A film, "The Elusive Enemy," will show through time-lapse photography the actual invasion of TB germs into body cells while antibodies fight the killer germs.

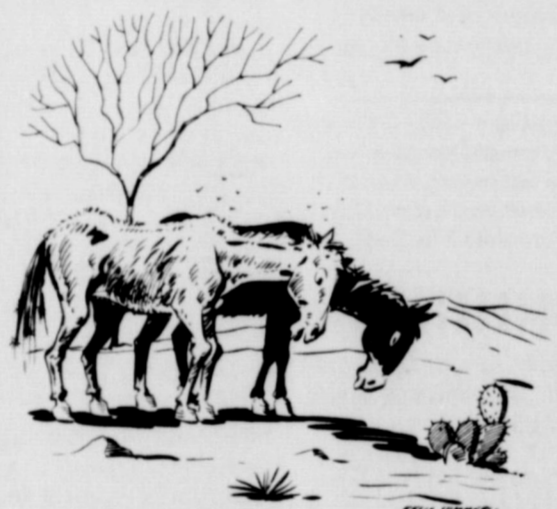

"Poor range management doesn't make horse sense!"

RANGE MANAGEMENT: Range Management is the "proper" use of grass and other forage eaten by livestock to insure the growth and productivity of those plants. We usually think of native grasses when range management is mentioned. These are perennial plants and each plant must depend on that plant's reproduction for existence. For nearly all perennial plants this comes from a portion of the root just below the ground. It depends on the food stored in that area from last year's leaf growth. If the grass was grazed heavily last year, the food storage supply is very short or not there at all. The plant is severely injured. As better plants are grazed out, the poor plants come in. The guide for maintaining the best grasses and getting top production is to graze half and leave half. For further information, contact personnel at the SCS Office in Wheeler.

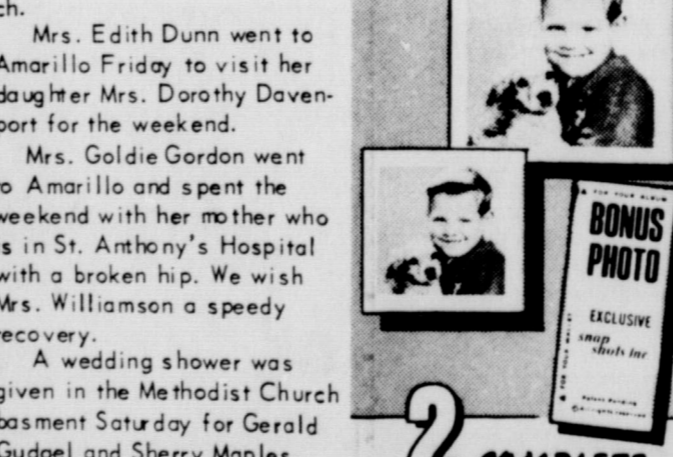

ERMELO WEEPING LOVEGRASS

Verbon Smith, who farms four miles southeast of Wheeler, Texas is shown in an excellent stand of Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass. This was seeded in May, 1967 following rye that had been swept. He is showing here that the leaf growth is 36 to 40 inches. Smith says, "At the rate it's going, this weeping lovegrass will graze five times as much as did my soil bank land." The "soilbank" land was a mixture of sand lovegrass and common perennial invading grasses such as needlegrass, red lovegrass, yucca, and sand-palm etc. Weeping lovegrass is well suited to the soil and climate of Wheeler County. For further information on establishing weeping lovegrass, or the management of it, contact the SCS office in Wheeler.

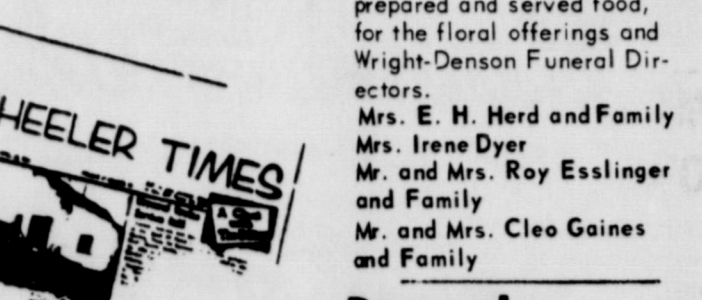

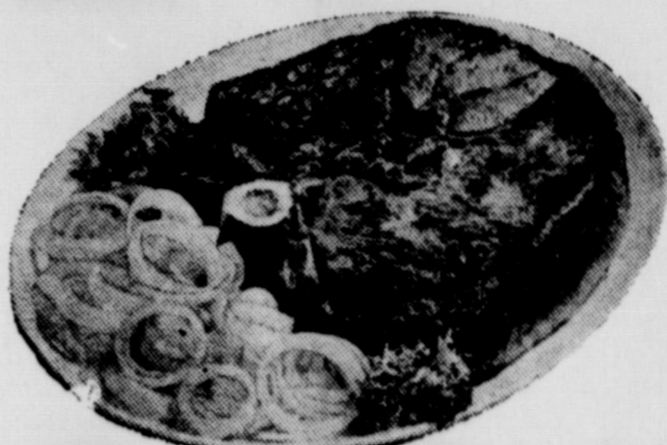
