He earned state-wide recognition for his work as a 4-H club member. Elliott has been an employee of Texas A&M for 29 years serving as county agent in Guadalupe, Wilson and Gonazles Counties until he assumed his present position in February, 1946. His contributions to TexasAgriculture have been made primarily through the seven-step cotton program initiated by the Extension Service in 1946. In that year, the average lint yield per acre in Texas was 134 pounds. It was 348 pounds in 1961 and an estimated 408 pounds in 1965.







Crops Tour

Dr. Schake, are livestock specialist, works closely with cattle feeders and producers in West Texas and cooperates with county agricultural agents in conducting educational programs and meetings dealing with various phases of the livestock industry. He is charged with providing needed training on livestock matters and works with other extension specialists on short courses and oth-

Schake holds BS and MS Degrees in animal husbandry from the University of Missouri and recently received a Ph. D. Degree in animal nutrition from Texas A&M University. A new specialist, he is married and has two children. He was reared on a farm and ranch and did some ranchingprior to moving to Texas A&M to continue his graduate studies. He conducted research studies on beef cows at the Rolling Plains Research Station at Spur.

L. A. Maddox, Jr. is animal husbandman with the Texas Agricultural Extnesion Service. He was reared on a ranch near Miami, Texas, in Roberts County and holds a BS and MS degree from Texas A&M University. He managed his own commercial cow and calf operation from 1946 and 1956. While employed by Texas Tech, he started the first performance testing of young bulls at Pan Tech Farms in 1950. Mr. Maddox joined the Texas Agricultural Extension Service staff in 1954 and shortly initiated the first education program on beef cattle performance testing in Texas. In 1956 he was moved to the headquarters staff to develop

state-wide programs. Mr. Maddox was one of the founders of the Performance Registry International.

Dr. Petr was placed in the Panhandle as area agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service because of the increasing demands for assistance on the area staff at Lubbock in January of 1968. Dr. Petr is a native of Montana and majored in crop breeding and minored in genetics and plant pathology at low a State University where he received his Ph. D. daughter of Spearman; Oma degree. He is a former college Ward of Tulsa, Okla.; Ona instructor in Agronomy and Pugh of San Leandro, Calif.; served as research agronomist with the United States Department of Agriculture. Mr. Hancock initiated the planning of the peach orchard demonstration on the N.L. Sechrist farm in 1966. He is presently serving as Extension Horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Jerald Crump is a native West Texan serving as Soil Scientist for the Soil Conservation Service.
