SCREWWORMS ON THE INCREASE

Tom Puryear, county chairman of the Screwworm Eradication Program notified the "Times" this week that reported cases of screwworms are on the increase again.

The following list of facts on the screwworm situation was received by Mr. Puryear and is being printed for the benefit of livestock producers.

1. The weather—mild and wet.
2. Movement of cattle north in Mexico.
3. Inability of producers to regularly check their livestock.
4. Changes in livestock production practices and increased susceptibility.
5. Increased wildlife populations.

Present Situation:
1. Fly production at maximum—175 million per week. (Double 1963 capacity.) However, the geographical area of the barrier zone and grid drop zone quadrupled.- 2. Danger of continued spread: May force abandonment of fly drop in areas and states to the north and east of the

The thirteenth annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo will get underway Thursday, July 18. The three performances will begin at 8:00. Kicking off the rodeo will be the annual parade at 4:00, followed by the barbecue at 6:00.

Hospital Changes Collection Policy

Due to the ever increasing amount of accounts being carried for three, four and five months at a time without payment being made, Glen Rumley, Administrator at Parkview Hospital, announced this week that strict collection methods will be put to use immediately.

Rumley said that effective July 10th ALL accounts not covered by insurance, Medicare or some other Governmental or public assistance program, that goes a maximum of 60 days without payment, shall automatically be termed a delinquent account and handled accordingly.

This means that in most of these cases, the accounts will be sent to various Professional Collection agencies the Retail Credit Reporting Bureau in Shamrock and the State Credit and Control Board in Austin.

Rumley stated that he regrets that these steps will have to be taken, but the accounts now past due at the hospital are more than twice as much as the amounts received each month.

The association will be sponsoring the shortcourse in cooperation with the County Agent. The shortcourse will include the following: (1)

How To Buy (Smart Buying) with a discussion of principles and proved techniques of wise buying on the part of the businessman who resells items. (2) Personal Utilization or a discussion of the latest principles and techniques in the recruitment and administration of the most difficult resource to control - people. (3) The art of selling, outlining the fundamentals of successful selling. (4) Selling Service, including a discussion of the key points concerned with selling a

service. (5) Credit and the Customer and (6) Hiring an Employee.

All Wheeler Businessmen are encouraged to attend. Verden says that he has heard Mr. Wolf conduct a similar course before and knows it will be of benefit to our businessmen.

The shortcourse for businessmen is a new educational service to the off-farm segment of rural America provided by Texas A & M University.

ACROSS THE FENCE

Cotton is growing. Scattered rains last week boosted farmer's spirits. Wheat yields were good. Dusan Pakan made about 27 bushels to the acres and the Macina brothers, Paul and Dan say they made 20-25 bushels. Prices received were from \$1.25 to \$1.30 per bushel. In 1948, the Shamrock Texas newspaper and The Wheeler Times reported wheat selling for \$2.10 per bushel on July 17 while yields were averaging between 18 and 20 bushels. That same year farmers were asked \$2650 for a four row Massey-Harris tractor. Today that same piece of iron costs around \$10,000. At today's prices for wheat, we figure it would take twice as much land for a man to make a living out of wheat today as it would have 20 years ago.

Tonight and tomorrow night, July 11 and 12th, the Wheeler County 4-H Texan's Mounted Drill Team will be at the Rodeo de Santa Fe in Santa Fe, New Mexico performing their "Yellow Rose" Drill. Forty-four persons accompanied the 21 riders. The horses were trucked by C&H Supply. Some of the money received from the 4-H Junior Rodeo will be used to defray expenses for the trip.

Four-H horsemen from throughout the 22 Panhandle counties in Extension District 2 will vie for top honors Tuesday, July 16 at the Top O' Texas Rodeo Grounds in Pampa.

Registration of entries will begin at 8 a.m., according to Foster Whaley, Gray County agricultural agent and show superintendent. John Trimmer of Hale

Center, judge for the show, will begin placing entries in the halter classes at 9 a.m.

Performance classes will follow and these are scheduled in Western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing.

The top 20 contestants from the district-wide show will be eligible to compete in the State 4-H Horse Show which is slated for August 8, 9 and 10th in Fort Worth, says Whaley. The state finalists will be selected on the basis of points earned. Ten Wheeler County 4-Hers qualified in the County Horse Show and we'll be reporting results next week.

An amendment to the agricultural hazardous-occupancy order to permit the employment of 14 and 15 year-olds to drive tractors and operate other farm machinery has been announced by U. S. Secretary of Labor Willard Wirtz.

The change was effective June 6 and allows the hiring of these minors only after they have completed formal training in the safe use of such farm equipment. Written and practical tests will be given.

The training program will be operated through the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Federal Extension Service and its cooperative units which in Texas is the Agricultural Extension Service.

Under the amendment, farm employers hiring the 14 and 15 year old workers to drive tractors and operate certain other farm equipment, will be required to:

- Instruct the minor employees on the safe and proper operation of the specific equipment they will use.
- Check on the youth at least three times a day, mid-morning, noon and mid-afternoon to see that they are following proper safety pro-

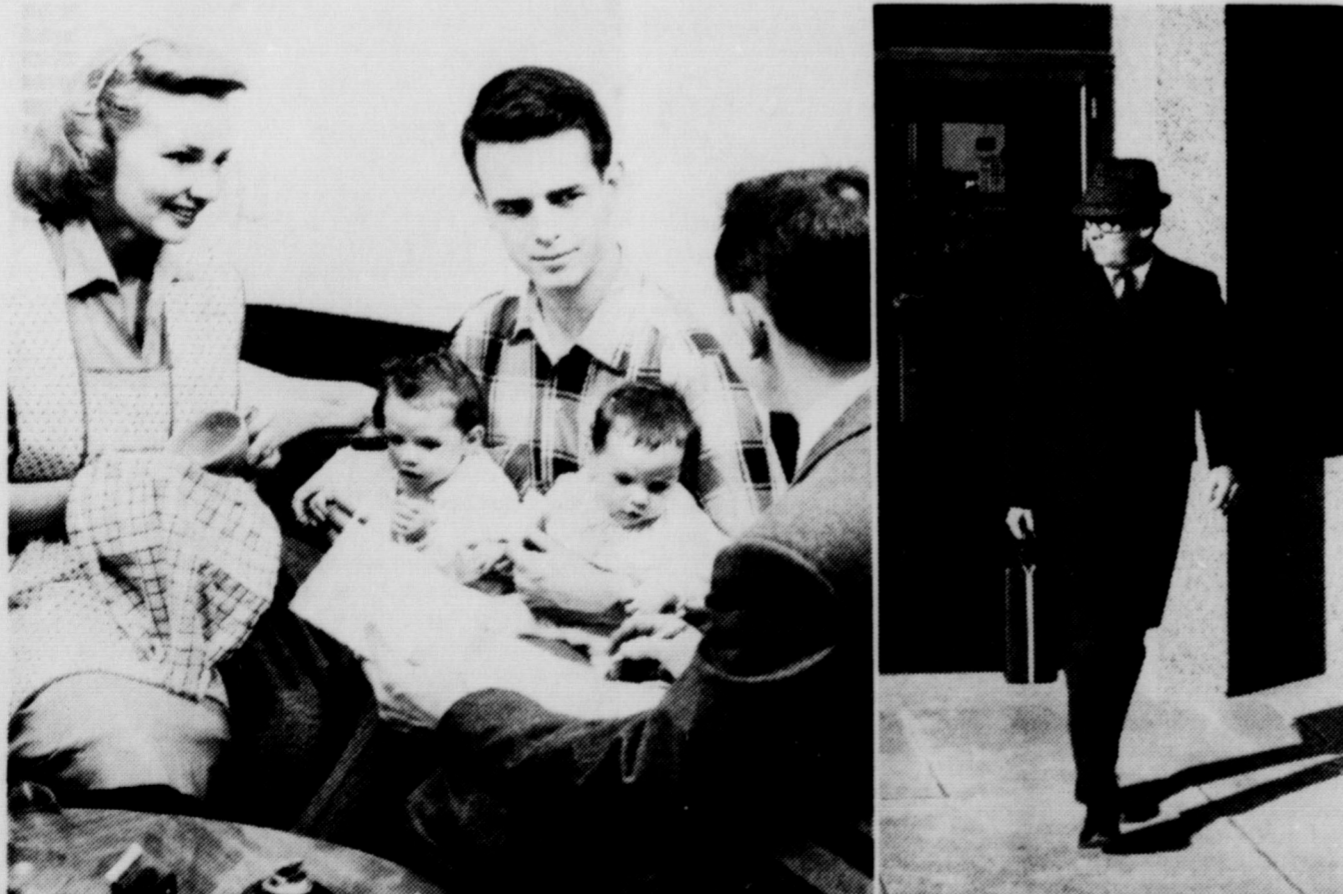

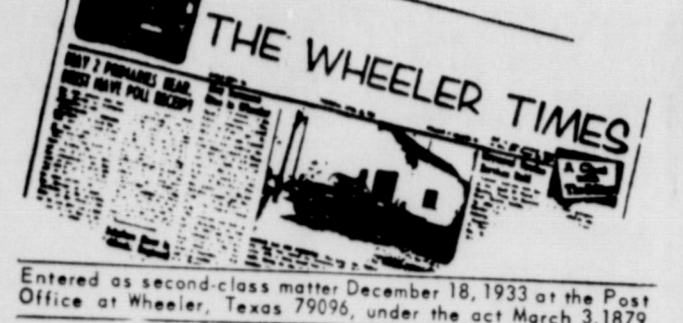

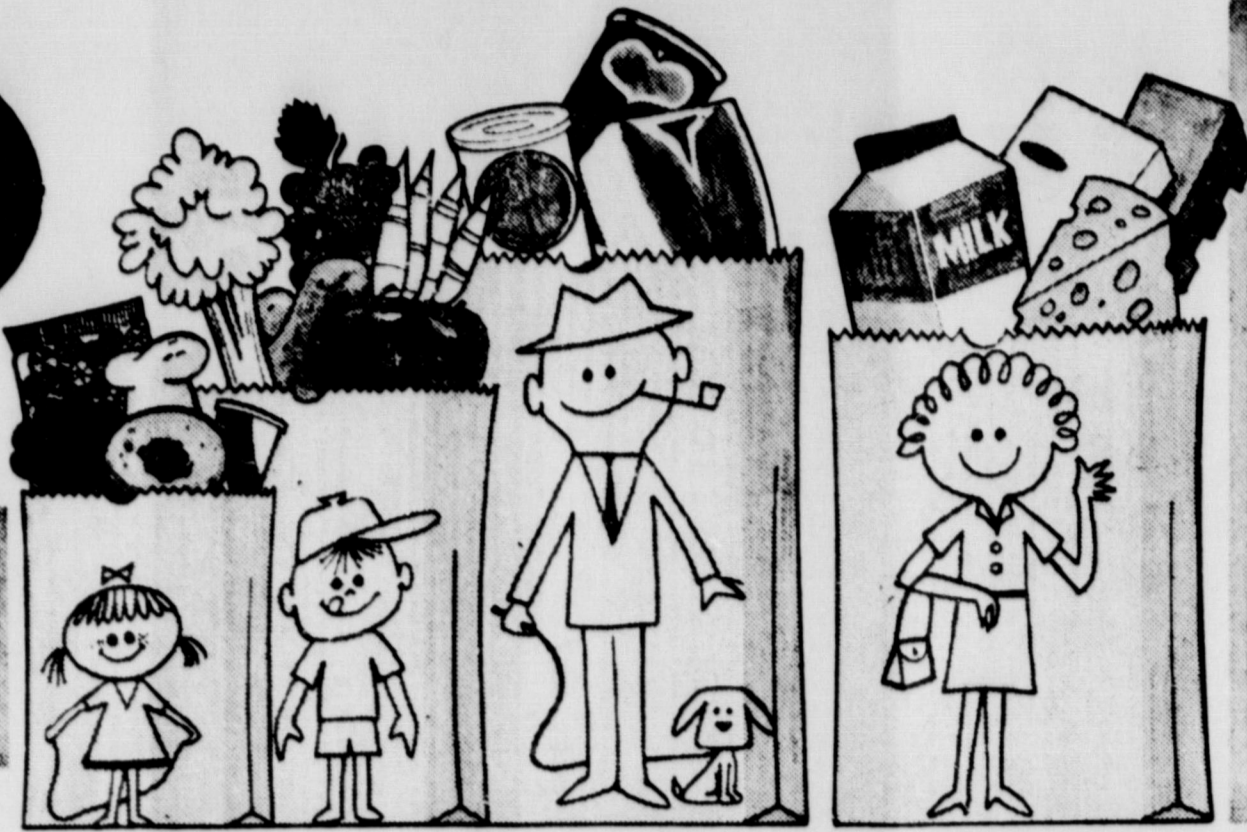
