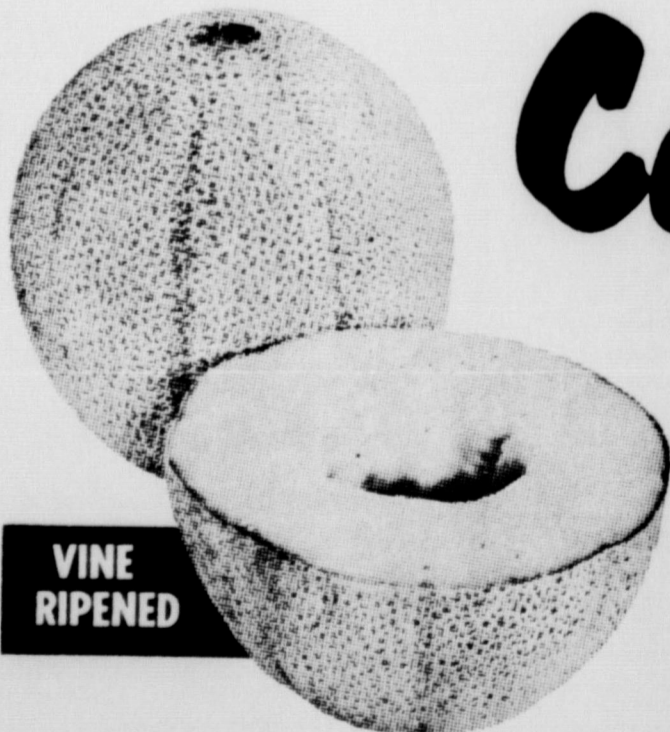
