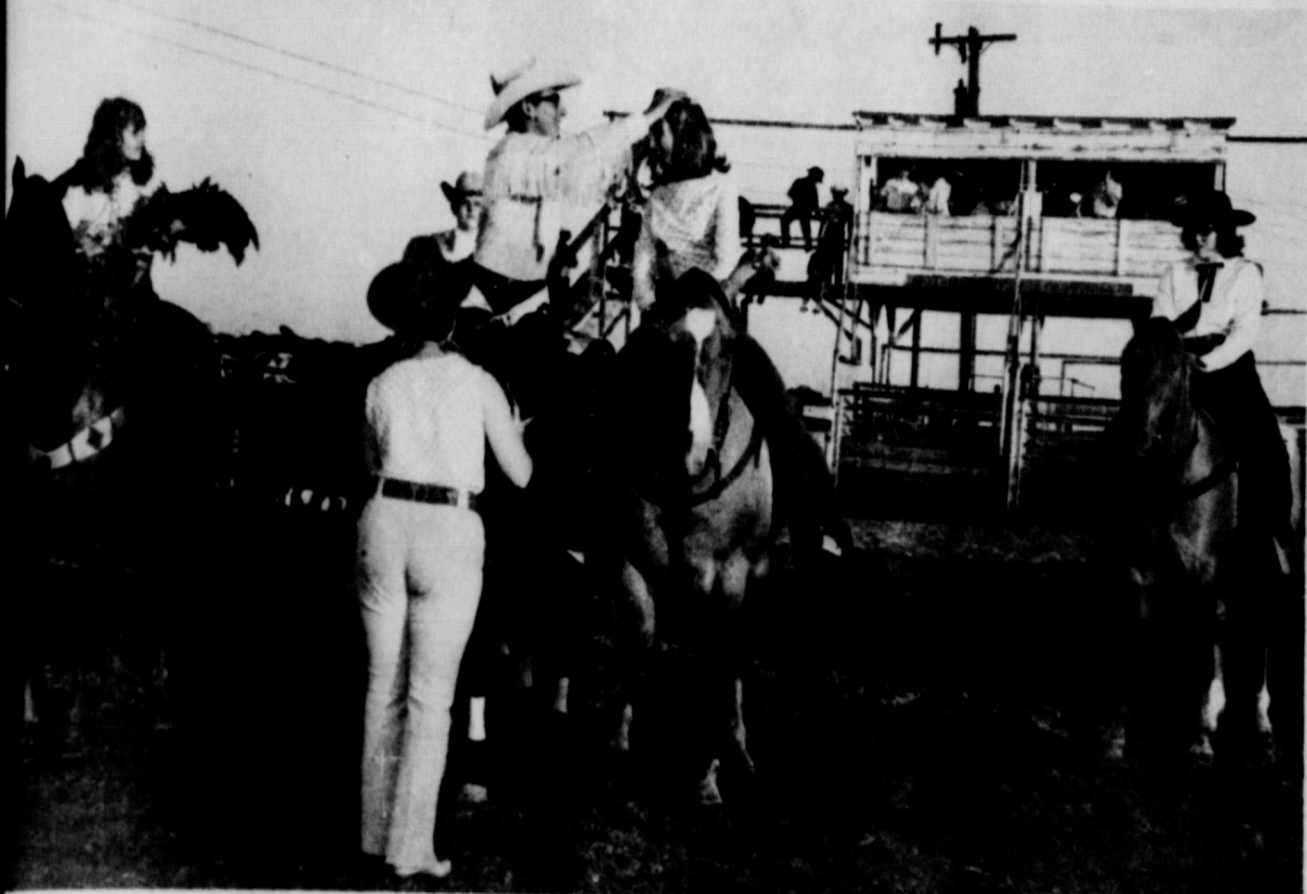
4-H TEXAN RODEO DEEMED SUCCESS GOAD, DUNN, RUSSELL ARE WINNERS

She was united in marriage March 16, 1905 at Savoy, Texas to George W. Simmons. Mrs. Simmons had lived in Wheeler County since 1926. Mr. Simmons was a Baptist Minister. He preceded her in death in 1951.

Emanuel Dubbs Marker Received

The Official Texas Historical Marker for Emanuel Dubbs will soon be erected today announced Mrs. Grady Harris of Wheeler, chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee.

The marker will be placed at the old jailhouse in old Mobeetie. Dedication plans will be announced by Mrs. Harris.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 14 x 24 inches and is sponsored by the Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee.

The inscription of the marker reads: Emanuel Dubbs (1843-1929) First County Judge in Texas Panhandle and in Wheeler County, Dubbs was born in Ohio. Came to Know Texas As A Buffalo Hunter, And Was In Famous Indian Battle of Adobe Walls, 1874. Gained Wide Respect When As Judge, He Had A Lawless U.S. Marshal Arrested. He Served 1879-1880; 1885-1890. (1968)

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5 year RAMPS Program to record, appreciate, mark, preserve and survey Texas history. More than 3,300 Official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPS program was begun in 1964.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Wheeler County with their own unique historical past.

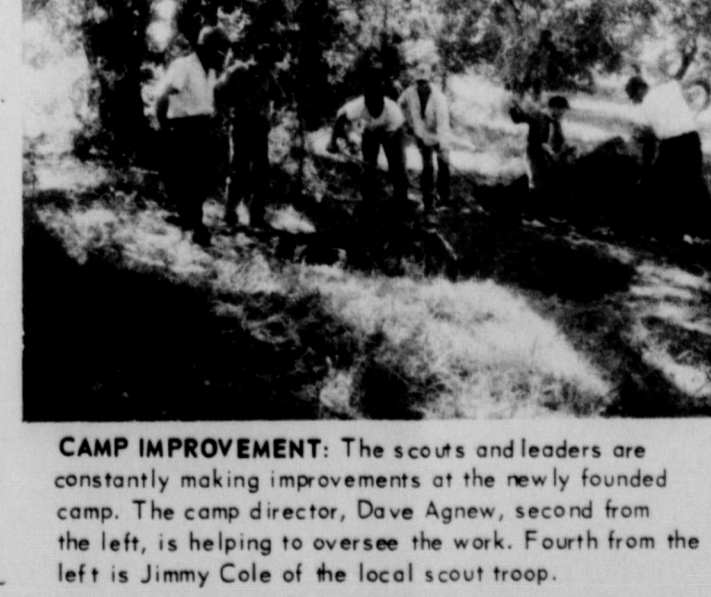

AUSTIN—As I See It

This was written last Friday so it will be a little out of date when you read it. Our big deal was on the Mini-bottle bill. I don't think it was going to pass, but after being amended several times, it passed several votes. Now the House is hashing it over whether it passes there or remains to be seen. A real tough bill that "wets" don't like it any more than the "drys." The next thing to come up is the Budget, which is in a conference committee of the House and Senate. The House bill was over \$1 billion from General Revenue and a total from all sources of over \$2 1/2 billion for the year beginning September 1. This is over \$20 million more than last year and \$1 billion above the Governor's budget, which included \$4 million for 215 highway patrolmen, which is not in the House bill. The eight Republicans are fighting to squeeze a million more out of the budget but had no luck. How many times we had 18 votes against the bill where we had only seven last year. A few fellows have said that they felt as if they were afraid not to vote. The next consideration is where to get the money. Governor's proposal consisted of a bunch of different things including the sales tax. When I heard about this, I thought that maybe it had merit. But the more I thought about it, the more I was wrong with it. Anytime they put in a substitute for the Governor's bill, which has no other changes, and for this substitute the lesser of the two bills voted against the bill with 57 others. It may seem a little silly, but it's not. I told them I would not vote for more taxes unless they do some cutting. It is

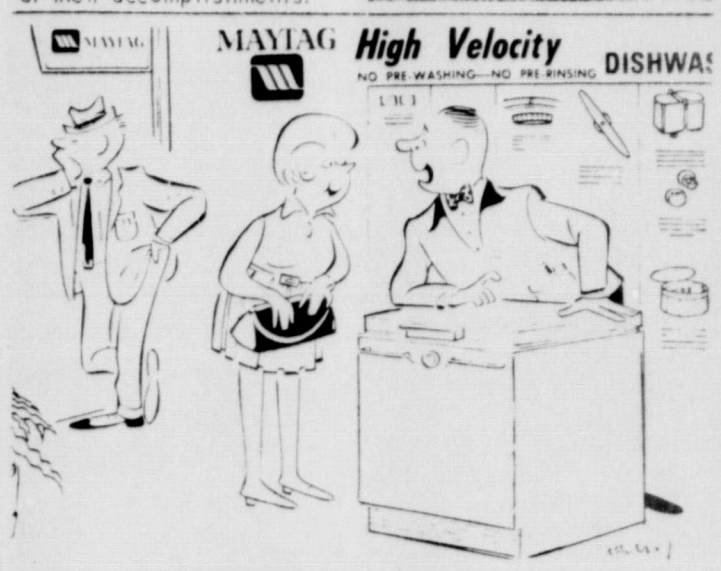

ACROSS THE FENCE

We have sort of been viewing the shinnery and brush recently at a jack rabbits eye level. Brush, in the past, was supposed to have held the snow, shaded the ground and offered protection to the wild life. The next thing folks did was to break the tradition and hired airplanes to spray the stuff. Later ranchers rode to the sale ring to buy more cattle. This radical treatment increased the range capacity from 1 to 4 times, depending on the range type and such. Range seeding, scoring and other ideas are sprouting up all over the place. Even fertilizing is being given a whirl with some of it offering a rainbow of promise. Frank Walker from Wheeler was telling us a few days ago how he had doubled the carrying capacity of some of his range. Frank Caswell, by the way is doing a bang-up renovation job on his section south of Wheeler. Other work by Grant Meek and others out Kilton way should result in a lot of grass. Technologically speaking the cowboy is a "fur piece" behind the crop farmer. Mechanization and such is taking hold of the self-styled rugged independent cowman who may have been confusing

some isolation and solitude for independence. The added investment called for in these changing times is coming at a time when the profits, if any, are a wee bit skimpy. Interest rates and complaining are both high. The message we get out of this, is that the Wheeler County cowman better get to understanding what is going on and figure where his program is going to make him some money unless he wants to find himself holding onto the end of an empty rope. All these things like production testing a lot more I haven't time to enumerate, points up to the fact that things are going to get to be mighty interesting in the next few years in the cow business. Wheat harvest is in full swing. Yields of twenty bushels or more are expected on some of our wheat. Hail damage to wheat from 11 to 23% of the expected yield has been reported. Late maize planting may be subjected to development of damaging sorghum midge populations. The critical period of potential midge damage will be around August 1 in our area. Reduction in grain yields in late blooming fields has ranged from 20 to 100 percent. Late plantings will need to be carefully watched. Those yellowing spots

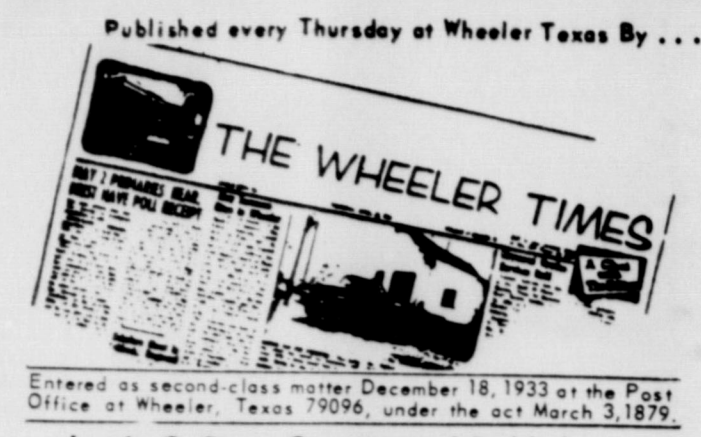
