These art exhibits will be changed periodically and we hope that much interest will be created by this display in the coming months.

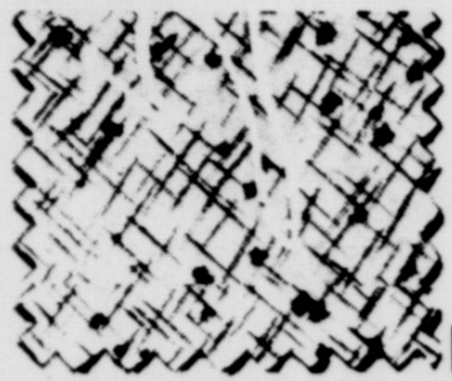

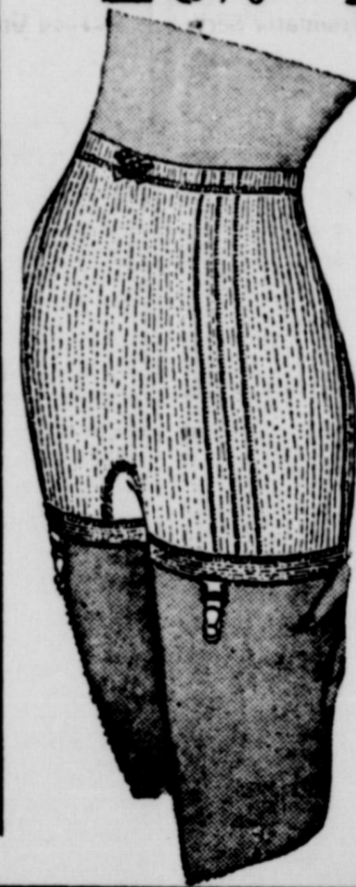

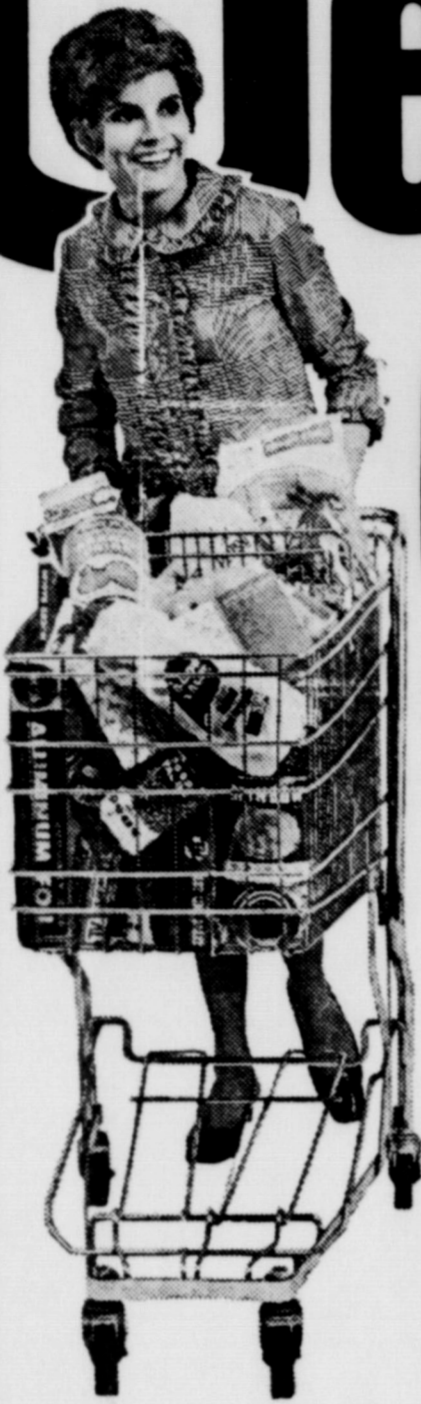
