RATTLERS BLANKED BY MUSTANGS 21-0

The Rattlers were blanked by the Mustangs in their first quarter, putting on two rousing touchdowns and came out to a 21-0 whitewash. The Rattlers at Stinnett Friday night.

Rives and Dickie Burton doing the downfield dirty work, Britt broke loose once more in the middle and rambled 31 yards to give Wheeler a much more comfortable lead. With Cole's good kick, the Mustangs now had the Rattlers down by 14.

After the first quarter, the closest the Rattlers got to the Mustang end zone was to the Wheeler 37, late in the first half, following a roughing the kicker fine gave the Rattlers new life at the Mustang 43. In fact, so unyielding was the Mustang defense, they gave up only one first down to Stinnett in the second half and were in command from their second TD of the night.

The Mustangs wasted no time in putting the game on ice in the third period. Rives and Burton three McClellan for two big losses to open the second half and Stinnett was forced to punt and Cole returned six to the Wheeler 36. Britt got 4 at left tackle and

then he got the call at the center of the line and 60 yards later was in for the final touchdown.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Mustangs worked the ball to the Rattler 20 where the drive bogged down and Tommy Cole attempted a 37 yard field goal which fell just short of the cross bar. Steve Simmons intercepted a McClellan pass at the Rattler 33 to give the Mustangs another threat but this one died at the two when Stinnett recovered a fumble by Simmons at that point.

The Mustangs ground eating offense continued to get good yardage for the third game in a row and with the tackle spots defended well by Stinnett, holes opened up for the inside plays and Britt was able to carve out 197 yards in 24 carries. Tommy Cole tacked on 14 and Jimmy Cole added five yards to the Mustangs rushing total for the night.

Homecoming is the time old grads come back to their alma mater and there is nothing the Wheeler Mustangs would rather do than send them home with the sweet scent of a victory over the Groom Tigers.

Nicholson Field will be the scene of all the festivities with the battle between the Mustangs and Tigers being the highlight of the evening which gets underway at 8 o'clock Friday night.

The Mustangs upped their season record to 2 and 1 with the victory over Stinnett and hope to add another plus to the win column against Groom. The Tigers lost to Silvertown, one of District 2 A's powerhouses, last week but the scout report shows

no easy time for Wheeler. "Groom stayed after Silvertown the whole ball game and never gave up and if they did that against them, what will they do against us?" Coach Cottrell said. The Mustangs will have added incentive Friday night and that is to make this homecoming a much happier one than last year when the Mustangs absorbed a stinging 6-0 defeat at the hands of Canadian.

"Our coaching staff was well pleased with our teams play against Stinnett and we began to show improvement in our offensive play even though a lot of little mistakes, including unnecessary penalties, still hampered our play."

"Steve Simmons and Dave Britt played real well for us and we think that Gary Davis, Dickie Burton and Donnie Manning turned in extra good games in the line. All of the kids showed what they were made of when they held Stinnett those two times in the first quarter and this had to help our offense after the big plays on defense were made," Coach Cottrell added.

"The coaching went on to say, "The blocking, both on the line of scrimmage and downfield improved last week and if we can continue to put things together, we will keep improving each week."

Wheeler will be hampered once more by injuries as Donald Rives and Dale Rogers are once more on the doubtful list as they continue to recuperate from injuries sustained earlier. Rogers saw a little action in the Stinnett game for his first since the Erick scrimmage and Rives also saw action after hurting his ankle in the Wellington game.

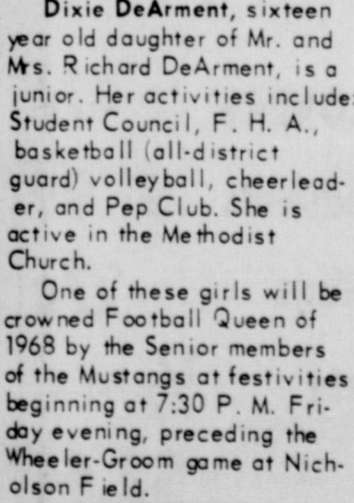

COLTS SLAM SILVERTON 40-0

The Wheeler Colts successfully opened their season last Thursday night when they easily put down the challenge of the Jr. High team from Silvertown with a 40-0 win.

A good crowd of fans at Nicholson Field witnessed the encounter and the hard hitting Colts didn't disappoint them as they put the ball in the end zone on each of their four possessions in the first half.

This year's Colt team is smaller in size than teams of the past but what they lack in size, they make up in desire and it was quickly evident that the larger Owlets were not a match for the Colts.

Dale Stevens, 119 pound tailback, led the Colt attack with 136 yards in 15 carries and scored two of the Colt touchdowns, Joe Nickell, Jerry Beatty, Ricky Heffley and Gary Fischer tacked on one TD each.

The first Colt TD followed a 53 yard drive with Dale Stevens getting the call on six of the seven tries and going over from one yard out. He also ran the two pointer and the rout was on.

It only took the Colts four plays to put another six points on the board the next time they got the ball. A Silvertown punt that ended with a minus 2 yards gave the Colts the ball at the Owlet 42. Fischer got 17 but the Colts got a 15 yard fine the next play. Stevens got 20 and then 7 more to put the ball at the 13 yard line. Rick Heffley followed clearing blocks and sped around right end

for the score.

Silvertown had trouble getting anything started against the gang tackling Colts and coughed up the football just two plays after the Colts second TD on a fumble and the Colts were quick to capitalize and went 20 points ahead in three plays. Stevens got the final 25 yards at the Silvertown well worn left side.

Calvin Sechrist put the Colts in scoring business for the last time in the first half when he blocked an Owlet punt at the Silvertown 25. Ground plays moved the ball down to the 18 where Fischer hit Jerry Beatty with a scoring pass. Going to the air for the two points with a pass from Fischer to Nickell, the Colts had a commanding 28 point bulge at halftime.

After scoring three plays into the third period, Coach Richard Gaines began liberal substitution and it kept the scoring margin from being greater. Gary Fischer went over from two yards out with 7:15 to play following a 17 yard run by Stevens and a 29 yard jaunt by Heffley.

Once again the Colts will be outweighed but little else is known about their second opponent of the year. Coach Gaines said that he was expecting a real tough game if for no other reason than Claude had rather beat a Wheeler team than nearly anyone else.

Enthusiasm is high on the Colt squad and they will battle any club that they play and fans can expect another all out effort in the Claude contest.

ACROSS THE FENCE

Wheat's up. It's green and growing. Most folks feel we'll be able to get some grazing out of it before too long. The growth was due to the fine rains we had last week. The county got an average of 2 1/2 inches of rain. Papan community got five inches. Dusan Papan tells us that it was the first time in forty years that his terraces had

been broken. Robert Trostle of Lela will be trying some grazing varieties of wheat for us this year. With depressed prices on all but domestic wheat program acres, we foresee a lot of interest in grazing of wheat. Parker, Trapper, Trader and Agent are the variety names. We hope to be able to report more to you later in our North-west Texas Demonstration

Handbook on results of the tests. Some companies and experiment stations are making progress with hybrid wheats. We'll be working closely with Rex Miller at Allison who has a trial planting of hybrid wheat there. The objective of this trial is to see if hybrid wheats prove to be commercially acceptable types. If they do, increased yields and better than average forage ability should make endeavor profitable to county farmers. Rodeo fans get ready. The Wheeler County 4-H Texans are having their fall rodeo this weekend October 5 and 6. The program'll start at 7:30 p.m. Saturday night and 1:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon. The rodeo'll be held in Wheeler this year. Ed Trimble is chairman. Entry blanks for contestants can be obtained from Mrs. Dick Hefley in Wheeler.

ious blood disease will remain a threat to cattle until frost. Dr. Patterson told us that in the early stages of an acute infection, body temperature of the animal may rise two to five degrees F. and remain at 103 to 107 degrees F. until the animal begins to improve. But, if the infection is overwhelming, the temperature may drop below normal just before death. As much as 60 to 75 percent of the red blood cells may be destroyed when the animal first appears sick. Animals which survive the disease become carriers. Anaplasmosis is spread in two ways. Infected blood may be transferred from infected to well animals by insects or instruments used by man in dehorning, castrating, ear notching, tattooing and other operations. Mechanical transmission takes place only when the disease agent is delivered promptly, within about five minutes. The perishability of the organism greatly limits the time and distance insects or instruments can carry the disease. Dr. Patterson pointed out. The second means for transferring the disease is biological. Certain ticks feed on the infected animals and pick up the organism with the blood they consume. The organism is able to live for a long time in the tick's body and can infect other animals during later feeding by the tick. In Texas, the brown winter tick, American dog tick and the blacklegged tick are the only ones which have been known to transmit the disease. But other blood-insects, particularly horse, deer and sand flies, appear to be chiefly responsible for spreading the disease in Texas. Mosquitoes, stable and horn flies are also suspects. We have available at our office a fact sheet on the disease and suggest that cattlemen call or come by for a copy. In addition to a full discussion of the disease, suggestions are also made for treating infected animals and for preventing the disease.

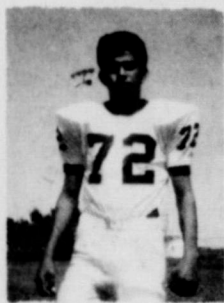

SHOPPING ON IMPULSE

Do you go to the grocery store for a quart of milk and come home with several bags of food? According to a continuing study of supermarket shoppers almost half of the purchases are completely an impulse.

It's no accident! Manufacturers, advertisers and merchandisers use psychology to encourage impulse reaction. Color, design, packaging and convenience features often attract you before you stop to ask, "Is this item the best buy for me?" Avoid impulse buying by having a good budget and shopping list and sticking to them. You may even want to restrict the amount of money you carry to the store.

Shop with a list compiled at home. When making the shopping list, plan menus and basic items that need replenishing. Careful planning not only reduces impulse buying but also helps reduce the number trips to the grocery store. You will spend less money, have better meals with better nutrition and spend less time and energy.

Shopping alone also lessens impulse buying. If the children must accompany you to the store, they should know they cannot have everything they want or all they see in television advertisements.

If you shop while hungry you tend to impulse buy. If it is possible arrange to do your shopping soon after you have eaten. You will find it much easier to by-pass items which are not on your shopping list. Also do your shopping in person or teach others in the family how to shop. This is your assurance of getting just what you want in quantity, quality, form and price. A child will usually buy "extras" unless given specific instructions on what to get.

QUICK APPLE COFFEE CAKE
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
2/3 cup milk
3 T. melted shortening
Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together. Beat egg, milk and melted shortening together. Stir liquid into dry ingredients, mixing only enough to moisten them. Pour into greased pan and add topping.

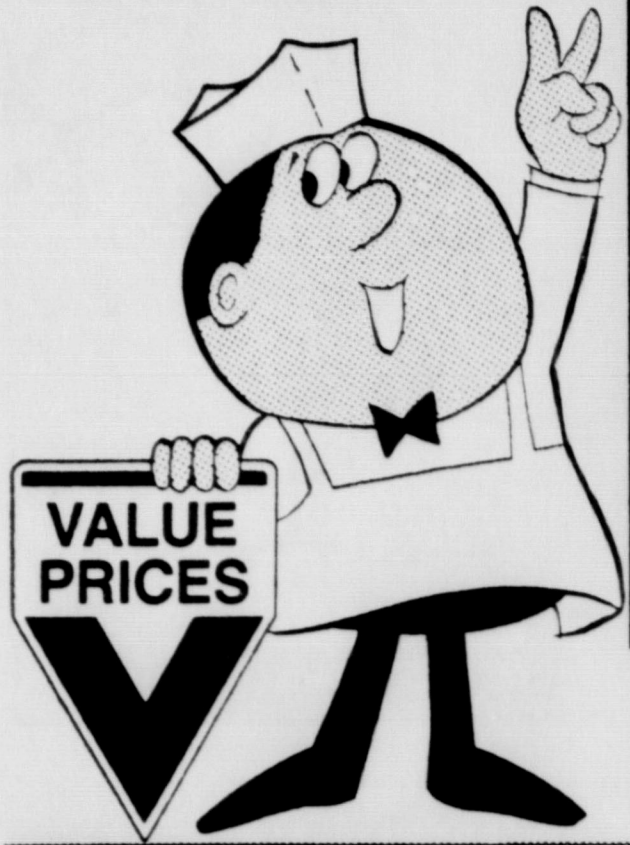

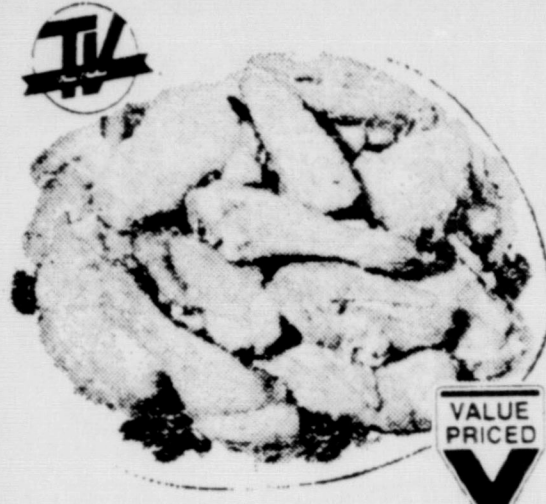

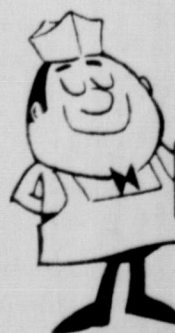
