Soil Conservation

Most of Wheeler County has received some pretty good rains in the last few weeks and the crops in general look very good. Grass as well seems to be holding up pretty well. For this good prospect for good crops we are thankful.

During the last few weeks there has been some activity among farmers and ranchers that are interested in protecting their soil from erosion. Mark Arrington, southwest of Mobeetie, is constructing a stock water pond. This pond will help distribute grazing which will help to obtain better range management. Coy Revisus is also in the process of constructing a stock water pond on his place near Wheeler.

R. J. Smith is constructing a water way on his place in the east edge of Wheeler. This water way is designed to handle runoff from rainfall at a safe velocity so no erosion or gullying will take place.

T. B. Killingsworth near Kelton is constructing a system of standard terraces. E. O. Kelly is also constructing a system of standard terraces on his place near Allison. It was necessary to install some diversion terraces on this place as there was some problem with outside water.

Soil Conservation Service technicians have been working on a topographic map for John Morris, whose farm is near Lela. From this map waterways, diversions and parallel terraces can be planned that will control erosion on his farm. He plans to get started on this work this winter.

Don't forget to contact the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District if you have an erosion problem. In many instances cost share may be obtained through the ASCS office or the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Budget Hearing For W. School

The Wheeler Independent School District, Board of Education, met in special session Tuesday, August 27, 1968 at 8:00 P. M. to consider and approve the School Budget for 1968-69 as presented by Superintendent, Stanley Jagers.

The Amendment to the 1967-68 School Budget was also approved as presented.

At the end of the current 1967-68 School fiscal year there is a \$12,600.00 deficit in school operating funds. Taking this fact into consideration and after careful consideration of budget needs for the 1968-69 school year, a 20¢ tax increase was found to be necessary. The increase will raise the school tax rate from \$1.25 to \$1.45.

This action was taken by the Board of Education after all other possible solutions had been thoroughly considered and discussed.

The School Budget for 1968-69 would have ended with at least a \$10,000.00 deficit, if the tax rate had remained at \$1.25. This would cause a deficit of about \$20,000.00 to accumulate by the end of the 1968-69 fiscal year.

Correction

In the story on the City Council Meeting last week, we stated the local swimming pool was completed in 1959 at a cost of \$16,000. The overall cost of the pool and building was about \$38,000. The \$16,000 was the amount of money borrowed by the City for the construction of the pool and buildings.

Wheat Planting Time Near

Wheat planting time is just around the corner. A lot of farmers are debating on whether we can afford to grow dryland wheat. Most folks will probably agree that we can, using certificates on our domestic allotment.

However this certificate is paid at parity on 40 percent of our allotment. The remaining 60 percent, called export wheat, is cheap and we question whether we can compete on the world market with it.

If we add 53¢ in certificate payments, we will have \$1.80 wheat. We can make some money on \$1.80 wheat. We can't however, make any money on \$1.25 wheat.

Marketing maize - maize harvest time is nearing. We would like to suggest that the best market for \$1.60 maize is through hogs. Prices have been good on hogs recently. However, the old saying still prevails that "cheap feed is forerunner of cheap livestock."

Every two years a state conference for all agricultural Extension Service employees is held on the campus of Texas A&M University. This year the date is August 26-30. Both the Home Demonstration Agent and myself will be out of our offices this week, but the office secretary will keep the office open. The announced theme for the conference is "Working Toward Perfection in Extension Educational Programs."

We'll have an opportunity to participate in programs covering major subject matter areas. These programs were planned to present new information in the various fields. The week spent at A&M is a part of our continuing professional improvement program aimed at making the work of every Extension employee more efficient and productive.

Insect Picture in Maize: Greenbug - Heavy infestation of the greenbug continues to damage maize in the county. Considerable chemical control is being carried out against the bugs, however, shortages of Methyl parathion and other chemicals has hampered control efforts. Those farmers who have sprayed, had excellent control.

Sorghum Midge: Late sorghum is being infested by the sorghum midge. The adult midge is an orange colored fly. Tiny, headless, grayish-to-red larvae bore into and destroy grain. A lot of producers with late maize have asked "how much damage in dollars and cents does the midge cost us?" Research data as late as 1966 revealed that maize sprayed in the boot to the fully emerged from

Pampa Youth Charged With Rape Of Wheeler Woman

A 20 year old Pampa man was charged Monday with raping a 21 year old Wheeler woman early Saturday morning on a dirt road near Wheeler.

Alvin D. Robbins was placed under \$2500 bond following arraignment before Justice of the Peace Ed Anderson of Pampa.

According to County Sheriff BusDorman, the victim was sitting in her car on Texas street in front of a building where a dance was in progress. Robbins climbed into the drivers seat and drove the victim out of town, where the incident occurred.

"Robbins bond would have been \$5,000 had he been brought before a Wheeler Justice of the Peace," stated Dorman.

Robbins is free on bond and is awaiting grand jury action in Wheeler County. The case will go before the grand jury Wednesday, September 4 at 10:00 A. m.

Boys Ranch Rodeo Dates

A new attendance record is expected at the 24th annual Cal Farley's Boys Ranch Rodeo over the Labor Day weekend.

Last year over 9,000 people turned out to see almost 100 Boys Ranchers perform in what is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys are the contestants riding professional rodeo stock under RCA rules.

Each of the 348 boys who live at the Ranch will have a part in the rodeo with those who do not ride serving as parking attendants, helping at the chutes, selling soda pop and popcorn or helping to prepare the giant-sized barbecue beef sandwiches which will be offered to visitors who arrive early to picnic for only \$1.00.

The rodeo will feature calif riding, brahma bull riding and a bare-back bronc event, with boys competing for awards within their own age groups. A special stick-horse race will be featured for the 4 to 6 year old boys. The highlight of the rodeo will be the presentation of the Junior and Senior All-Round Cowboy trophies.

Tickets for the two rodeo performances, at 2:30 on Sunday and Monday, September 1st and 2nd may be obtained in advance from the Boys Ranch office, Box 1890 Amarillo, Texas, or by calling 374-4687. Box seats are \$2.50; general admission is \$1.50 and children and servicemen in uniform will be admitted for 75¢.

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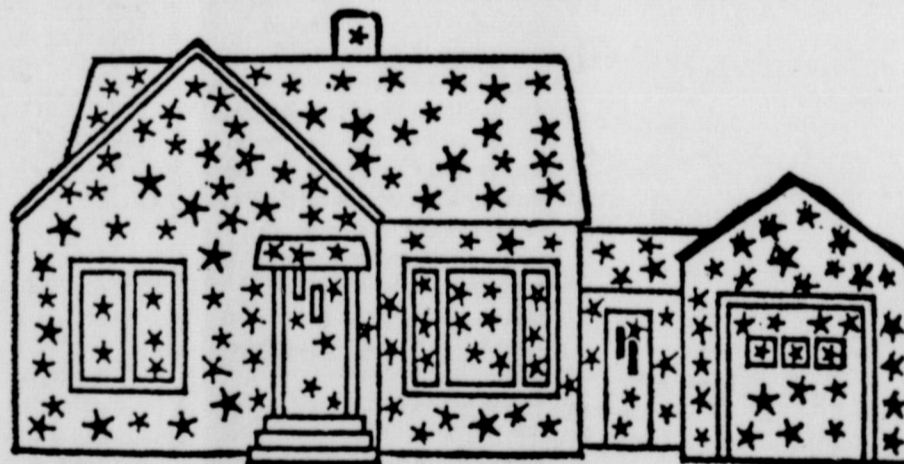

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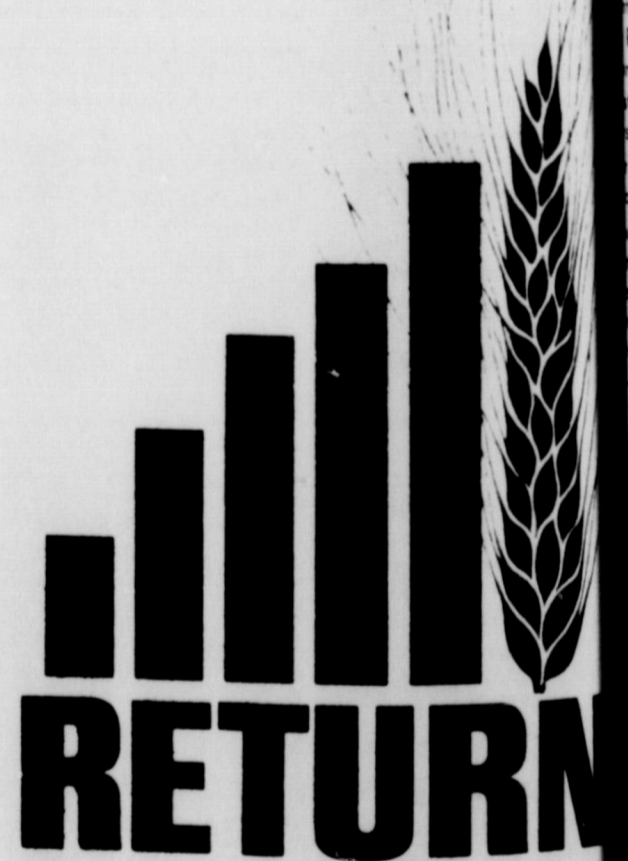

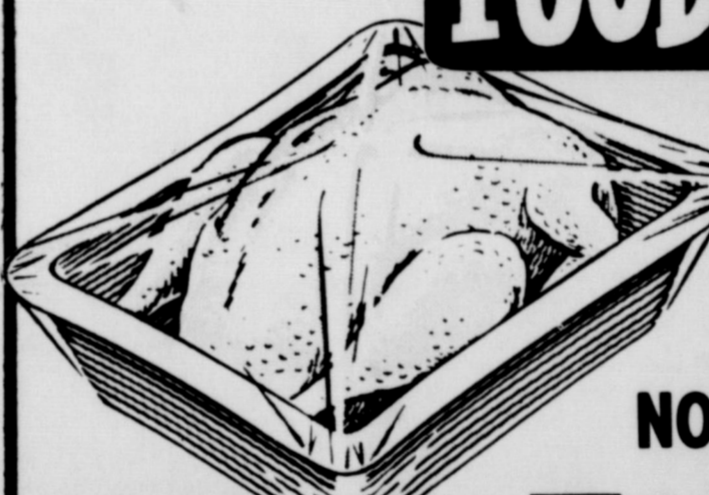
