Jones then passed to Cluck for the two pointer and a minute and 31 seconds had elapsed in the final period.

Gruver's final TD was a rather cheap one as they got the pigskin on the Mustang 29 when Cluck intercepted an errant pass by Rives.

Chuck Clawson put the spike to any Mustang hopes then as he broke off his right guard on a trap play and rambled 20 yards for the Greyhounds third touchdown of the half.

The Mustangs tried vainly to get back in the game but the Greyhounds were not to be denied now and they protected their 14 point margin until the final whistle.

The bird-district loss was the final game in the back and gold of Wheeler for 10 Mustangs and defeat was not easy for them.

"We couldn't have done it this year without this group of fine young seniors," Coach Cottrell said. "They have given us real good leadership and have sacrificed to make this last year a winning one for them."
