Farm Safety Week

County Judge G. W. Heffley proclaimed July 21-27, 1968 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Wheeler County, at the request of John F. Daberry, Farm Bureau President.

The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

The county farm leader said the accidental death rate for farm residents is steadily increasing.

"If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Daberry continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in this country today; but added, many of the present losses could be prevented with the use of safety tools such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, SMV (Slow Moving Vehicle) emblems and tractor roll-overs.

"The proclamation said the week-long special safety campaign is a coordinated effort by Farm Bureau and various local and state agricultural and safety groups.

The Judge urged farm families "to become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK but every day of the year."

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated the same period as FARM SAFETY WEEK nationally and in Texas.

In his proclamation Judge Heffley said "the citizens of Wheeler County are proud of our farm families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing and commodities needed by the entire population."

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PROCLAMATION

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:
I, G. W. Heffley, County Judge of Wheeler County, do hereby declare the week of July 21-27, 1968, as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Wheeler County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the citizens of Wheeler County are proud of our farm families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing the commodities needed by the entire population; and

WHEREAS, farm and ranch accidents continue to take more lives annually and cause painful disabling injuries; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have proclaimed the same period as FARM SAFETY WEEK; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas 4-H Clubs, Texas Future Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Keep Your Guard Up - Stop Accidents"; and

WHEREAS, such a campaign will do much to call to the attention of our rural citizens the need for observing safety precautions which would reduce the tragic toll inflicted by accidents;

THE THEREFORE, I urge all citizens to recognize this special period, and especially urge farm families of Wheeler County to become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK, but every day of the year.

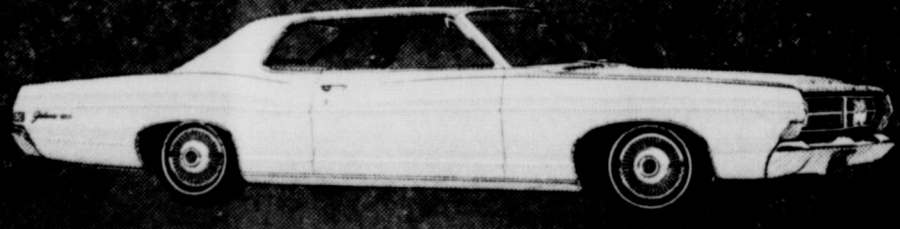

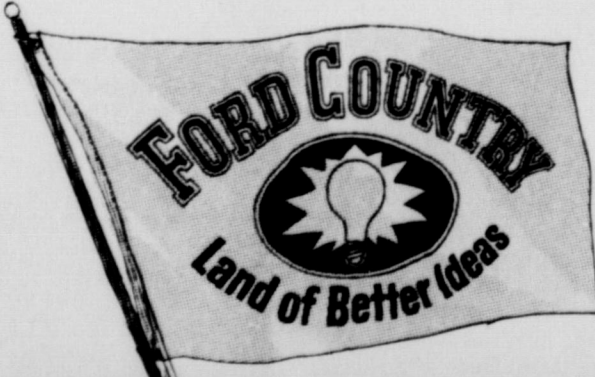

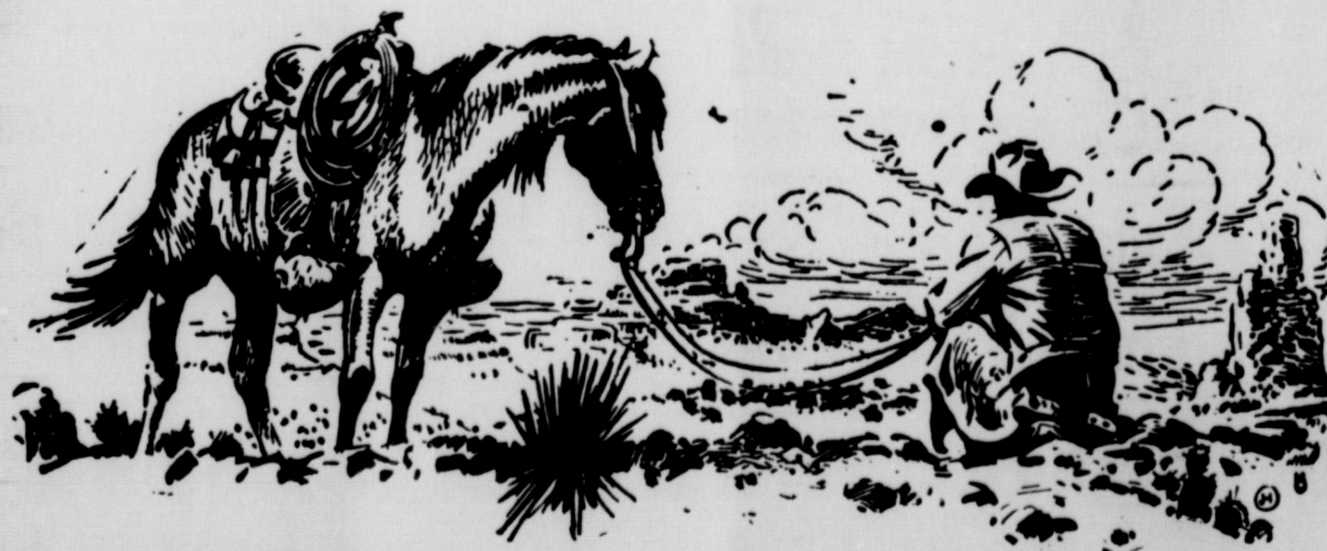

FILLING YOUR FREEZER

By Brenda W. Hofmann
Although meat, poultry and fish are available year around there are times when they are more plentiful and cheaper. Take advantage of these times to stock your freezer.

These frozen products equal the fresh items in nutritive value, original flavor and color of properly pack-

aged and frozen. Freezing does not improve meat so it is important to select good quality, government inspected products. Look for the U.S. Prime, Choice or Good Grades.

If you are butchering beef or lamb, remember aging improves the tenderness and flavor. Age a 300 pound carcass at least six to seven days at a uniform temperature of 37 to 40 degrees F. Let choice 500 or 600 pound carcass hang at least ten days or two weeks. Age Lamb no longer than seven days.

Cut meat according to best improved methods. Boneless cuts save freezer space. But it is best not to bone steaks, chops, short ribs and legs of lamb.

Freeze the size package required for a meal. Thawing and refreezing lowers the quality of a product. Cut poultry into serving pieces to save space and add convenience.

Prepackaged self-service meats may be stored in the freezer for one to two weeks in the well-sealed store package. For longer freezer storage, overwrap or rewrap with special freezer material.

Meats should be wrapped tightly in moisture-vapor-resistant material to prevent discoloration of the skin and flesh by drying. At low temperature, air is very dry and will absorb moisture from improperly packaged food leaving it dry. Known as freezer burn, this condition leaves the meat dry, tough and less flavorful.

Crayon or China or felt tipped marking pencils work well to label packages with the name of the product and date packaged.

Fish should be frozen immediately after the catch because it deteriorates rapidly. If this is not possible, pack in ice until it can be frozen. Prepare for cooking; remove fins, head, tail, entrails and scales. Wash and dip fish in a salt solution of one cup salt to one gallon of water for one minute. Then wrap the fish tightly in moisture-vapor-proof material and freeze immediately. To freeze shrimp, remove the heads and dark vein. Pack as soon as possible. Wash the shrimp in salt water (Two tablespoons for one quart cold water.) Drain thoroughly and package and freeze immediately.

You may cook frozen with or without thawing. When meat is completely or partially thawed, it is cooked as fresh meat, says the specialist at Texas A&M University. If frozen solid, roasts require about one and a half times as long to cook as they otherwise would.

Stewing or braising meats may not have to be cooked as long as usual because of the tenderizing effect of freezing.

Storage Table for High Quality Home-Frozen Meats and Poultry at 0 degrees F.
Beef - 6-12 months; Lamb and Veal - 6-9 months; fresh Pork - 3-6 months; Sausage and ground meat - 1-3 months; Cooked meat or poultry not covered with gravy or other sauces - 1 month; Meat Sandwiches - 1 month; Chickens - 12 months; Turkeys - 6 months; Cooked poultry meat covered with broth or gravy - 6 months; and Cooked poultry dishes - 3-6 months.

These products will be safe to eat if stored for longer periods of time, but may lose some of their high quality.

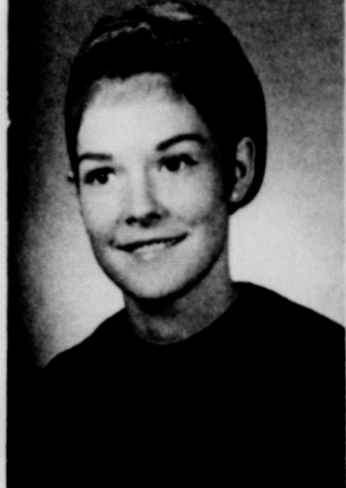

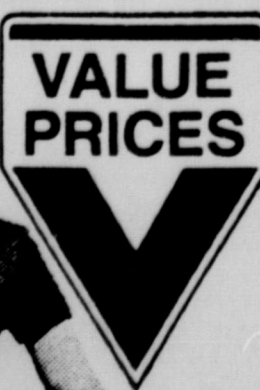
