Mr. Elliott, cotton work specialist for the Texas Agri cultural Extension Service is a keen student of cotton and makes it his business to keep up-to-date on changes which affect the industry. He earned state-wide recognition for his work as a 4-H club member. Elliott has been an employee of Texas A&M for 29 years serving as county agent in Guadalupe, Wilson and Gonazles Counties until he assumed his present position in February, 1946. His contributions to Texas Agriculture have been made primarily through the seven-step cotton program initiated by the Extension Service in 1946. In that year, the average lint yield per acre in Texas was 134 pounds. It was 348 pounds in 1961 and an estimated 408 pounds

Dr. Schake, are livestock specialist, works closely with cattle feeders and producers in West Texas and Fred Elliott, Exten- cooperates with county agri cultural agents in conducting educational programs and phases of the livestock industry. He is charged with providing needed training on livestock matters and works with other extension specialists on short courses and other teaching and training aids. Schake holds BS and MS Degrees in animal husbandry from the University of Missouri and recently received a Ph. D. Degree in animal nutrition from Texas A&M University. Mr. Manning said that through 138 county offices, the Farmers Home Administration in Texas will loan ab ut \$130 million to rural families and communities this fiscal year.

Last year, about \$60 million was loaned for operating expenses. Over 4,100 rural Texans received loans to improve or construct homes. More than 660 farmers became land owners through the FHA Farm Ownership loan program, and nearly 250 Texas communities received FHA loans to build or expand water systesm, sewer systems, recreation projects and grazing associations.

Parleying a tough defense with a sound ground game, the Wheeler Mustangs sent the scrappy Lefors Pirates down to defeat last Friday

Missing several opportunities in the first half aided in keeping the score down as the Mustangs roared back in the second half and so completely dominated the game that the Pirates ended up with only 13 yards net for their evenings work.

It was the opening game for both clubs and a crowd of more than 800 witnessed the contest played in perfect football weather at Nicholson Field.
