The second time in years, District 2-A ended three way tie for the championship with Wheeler, Borger and McLean all tied up at the top. The Clarendon win over the Mustangs and the Mustangs win over Claude last night, each team had a 4-1 marks and another coin toss was in the air. The Mustangs lost to the last place Wheeler Mustangs the lucky coin and the Mustangs will represent the bi-district play against the Gruver Mustangs, champions of the bi-district.

Wheeler Mustangs held their own against the Mustangs and when the game was tied 0-0, the comeback Mustangs were trichamps of the game.

The Mustangs held the final score Clarendon vice the McLean, Mustangs anxiously awaited what would officially be the championship.

It was all over, the Mustangs had cut the margin to Wheeler points with just 55 seconds to play. Terry Knox came around looking for a touchdown, broke loose for 45 yards for a touchdown and then a two point conversion by Roger Knox.

Wheeler took the opening kickoff and moved out to the line and were forced to punt. On the first play following the punt, Jerry Ashworth and Wheeler recover the ball on Claude 25.

Wheeler Rives got the ball and zone in one play broke off his left guard and ran the distance. Cole kicked the extra point for a quick 7-0 lead.

VOTERS TO DECIDE ON PAVING PROGRAM

TWO DECISIONS WILL BE MADE ON DECEMBER 4

In addition to voting on the issuance of \$150,000.00 Street Improvement Bonds on December 4th, the qualified voters in Wheeler will vote on a One Percent (1%) City Sales Tax. The Sales Tax election is being held on the same day because the City Council proposes to pay for the \$150,000.00 Street Improvements Bonds with the City Sales Tax.

The Council is stressing the fact that city property taxes or water and sewer rates will not have to be raised to pay the \$150,000.00.

Currently three percent (3%) sales tax is being charged in all Texas Cities. This money goes to the State. If the Sales Tax election carries in Wheeler, the Sales Tax in Wheeler will be raised from 3% to 4%. The entire 4% is mailed to the State Comptroller of Public Accounts in Austin and the Comptroller returns a check to the City of Wheeler for their One Percent (1%).

The one percent Sales Tax in Wheeler will bring in approximately \$12,000.00 to \$15,000.00 annually to the City of Wheeler. This is enough to retire the \$150,000.

Street Improvement Bonds within 15 years.

Since the Texas Legislature authorized the tax last year, 353 cities have voted on the issue to date, 304 have adopted it. This represents about 80% of the population in Texas.

More than a dozen Panhandle towns have approved the tax. Borger and Quanah being two of the latest to approve the tax. Shamrock has scheduled their election on the same day as Wheeler.

State law stipulates that a period of at least two years must elapse before the sales tax issue can be voted on the second time.

Most people consider the City Sales Tax to be "The Most Fair Tax of All", simply because it taxes everyone and not just the property owner. It is a well known fact the property owners in the cities pay heavy property tax to support their cities while people that are renting, living in trailers or living in the country, actually pay nothing toward the support of the city which in most cases is as much their city as it is the property owners'. Tourist passing through town or shoppers from other cities will also pay their portion under the City Sales Tax Plan.

Council Proposes 80 Blocks To Be Paved

On Wednesday, December 4th, the property owners in Wheeler will again have the opportunity to go to the polls and vote on a paving program for the City of Wheeler.

The City Council has worked up a program calling for approximately 80 blocks to be paved including curb and gutter and a new bridge on East 7th just west of the Swimming Pool.

The estimated cost of the project is \$304,324.00. This cost has been estimated by the engineering firm of McMorrie & Associates, Inc. of Amarillo, Texas. This firm will also engineer the entire project, insuring proper grades, drainage and in general making certain the project is carried out according to the plans and specifications.

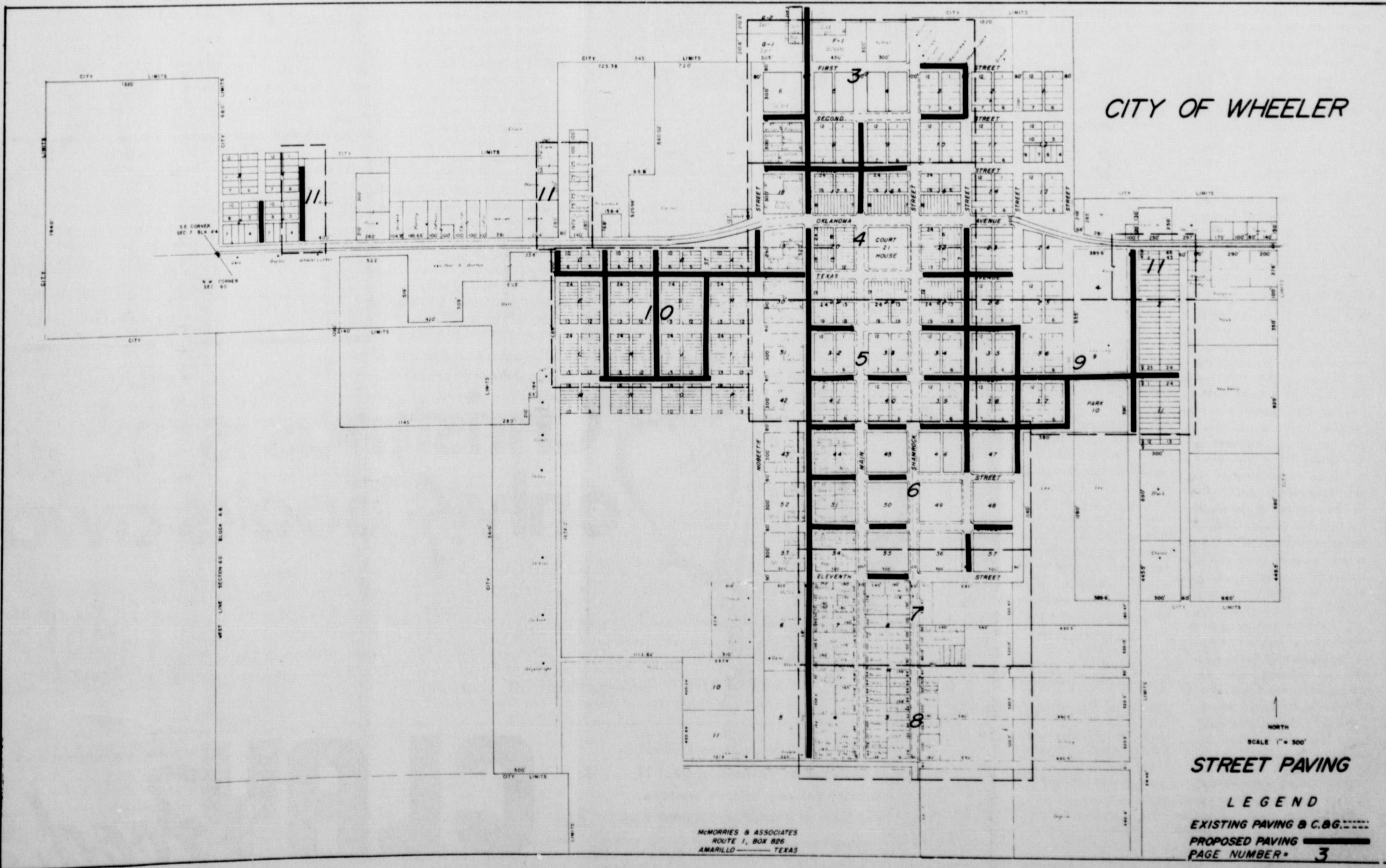
A breakdown of the cost is as follows. Keep in mind that this cost is an estimate and the engineers feel that with competitive bidding which a project of this size will attract, the actual cost could be several thousand dollars less. They are certain their estimate is high enough.

The total property owner's fronting footage is 47,639 lineal feet. The property owners will be charged \$3.17 per foot which would be a total of \$151,015.63. The city will pay the balance of \$153,308.00 to make the total of \$304,324.00.

Requests for bids can be made immediately following the election with the contract being let sometime in January of 1969. The Engineers figure that the project will be completed by July of 1969.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF WHEELER CITY OF WHEELER

TO ALL THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Wheeler, Texas, on December 4th, 1968, which election was duly called and ordered by Ordinance of the City Council of said City on November 6th, 1968, and which Ordinance is made a part of this notice, and reads as follows:

AN ORDINANCE
CALLING AN ELECTION IN THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY, AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION, A PROPOSITION CONCERNING AND RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF \$150,000 OF STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF SAID ELECTION; AND ENACTING PROVISIONS INCIDENT AND RELATING TO THE SUBJECT AND PURPOSE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, deems it expedient to issue bonds of said City in the principal amount of \$150,000 for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and accordingly desires to submit to the qualified electors of the City, for their action thereupon, the proposition hereinafter set forth for the grant of such authority as therein contained; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS:

I That an election be held in the City of Wheeler, Texas, on December 4th, 1968, which is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this ordinance, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of the City of Wheeler, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

PROPOSITION
"Shall the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Wheeler, Texas, in the principal amount of ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000), maturing serially or otherwise, as may be determined by the City Council of said City, the maximum maturity being not more than forty (40) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, interest payable annually or semi-annually as may be determined by the City Council of said City, for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and to levy an annual ad valorem tax on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof as the same matures, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended?"

II That said election shall be held in the regularly established election precinct of said City (all of said City being included in and composed of one election precinct), and that the polling place for the

holding of said election shall be at the CITY HALL in said City, and Laura Guthrie is hereby appointed Presiding Judge and Mary Finsterwald is hereby appointed Alternate Presiding Judge of said election.

III That the Alternate Presiding Judge above named, in the absence of the Presiding Judge above named, shall perform the duties of the presiding judge in such election; and the Presiding Judge shall appoint for such election three (3) qualified voters who are residents of the election precinct to serve as clerks in said election, provided, however, that if the alternate presiding judge is present, he shall be appointed and counted as one of such election clerks.

IV That absentee voting in said election shall be conducted at the City Hall of said City in Wheeler, Texas, and the City Secretary of said City is hereby charged with the duty of conducting absentee voting in said election, as required by law.

V That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas; and only those resident qualified electors of the City of Wheeler, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election.

VI That the ballots to be used in said election shall be prepared in conformity with V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and in such manner that the voters may cast their ballots either "FOR" or "AGAINST" the following ballot proposition: The issuance of \$150,000 Street Improvement Bonds of said City, and the levy of the tax in payment thereof, as submitted in the proposition.

VII That a copy of this Ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

VIII That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to post notice of said election at the CITY HALL in the City of Wheeler, and at three (3) other public places within the City of Wheeler, all of which notices shall be posted not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

IX That the City Secretary is further authorized and directed to cause said Notice of Election to be published in the WHEELER TIMES, a newspaper published in and of general circulation in Wheeler, Texas, which notice shall be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in said newspaper, the date of the first publication being not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided herein and in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the applicable laws governing general elections.

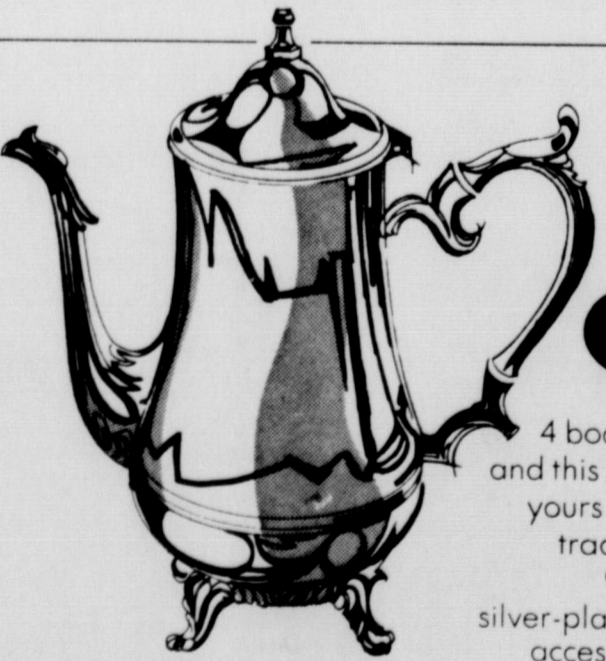

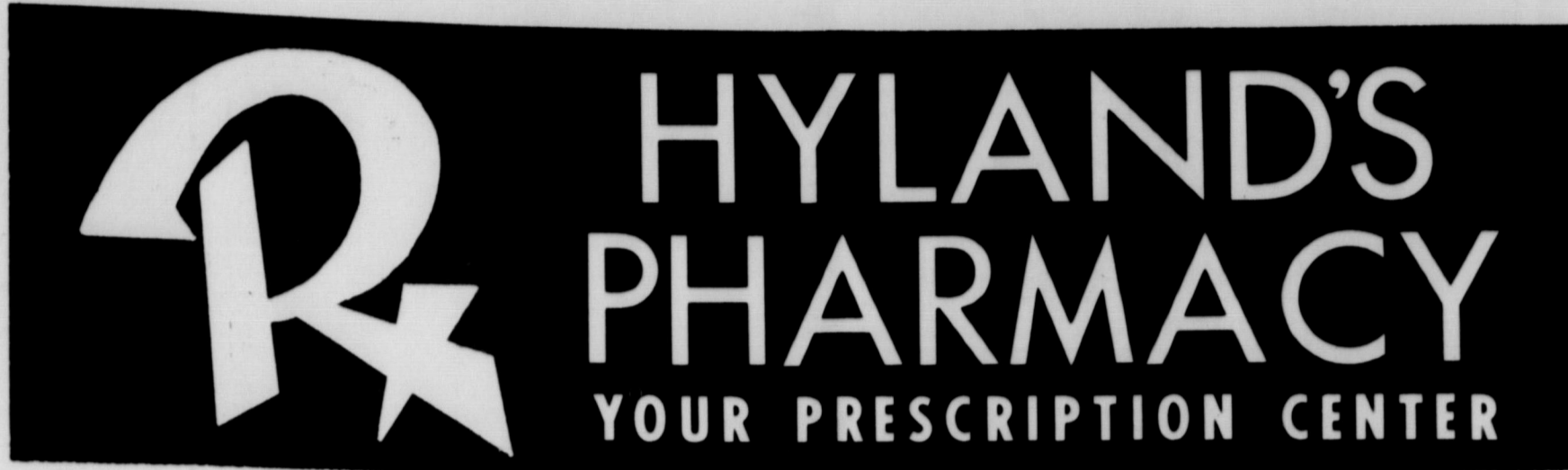

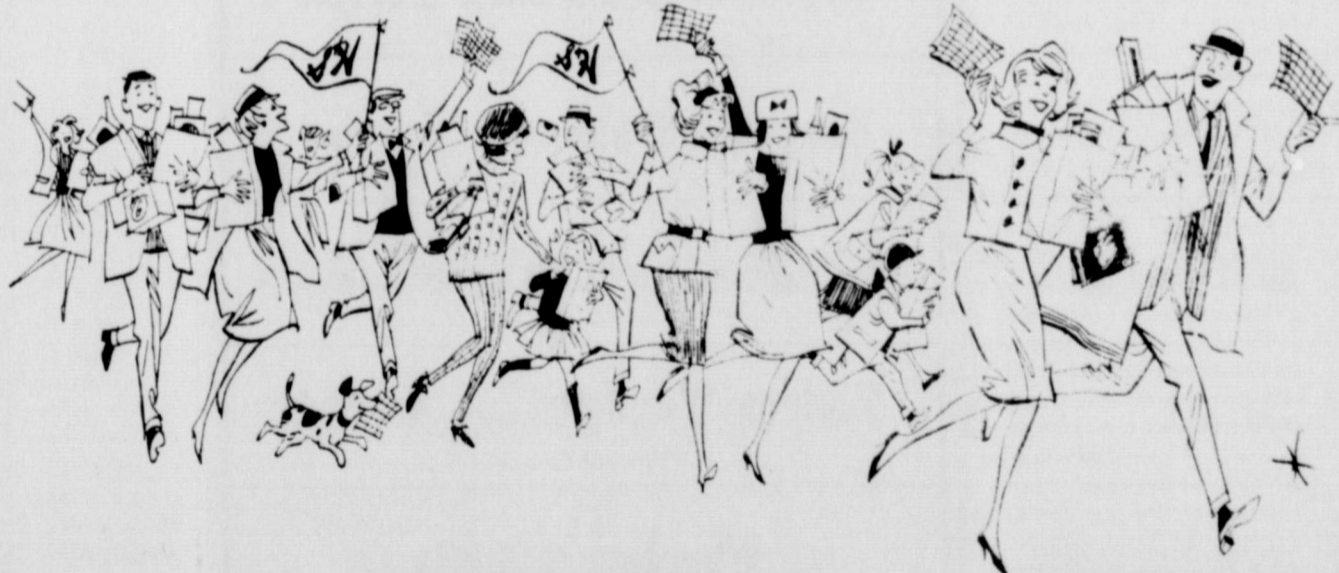

Claude quickly dispelled any hopes of a real easy victory by the Mustangs as they took the kickoff back to the Claude 40 and proceeded to drive 60 yards to paydirt in seven plays.

Knox ran a keeper for 19 and a pass from David Stephenson to John McGowan for 20 big yards were the key plays in the drive. Knox got the score as he circled the Mustangs right end with 3:17 still to play in the first quarter. Claude was penalized on the extra point kick and the second attempt was a pass which was no good.

A short punt by Rives gave the hosts a great scoring opportunity just as the first quarter was ending but a 15 yard penalty and a fumble recovery by James Tucker stopped the threat on the Wheeler 14.

Wheeler had one more good drive in the first half as the Mustangs moved from their 37 down to the Claude 15 where they lost the ball on downs.

Wheeler seemed to put the ball game out of reach in the third period but Claude came right back to put the Mustangs on uneasy ground.

On their first possession of the second half, the Mustangs crammed the ball down Claude for a 83 yard drive with Rives, who gained 218 yards in the game, getting the call on all but three plays in the 12 play drive. The big gainer in the drive was a 30 yard blast at right tackle. Rives got the touchdown from six yards out and

with 4:23 left in the third quarter, Cole kicked the point and Wheeler had a 22-6 lead.

Claude ran on fourth down at the Claude 49 and failed to make the first down and Wheeler took over there and used five plays to get their final TD. Rives got 17 at right tackle and Jimmy Cole ground out five more at the same hole to move the ball to the Claude 33. Rives then hit Roy Don Chick with a 26 yard pass to the Claude 7 for a first and goal situation.

Rives got the touchdown in two carries and with Cole's kick being blocked, it appeared that Wheeler was home free with 29 seconds to play in the third stanza.

Wheeler had one TD called back in the final quarter when Jimmy Cole raced 23 yards for the score but an illegal procedure penalty wiped it out.

The Mustangs one other threat was stymied and an attempted field goal was no good but it really didn't seem to matter at this point.

Claude got their second touchdown two plays deep in the fourth quarter on a 50 yard drive. Two passes, Knox to Bruce Merrell for 39 yards and Knox to McGowan for the TD got all the distance.

Recovering a fumble at the Claude 26, the red and blue clad Mustangs headed goalward for their final tally.

A pass interference call on Jeff Kenney set up a first down at the Wheeler 30. Two incompletions and a 15 yard fine had the Claude crew shoved back to their 45 and from this point, Knox started on his rambling run for the touchdown.
