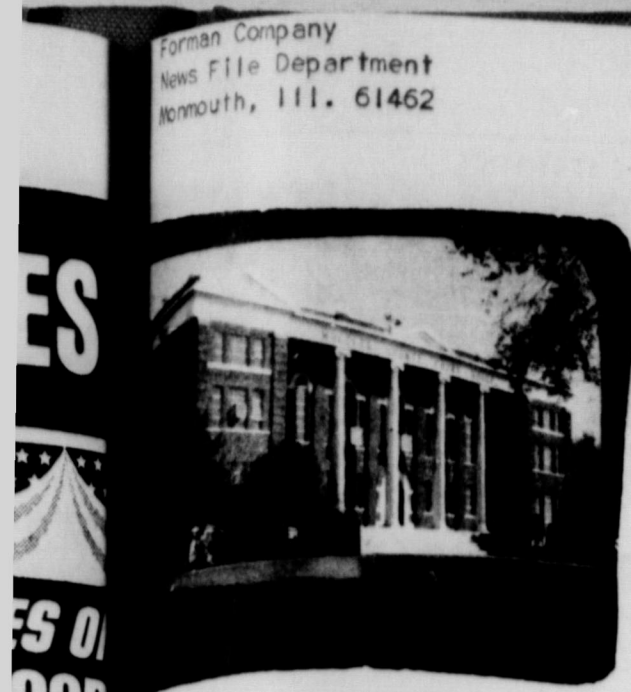

## AL MUSTANGS SWAMP LEFORS PIRATES 34-0

### ANNUAL CROPS TOUR TODAY, SEPT. 19

Parleying a tough defense with a sound ground game, the Wheeler Mustangs sent the scrappy Lefors Pirates down to defeat last Friday night, 34-0.

Missing several opportunities in the first half aided in keeping the score down as the Mustangs roared back in the second half and so completely dominated the game that the Pirates ended up with only 13 yards net for their evening work.

It was the opening game for both clubs and a crowd of more than 800 witnessed the contest played in perfect football weather at Nicholson Field.

Midway of the opening quarter found the Mustangs going into paydirt for the first time when Donald Rives broke off his right tackle and cutback and rambled 45 yards for the TD. It was the first of three TD's for Rives as he was the leading ground gainer of the night with 165 yards in 18 carries.

Wheeler again got on the scoreboard two plays into the second quarter and Tommy Cole climaxed a 46 yard drive as he went over from one yard out. This time Tommy Cole's attempted kick was blocked and the 13 point margin remained for the rest of the half.

The penalty bug bit the Mustangs throughout the game and cost the local crew three touchdowns, one in the first

half and two in the final quarter.

A fumble recovery on the Pirate 20 right after the half-time set the Mustangs up for their touchdown of the night and Rives got the 20 yards in three trips at his left tackle slot. Gilbreath broke through and blocked his second kick off the toe of Cole and with 9:27 remaining in the third stanza, the Mustangs lead increased to 19 points.

Lefors was unable to get anything going as the Mustang defense completely shackled a game but outmanned Pirate crew. Liberal substitution was started by the Mustangs in the third quarter and 30 Mustangs saw action in the contest.

The third period ended with Rives breaking free around his right side and going 20 yards for the touchdown on the pass or run option which ended a 54 yard drive. Tommy Cole put the pigskin through the uprights for a 26-0 lead going into the final 12 minutes.

The Mustangs started their final drive to paydirt early in the final quarter when Britt intercepted a pass at the midfield stripe. Rives got six at the left side. A delay of game penalty set the Mustangs back to the 49 and Britt then broke for 19 for a first down at the Pirate 30. Jimmy Cole, a hard running freshman back, got a first down on the 4 with a good 25 yard run three plays later and went around his left end on the next play for the touchdown. Rodney Weatherly passed to Jimmy Cole for the two pointer.

Wheeler got the football one more time in the game and had two TD's called back. A clipping penalty wiped out a 70 yard run by Britt and an illegal receiver downfield rubbed out a 34 yard pass from Weatherly to Archie Trimble.

### WELLINGTON IS NEXT FOE

Double tough is the word for the Wheeler Mustangs second opponent of this young '68 season. The Class AA Wellington Skyrocks come to Nicholson Field this Friday night and it can only spell trouble.

Wellington toyed with Hollis last week and although they have a young ball club, it is one with enough veterans to make it a good, sound football team.

"We had better forget Lefors because it is going to take a lot more effort on our part to handle the Skyrocks," Coach Cottrell said. "They have a real good team that plays as tough a defense as we will play this year and our kids had better be ready."

"Andy Lowe is a big, strong runner and they come at you with a lot of people," he went on to say.

The Mustangs will probably be without the services of both Dale Rogers and Louie Simmons once more as they both are still recuperating from injuries.

"I was pleased with the boys against Lefors especially the defense, but we have to do a lot of work offensively and quit making mistakes that will kill us against

### Bid Accepted For Garage, Shop Bldg

The Wheeler City Council met Monday evening September 16 and accepted the low bid of \$10,280 for the construction of a Garage-Maintenance Shop, submitted by Wheeler Lumber Co. Plans and specifications were made available to each of the local contractors.

### FHA Personnel To Attend Meeting

A bi-district meeting of the Farmers Home Administration will be held in Amarillo September 24 and 25, according to County Supervisor, John L. Manning.

Information obtained at a regional meeting held in St. Louis on how to check the flow of rural people into urban areas will be discussed by the State Office Staff. Mr. Wayne Nelson, President of the Young Farmers Association of Texas will be a guest speaker.

The local Farmers Home Administration will be closed Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 24 and 25 due to the meeting. Those attending from Wheeler will be John L. Manning, County Supervisor and Mrs. Ida M. Goad, County Office Clerk.

Mr. Manning said that through 138 county offices, the Farmers Home Administration in Texas will loan about \$130 million to rural families and communities this fiscal year.

Last year, about \$60 million was loaned for operating expenses. Over 4,100 rural Texans received loans to improve or construct homes. More than 660 farmers became land owners through the FHA Farm Ownership loan program, and nearly 250 Texas communities received FHA loans to build or expand water systems, sewer systems, recreation projects and grazing associations.
