Mustangs to Battle Happy Cowboys

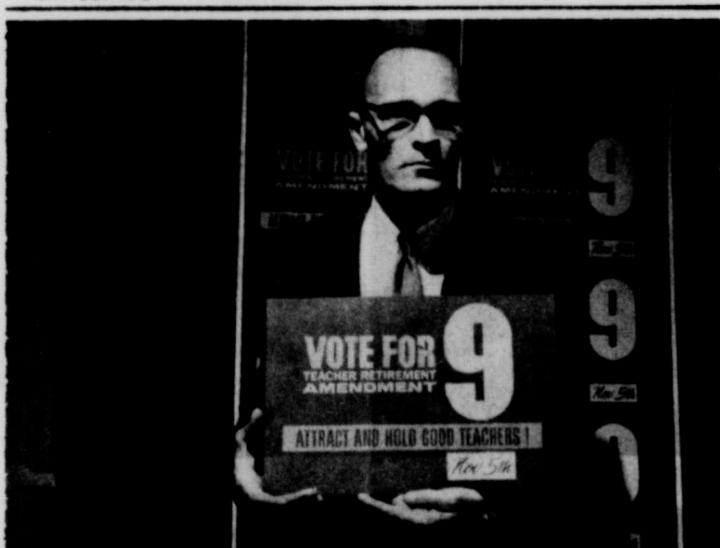
The Wheeler Mustangs will

Cases were also reported in the Midland and Odessa areas. Delay animal surgery until cold weather arrives. All wounds should be treated immediately. Livestock should be examined regularly and sprayed with a recommended insecticide. Samples of all worms in wounds should be collected

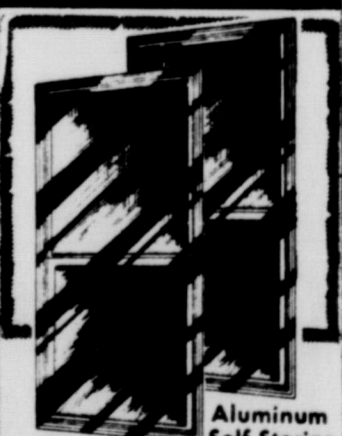

Debt Service May Not Be Answer

Families carrying debt loads too large to manage may be tempted by ads that seem to offer an alternative to bankruptcy. Although this operation became illegal under the new Texas Credit in 1967, these may still be in operation in the state.

The company - a profit-making enterprise - may call itself a "debt adjuster," "debt consultant," "debt pooler," "budget counselor" or some other respectable name. Its ads seem to indicate that a debt consolidation loan will pay off all old creditors, then a single weekly or monthly payment will be paid to the company.

Things are seldom that simple.

A typical contract calls for a "filing fee" of \$25, a service charge of 12.5 percent of the total amount of debt, and a cancellation fee of \$25 to terminate the contract before a year's time. No loan is made. All the old debts still exist, and each creditor is simply notified that his payment will be made through the company as long as the debtor continues to make regular payments of the specified amount. The fees represent, of course, in addition to principal payments, interest on interest.

Records exist of cases in which the debt adjustment company failed to make all the specified payments; in going over their receipts, one young couple found a discrepancy of \$400 over a year's time.

If you are struggling to make ends meet financially, think twice before buying on credit. Debt servicing took 22 percent of average family income last year. By comparison, debt repayment and interest took 11.4 percent of the family income in 1949. In 1961, debt servicing took 19.6 percent. The Commerce study noted that well over 75 percent of the debt servicing total in 1966 resulted from debts contracted in the boomier atmosphere of previous years.

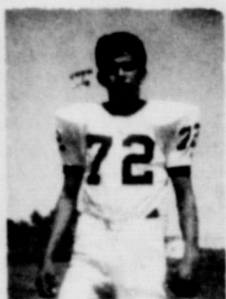

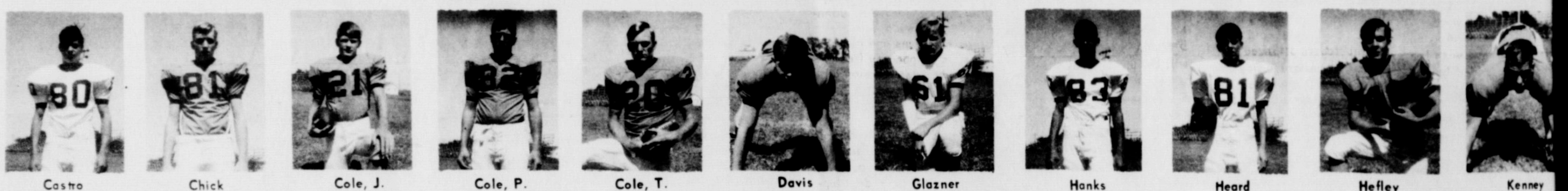

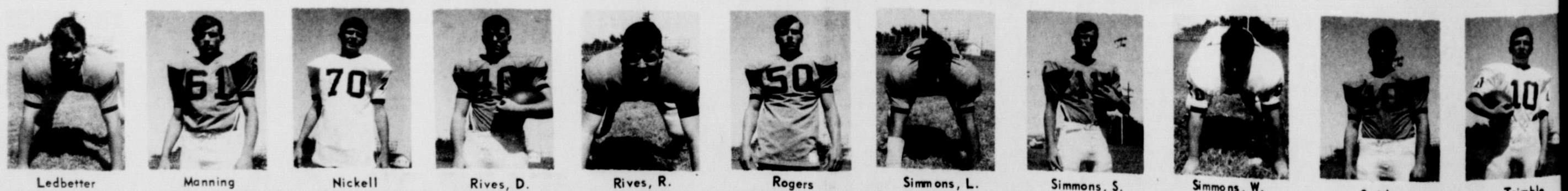

My the weather changes fast here. That cold snap last week got a lot of gardeners worrying about frost. Old timers are looking for an early winter. We don't really know.

Smile, cowman, Smile. The grins should be big this year. Economists tell us beef consumption will be 1 1/2 to 2 pounds more per person this year than in 1967. This will be 107 1/2 to 108 pounds per person. Human population is up two million persons from a year ago.

Rural people who don't have a son or daughter with a 4-H or FFA project ought to consider this possibility. There's something to be said about the responsibility and initiative and later good that may come from it. For too many years too many people have been crowding themselves into central cities; mostly people attracted by the hope, often the illusion of greater opportunity. In Washington, D. C., our capital city, it costs \$23,000 to provide facilities for getting each commuter to work and back. It's a good thing that some of our brightest young people have been drawn to the cities. They'll need this know-how to figure out how to pay enough taxes to get to work every day. Perhaps we can find opportunities closer at hand than the congested cities. Some folks who are helping identify our opportunities and who are offering solutions to some problems are members of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee. They are in the process of writing a Long Range County Program for Wheeler County. The target date is June of 1969. We hope local leaders will get a copy. We believe you'll find it interesting reading. Some of the interesting facts unearthed by the committee is

that approximately half of the people in the county have left since 1930 and that an average of 25 farmers a year have left the county for the past five years. These and many other facts relative to the economy of the county will be in the written program. Be sure and ask for a copy. This group would welcome your ideas and suggestions.

Collingsworth County has a new County Agent. He's a native of Hedley, Texas, graduated from WTSU in 1962 and for the past two years has been serving as Assistant County Agricultural Agent in Washington County, Brenham, Texas.

Don't put on your stocking cap just yet, but whether we like it or not, frost and freezing weather are just around the corner. The change in weather will affect plant growth. When the growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnson Grass, Sudan, Milo, forage sorghums and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and become a hazard to grazing livestock.

Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants and are responsible for the prussic acid development. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how soon a veterinarian can get to it.

Frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay or for at least a week after the frost. If it is ready to cut for hay before the frost, it may be cut immediately, provided adequate curing time is allowed. Silage made from frost damaged plants is safe as soon as the ensiling process is complete.

Young plants or second growth suckers are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity. Too, the more luxuriant the growth, the more likely the plants will be dangerous when their growth is interrupted. Additional information is available from veterinarians and myself on questions relating to the grazing and/or harvesting and storing of frost wilted plants.

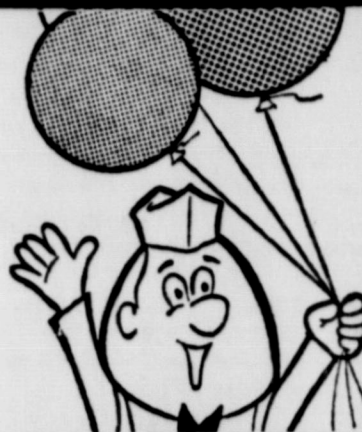
