Loans Available For Students

Due to the shortage of registered nurses, Groom Memorial Hospital is sponsoring a program to make available funds as a loan for a two year course at Amarillo College, beginning September 1, 1968





FHA NEWS

There are many low and moderate families still living in substandard housing in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts counties. This need not be the case. Housing credit from the Farmers Home Administration is now available to a broad range of families under legislation enacted in 1966. Under the expanded rural housing authorities, this three county unit has been able to provide assistance for the

following. A loan was made to a ninety-one year old Negro man to install water, a bathroom and hot water into his house. It was the first time in his life to have running water and inside bath.

A loan was made to a 72 year old woman to put on a new roof and install a bath, hot water heater and a kitchen cabinet. The loan was made so that she could make the payment from her social security and welfare income.

A loan was made to an elderly couple to install a ceptic tank and field lines instead of running the sewer into an open hole in the back yard. This loan was made in October 1967 and was paid out in full in June 1968.

are now in process to replace homes destroyed in Miami by the tornadol These are 3% disaster loans made because of undue hardships due to loss of their homes. They are ammorized within the family's ability to repay.

Loans to three families

Eight loans were made to build new homes and 24 loans to purchase existing dwellings! Oneloan was made to purchase a house, move it to a new location and improve renting of my houses and the lot and house after moving. A loan was made to build a 40 x 100 foot hay shed to store alfalfa hay. One loan was made to add

on and remodel an existing dwelling with FHA taking a second lien. Many of the houses purchased needed improvements and money was included in the loan for that purpose. This helps the conomy by providing labot for carpenters and also purchase of materials from local sources.

The total of housing loans made and now in process for the 1968 fiscal

year was 40.

The amount loaned nation wide for rural housing has increased since 1960, from about 40 million to more than half billion dollars a year. In the past seven years this has totaled \$1.5 billion and provided homes for 50,000 rural families. Losses on rural loans are less than two one-hundreths of one percent of the total loaned since the program started.

The amount loaned in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts counties for the 1968 fiscal year for 31 rural housing loans is \$260,120. There has been no losses on rural housing loans in this three county unit since the housing loan program began.

Farmers Home Administration housing loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain satisfactory credit from private lenders at reasonable rates and terms and tailored to individual needs. There is no appraisal fee. Investigate the housing loans program at the Farmers Home Administration office in Wheeler, 112 West Oklahome Street, Phone 826-4211


