Pair Injured In Irrigation Mishap

Tom 'Buddy' Stribling and Roy Lynn Stribling are being treated at Parkview Hospital for burns they received when an irrigation pipe came in contact with a 13,000 volt high line wire. The boys were moving irrigation pipe on the Lee Ranch, east of Mobeetie, Monday.

The boys had disconnected the pipe to move. A pack rat ran into the pipe. When they picked the pipe up to get the rat out, the wind caught the pipe and blew it into the wires.

The boys immediately let go of the pipe, but Roy Lynn was still holding it with his feet. They were both knocked unconscious for a short time.

Buddy had recently been in the hospital in Amarillo. His roommate at the hospital was undergoing skin grafts which resulted from a very similar accident. His knowledge of his roommate's accident is what kept the incident from being worse.

Farm Safety Week

County Judge G. W. Heflev proclaimed July 21-17 1968 as FARM SAFETY WEEK Wheeler County are proud of n Wheeler County, at the request of John F. Daberry. Farm Bureau President. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

The county farm leader said the accidental death rate for farm residents is steadily increasing.

"If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Daberry continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in this country today; but added, many of the present losses could be prevented with the use of safety tools such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, SMV (Slow Moving Vehicle) emblems and tractor roll.

In hisproclamation, Judge Hefley said "the citizens of our farm families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and wellbeing of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing and commodities needed by the entire population.

Theproclamation said the week-long special safety campaign is a coordinated effort by Farm Bureau and various local and state agricultural and safety groups.

The Judge urged farm families "to become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK but every day of the year.

does not improve meast so it is important to select good wuality, government inspected products. Look for the U.S. Prime, Choice or Good Grades.

If you are butchering beef or lamb, remember aging improves the tenderness and flavor. Age a 300 pound call carcass at least six to seven days at a uniform temperature of 37 to 40 degrees F. Let choice 500 or 600 pound carcass' hang at least ten days or two weeks. Age Lamb no longer than seven days.

Cut meat according to best improved methods. Boneless cuts save freezer space. But it is best not to bone steaks, chops, short ribs and legs of lamb.

Freeze the size package required for a meal. Thawing and refreezing lowers the quality of a product. Cut poultry into serving pieces to save space and add con-

Prepackaged self-service neats may be stored in the freezer for one to two weeks in the well-sealed store package. For longer freezer storage, overwrap or rewrap with special freezer material.

Meats should be wrapped tightly-in moisture-vapor-resis tant material to prevent discoloration of the skin and flesh by drying. At low temperature, air is very dry and will absorb moisture from improperly packaged food leaving it dry. Known as freezer burn, this condition leaves the meat dry, tough and less flavorful.

Crayon or China or felt tipped marking pencils work well to label packages with the name of the product and date packaged.

Fish should be frozen mmediately after the catch because it deteriorates rapidly. If this is not possible, pack in ice until it can be dressed. Prepare for cooking: remove fins, heat, tail, entrails and scales. Wash and dip fish in a salt solution of one cup salt to one gallon of water for one minute. Then wrap the fish tightly in moisture-vapor-proof material and freeze immediately. To freeze shrimp, remove the heads and dark vein. Pack as soon as possible. Wash the shrimp in salt water (Two tablespoons for one quart cold water.) Drain thoroughly and package and freeze immediately.

You may cook frozen with or without thawing. When meat is completely or partially thawed, it is cooked as fresh meat, says the specialist at Texas A&M University. If frozen solid, roasts require about one and a half times as long to cook as they otherwise would.

Stewing or braising meats may not have to be cooked as long as usual because of the tenderizing effect of free zing.
