OKLA. AUTHORITIES ASK AID OF CO. SHERIFF'S DEPT. IN TWO SEPARATE 'HUNTS'

The Wheeler Sheriff's Department has been called to help with two "manhunts" the past few days. The first call came in Thursday; two men had escaped from the Granite Reformatory and were being sought in the Erick area. The County Sheriff's department received a call from the Oklahoma authorities Tuesday night to help with the capture of a Reydson man in connection with the murder of a Reydson youth.

Sheriff Bus Dorman received a radio call at 9:10 Tuesday evening asking aid in the capture of a Reydson man thought headed toward Allison. Dorman left immediately for Allison. Shortly after Dorman pulled onto a side-street in Allison, the suspect came through town. The man was arrested near

the high school. Arrested was David Hershal Sanford, 44, of Reydson. Killed was Sheldon Carry, 19 of Reydson.

The murder evolves around a pool game and a dollar. Sanford and Carry were engaged in a game of pool; an argument erupted. Sanford went to his car to leave. Carry followed Sanford to the car and stuck his head in the car threatening Sanford. Sanford picked up a 22 automatic pistol and shot Carry.

Following the arrest, Sanford was brought to Wheeler. He was warned of his rights by District Judge Grainger McIlhenny and Justice of the Peace Dick Guynes. A fugitive warrant was filed against Sanford at 12:00 midnight and he was denied bond. Sanford signed a waiver

to be taken back to Oklahoma and was picked up by the Oklahoma Authorities at 1:30 A. M.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's department aided Thursday, Friday and Saturday in the search for two refugees from the Granite Reformatory. The pair had stolen a car near Mangum. The auto was abandoned six miles south of Erick and the youths "took off" in different directions.

One of the escapees was captured Friday morning near Erick. The search for the second man moved to Wheeler County with his being seen near the Carbon Black Plant near Shamrock. Several persons reported seeing the man and accurately described the hunted man. The search was called off Saturday night without results.

LIFE-LONG RESIDENT EFFIE SIMS DIES AT 77

Effie Margaret Sims, 77, passed away in Parkview Hospital Monday, August 12, 1968.

Mrs. Sims had been ill for some time. She was born in Wheeler County on the Sweetwater Creek Ranch, February 2, 1891 of her father, Fred Herman Rathjen. Her mother was Sophie Kohrs Rathjen.

The ranch was started by her father, Fred Rathjen in 1879 and was one of the first ranches established in the Texas Panhandle. Mrs. Rathjen braved the unsettled area as Mr. Rathjen's wife coming from New York City in 1884 to begin housekeeping in an adobe house. Mrs. Sims attended the Rock School near the ranch which was established in 1884 by her father and adjoining neighbors. She later taught at the Rock School. She attended a business college in Tyler, Texas. She was married to Douglas Goode Sims, October 1, 1913 at Canadian, Texas. She was a member of the First Methodist Church of Mobeetie.

Surviving are her husband, Doug Sims; two daughters:

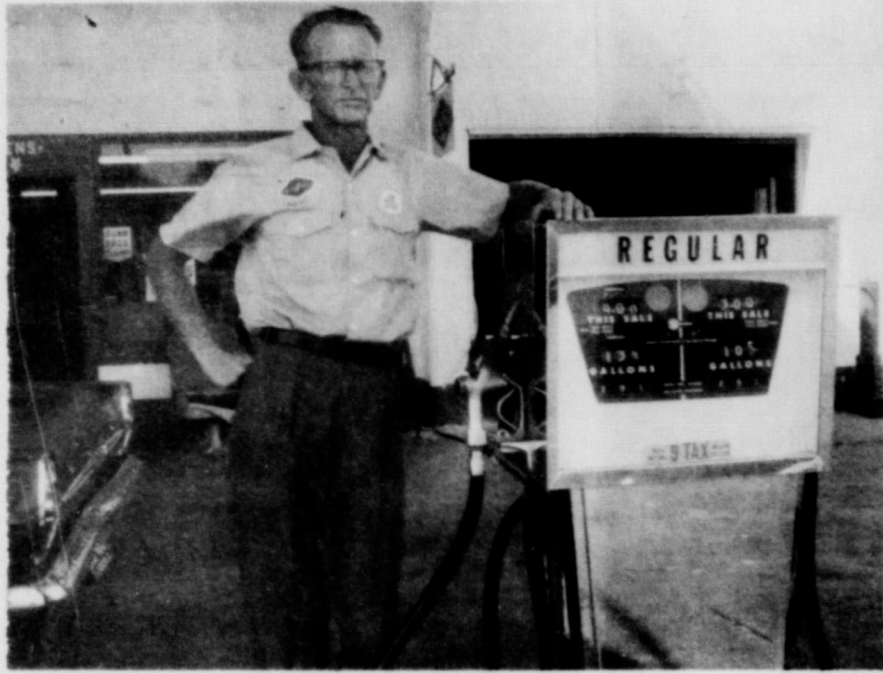

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Privacy and the Census

During the last federal census, a disgruntled citizen decided the government was getting altogether too nosy. So he refused to answer certain questions, calling them an invasion of his privacy and an "unreasonable search and seizure" forbidden by the Constitution.
But in a test case, the court held the questions within the proper scope of governmental curiosity.
"The authority to gather reliable statistical data reasonably related to governmental functions is a necessity," said the court, "if modern government is to legislate intelligently."
By and large, the taking of the census (itself authorized by the Constitution) has not run into serious opposition.
One big reason, no doubt, is that personal information is kept confidential—as a kind of compensation to the citizen for accepting a little prying into his private life. Federal law specifically provides that census information about any individual may not be disclosed "to his detriment."
What does this mean? In one case, an insurance company refused to pay a man's claim because it suspected he had lied about his age on the application form.
"To double check," the company told him, "we would like to see what age you gave to the census taker."
However, in a court hearing, the insurance company was denied access to the census records. The court pointed out that the desired information might indeed be to the man's detriment — and therefore could not be released without his consent.
That doesn't mean general statistics cannot be used, merely because they are unpalatable to some individuals. Thus:
A city wanted to use census figures to classify a certain block as a "blighted area." Property owners objected that this was using census information "to our detriment."
But the court overruled their objection, because this was not personal information but simply the statistical profile of a neighborhood.
Over the years, such statistics have become a valuable source of guidance not only for government but also for business, for agriculture, and even for individuals. After all, without the census, how could girls find out what sections of the country have the greatest concentrations of eligible young men?
And vice versa.

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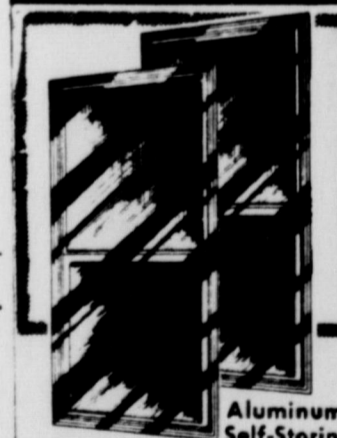
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INDOOR-OUTDOOR CARPET

By Brenda Hofmann, CHDA
The relatively new indoor-outdoor carpet already has a new twist-bulked yarn to give plush, more luxurious carpet. Indoor-outdoor carpeting, in the past, has been a little on the stiff side. The bulked yarn has softened the surface, yet it wears like stiffer finished. The carpeting is easy to care for, highly stain resistant and resistant to mildew and rot. It has good acoustical properties, low static build-up and low moisture absorbercy.

There are other new indoor-outdoor developments underfoot. Patterned carpets are coming on the scene for more decorator versatility. These carpets with special barriers to keep moisture through, are especially good for use over wood.

Two basic types of indoor-outdoor carpeting are woven or non-woven. The woven carpet is textured and in cut-pile, much like other carpeting. In the nonwoven or felted construction, the carpet is somewhat like resilient floor covering. Generally, the felted types are cheaper. Aside from the price, there is no general advantage of one type over the other. Another version of the non-wovens is carpet tile. The tiles are 12 inch squares with soft rubber backs for use indoors or out. Sharp objects such as cleats on shoes can damage the non-woven. If some repair work is needed, then you could replace a few tiles and not the entire carpet.

The manufacturers of indoor-outdoor claim it will hold up for a long time in or out of the weather; on boards, cement, brick or even bare ground. According to extremely rigorous tests conducted by independent testers, the manufacturers do not exaggerate. In tests it was found to have good bursting strength (important if the carpet is laid over holes or pebbles outdoors). It was not resistant and resistant to shrinkage. It provided good footing dry or wet. Water did not affect the carpet in any way. Some did tend to hold water, as a towel does. Think twice about laying one of these on an outdoor porch with a wood floor; the dampness could accelerate the rotting of wood. On a cement floor a carpet will remain damp for a couple of days after a rain. If the carpet will be exposed to moisture be sure the check the backing. If the backing is not a synthetic fiber also, it could rot from moisture trapped underneath.

The stains that were left came off quite easily when washed with clear water or diluted detergent, even 25 hours after the spill. Lipstick turned out to be tougher than most staining agents, but a grease solvent, even when used lightly, got rid of it quickly and should work well on most other greasy or oily stains. Ordinary dirt washes off easily and can be hosed down outdoors. Or, it can be vacuumed like any other carpet. The right care will keep indoor-outdoor carpet in its prime longer. This type of carpet is highly resistant to stains, but some foods, when allowed to set or to be ground into the carpet can cause trouble. Take care with cigarette ashes. The synthetic fibers of the carpet aren't likely to catch fire, but the heat from the ashes could leave a melt mark.

Two additional advantages of the indoor-outdoor carpet are cost and ease of installation. It is the cheaper type of carpet available—starting at \$5 a square yard. Installation is easy since the carpet can be cut with a knife, razor blade or scissors. It is important to cut to size very carefully since the material can't be stretched. The felt types do not need binding, but the tufted types should be bound to prevent raveling. When buying indoor-outdoor carpet be sure and get specific care instructions for stain removal and general upkeep. Then follow them.

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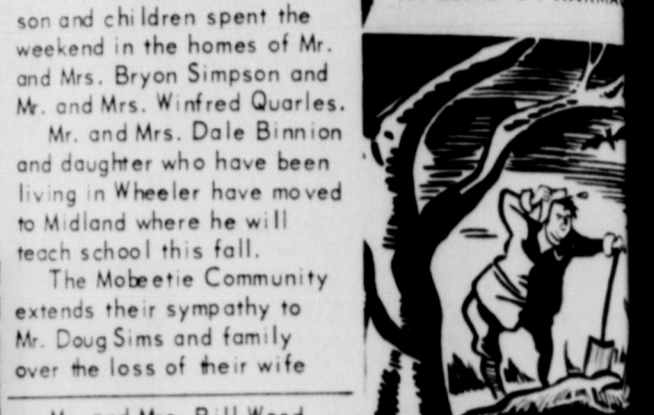

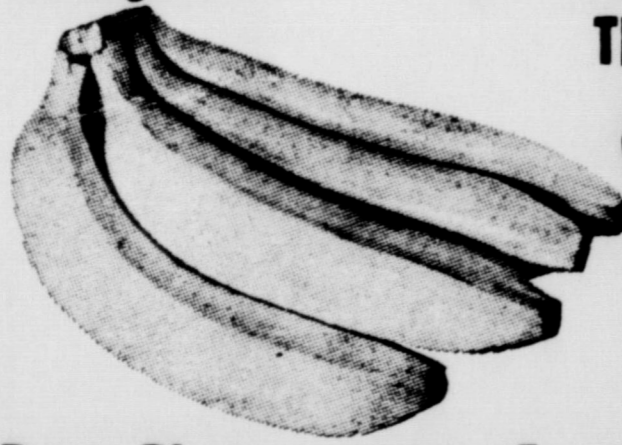
