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## WHEELER TO MEET DUMAS AT LOCAL BALL DIAMOND

The Wheeler American Legion is sponsoring an American Legion Baseball Team which is meeting opponents over the Panhandle Area. The Wheeler team will play its first home game Sunday. The team will meet Dumas at 2:30 p.m. at the diamond behind the American Legion building.

The Wheeler team will travel to Amarillo Saturday night to meet the Amarillo High American Legion team.

The line-up is as follows: Dickie Burton, second base; Dennis Clay, catcher; Dave Britt, right field; Donald Rives, center field; Mark Robinson, left field; Bobby Ware, first base; Frankie Rogers, third base; James Tucker, short stop; Jimmy Newman or Buddy Wood, pitcher.

Completing the squad is Ronald Rives, Keith Wood, Mike Holt, Bill Tucker, Jeff Kenney and Rodney Weatherly.

Coaches for the team are: Thurman Rives, David Britt and Pete Burton.

The team entered play June 5. They have played four games, with their first opponent being Spearman. Wheeler out-hit Spearman, 14 hits to 9 hits; however, Wheeler's fielding wasn't too good and Spearman won 16 to 8. Against Pampa, the team played a good game. Wheeler led 3 to 2, going into the sixth inning. The score at the end of the game was 8 to 3 in Pampa's favor. The game with Berger ended in Berger's favor—15 to 4. The Berger pitcher was "too much for us."

Wheeler scored one point in their game with Palo Duro. Frankie Rogers made the only run for the local team in that game. Palo Duro scored twelve points.

Coach Pete Burton had the following to say about the team in reference to the previous games. "Wheeler

has an interesting ball team. The hitting has been good and the pitching has been good at times. Donald Rives pitched a good game at Spearman and Jimmy Newman pitched 5 good innings at Berger. Newman will be the starting pitcher against Amarillo."

The team needs the support of the local people for both the home games and those played on the opponents diamond.

Home games are scheduled with Pampa, June 30; Berger, July 4; Palo Duro, July 7 and Perryton, July 14. The game with Perryton will be a double header.

Borger leads the North Zone undefeated. Canyon leads the South Zone.

A business meeting was held prior to the program. A card of thanks was read from the Shamrock Hospital. The chamber sent a spray for the opening of the hospital. A financial report was given by Inez Erwin, secretary-treasurer.

The chamber has received invitations to enter contestants in the Miss Wheat-heart of the Nation and Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation contests at Perryton and Dimmitt. The group voted to contact Nancy and Lynda

Moore, first and second runners-up in the Miss North Wheeler County contest, to see if they would be interested in entering the contests.

The progress being made by the Industrial Committee was reported by John C. Vise. The work in obtaining the feed lot is delayed due to an office move being made by the Small Business Administration. The SBA is establishing a Lubbock office and it will not be open until July 1.

John Manning reported on the Boy Scout Camp. It was reported that the camp was in need of more storage space. This needed space could be added to an existing building at a cost of between \$1500 and \$1750. The Chamber voted to undertake this project. A committee was appointed to contact everyone for donations to the project. On the committee is Wayne Edwards, Bill Brooks and Harry Wofford. The additional storage will be a concrete block structure 26' x 26'.

## PAVING, GRAVEL, DOG ORDINANCE ARE SUBJECTS OF CITY COUNCIL

The City Council met Monday evening, June 17 to transact the city's business for the month.

The council will have the area in front of the city building paved. The paving will run from the south side of the water tower, full length of the city building and 10' south of the building.

The 100 block of West Texas street has been gravelled. The heat of the past few days has brought the oil to the top of the paving and caused a lot of grievance for the merchants of that block. The city used gravel they had on hand to remedy the problem.

The council is checking into the possibility of spraying for mosquitoes. The mosquitoes are becoming a problem in many parts of town due to the rain we have been having.

A "Dog Ordinance" was passed. The ordinance gives the city the right to pick up any stray dogs which are not licensed. The dog will be kept at the pound northeast of the city for a period of two weeks. If at the end of that time the dog is not claimed, it will be destroyed in a humane way. Should the owner claim the dog, he will be charged \$1.00 for each day the dog was kept in the pound. The owner will then take the dog to the veterinarian and proof will be furnished the city that the dog has been vaccinated.

Any dog which bites a person will be kept in quarantine for a period of 15 days at the city pound. The owner will be charged \$1.00 per day.

## SWIMMING LESSONS WILL BEGIN TUESDAY, JUNE 25

Advanced beginners classes will be offered beginning from 11 to 12 p.m. for beginners from 12 years that just didn't pass the test and need instruction to be safe in the water. No Charge. These will be from 10:00 to 11:00 each weekday.

## Carter Completes Swimming Course

On June 5, we all arrived at the American National Red Cross Aquatic School in Athens, Texas, not knowing quite what to expect. We were naive, neat and under the impression that we could swim.

I was honored to be able to represent the Wheeler County Chapter of the American Red Cross at this school June 5-15.

There were a total of 52 students ranging in age 18 to approximately 40. However, most of the students were 18 - 22.

There were eleven men and five women on staff. The director of the camp was L.H. (Bud) Bradly. They were all extremely nice and would help you if you wanted, needed, or asked for help.

I took two hours of basic canoeing each day, and, at the end of the course, I was given a Small Craft Safety patch. This patch and certificate states that I know how to safely handle small craft.

I also took two hours each day of Standard First Aid instruction; but, the purpose for which I went was to get my Water Safety Instructors Certificate, which I received after many hours of work.

The camp was clean and well-arranged. You were expected to gain eight pounds while you were there, but I was lucky and lost one! You were fed a full-course meal three times daily and then given an hour to rest so your food would digest—Believe me, you were ready to rest!

suming task can be eliminated by spraying a six inch band at the base of the chain link fence with naphtha.  
 Naphtha is an inexpensive spray that kills plant tissue on contact. Care should be taken to prevent naphtha from reaching the base of trees and shrubs or from contacting the leaf surface of any desirable plants. Using a hand operated, low pressure sprayer, the grass and weeds can be controlled by applying naphtha every four to six weeks. If used before the grass becomes too large, the effect is hardly noticeable.

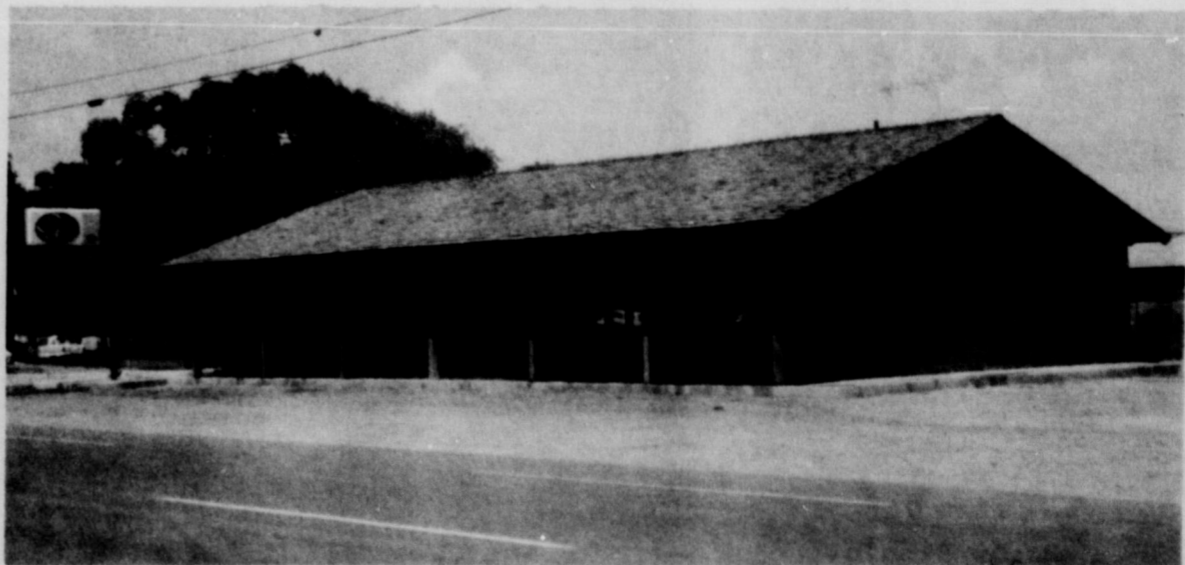
