# **Blocks To Be Payed** year, 353 cities have voted on

On Wednesday, December 4th, the property owners in Wheeler will again have the opportunity to go to the polls and vote on a paving program for the City of Wheeler.

The City Council has worked up a program calling for approximately 30 blocks to be paved including curb and gutter and a new bridge on East 7th just west of the Swimming Pool.

The estimated cost of the project is \$304,324.00. This cost has been estimated by the engineering firm of McMorrie & Associates, Inc. of Amarillo, Texas. This firm will also engineer the entire project, insuring proper grades, drainage and in general making certain the project is carried out according to the plans and specifi-

A breakdown of the cost is as follows. Keep in mind that this cost is an estimate and the engineers feel that with competative bidding which a project of this size will attract, the actual cost could be several thousand dollars less. They are certain their estimate is high

Manning said the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 makes it possible for the federal government to apply an interest supplement payment to rural housing loans made to low-income rural families that will lower the cost of buying a house.

The interest supplement plan on rural housing loans will be administered through the Farmers Home Administration, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency.

Under the interest supplement plan, Manning said that families earning as little as \$3,000 annually could possibly qualify for as much as

The newplan allows for interest supplements to reduce the payment of interest on housing loans to as low as one percent.

"This newplan", Manning siad, "will be extremely helpful in removing the substandard housing in Wheeler Coun-

The actual supplement a family receives will depend on the owner's income and number of people in the household.

A minimum requirement is that a borrower who does not have enough to pay his loan installment in full will pay at least the amount that would be due if the interest rate were one percent.

For example, a family with five children and an annual gross income of \$3,000 would receive an interest supplement of \$222 a year on an \$8,000 rural housing loan. The family would receive

as an interest supplement the difference between their annual scheduled not, \$508 (principal and interest), and their annual installment if it were figured at one percent,

In this example, the family's monthly payments of principal and interest on an \$8,000 loan amortized over 33 years would be approxima-

Wheeler said Farmers Home Administration would review interest supplement agreements every two years with borrowers. If necessary, supp- for the street in front of their lements will be adjusted at renewal time, based on the borrower's income and family

Another feature of the act is an interest supplement on loans to develop nonprofit and cooperative housing for low-income people.

Lower payments by the sponsor of the housing project as a result of the interest supplement are to be translated into lower rents for the

Other major provisions of the new housing measure include: --financial support for self-

help projects. -loans for the purchase of building sites for farm-labor housing.

-- Housing and training facilities for rural job trainees and and the council went into detheir families

-expanded housing credit for lower income city people who work in rural areas. Farmers Home Administra-

tion rural housing loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain the required credit from other sources.

Further information on the interest supplement plan can be obtained at the Wheeler County Office of the Farmers Home Administration at 112

be paved is located elsewhere in this paper. Property owners receiving paving, curb and gutter, will be assessed \$3.17 per foot. In other words, a property owner with 50 ft. frontage will be as sessed \$158.50. A property owner with a 100 ft. front will be assessed \$317.00. The assessment can bepaid in cash or it can be financed with the property owner paying 25% within 10 days after the project is completed and approved by the engineers and City Council, and 25% annually for three years. If the property owner decides to use the timepayment plan, he will, of course, be charged

Those with property on the corners will be hit the hardest if paving is scheduled home as well as the street along the side. They, of course, will be assessed \$3.17 per ft. for the paving, curb and gutter in the front of their property as well as along the side.

The Council has urged that anyone that does not understand this program, feel free to call any member of the council.





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

If you are sending food its very important that you pack it right and send food that will keep. Some ideas for packaging would be to use heavy boxes or tin or rigid plastic containers with tightly fitting lids. Line the box or container with moisture proof cellophane or aluminum foil. Crumpled tissue or newspaper in corners and around items to cushion the food. Also ready-toeat cereal or popcorn acts as a cushion. Wrap foods individually make ing sure all foods are cool before wrapping. Wrap cookies and candy individually or in pairs, back to back. Cakes pack best if baked as cur cakes or cut into pieces, frost ed and wrapped individually. Close the package securely and seal with cellophane tape Wrap the outer package with durable brown paper. > have labels saying, "This side up" and "Fragile." It is very important to choose foods that will ship well. Soft drop cookies, chew bar cookies, squared and filled cookies travel well. Apple sauce, molasses, oatmeal and mincemeat cookies travel weel and are good packers.

If cookies are too rich, they may crumble or turn rancid. Cakes are difficult to ship successfully because they dry and break. Syrups substituted to part of the sugar help to prevent rapid tying. Fruit cakes and applesauce cake remain moist for sometime. If mailing a food containing pastry dough, add all-bran to prevent the crust fromt breaking up.

The following are recipes which travel well.

HONEY HERMITS

Melt 1/3 cup shortening and add it to 1-1/3 cups of strined honey. Then add 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and I cup chipped raisins. Sift together 3/2 cupsflour, 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves and 4 teaspoons of baking powder. Add the dry ingredients to the moist and mix well. Drop on greased cookie sheet and bake in 375-400 degrees F. oven until done.




