November Sales Of Savinas Bonds

During the month of November sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Wheeler County totaled \$5,060 according to Mr. R. J. Holt, Chairman of the Wheeler County Savings Bonds Committee. Total Janwary - November sales were \$1 15,180 and this is 44 per cent of the 1968 goal of \$260,000.

During the eleven-month period sales in Texas totaled \$164,300,917 -- 89 percent of the 1968 sales goal and a 68 per cent increase over sales during the same period of last year.

Nationally, sales of Series E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares for November totaled \$377 million. Series E sales totaled \$344 million and November sales of Freedom Shares were \$28 million -- 61% above last November.

Seven Accidents In Co. In Dec.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of December, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,400.00 The rural traffic accident

summary for this county during calendar year of 1968 shows a total of 125 crashes resulting in 15 persons killed 67 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$183,595.00.

The final date of the 1969 motor vehicle inspection period for all motor vehicles registered in Texas is drawing near. The sergeant stated, "Since the beginning of the inspection period, September 1, 1968, only about one and one-half million vehicles have been inspected and approximately five million more remain to be inspected."

Texas law requires inspection of brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, steering, wheels and rims and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt ancharages were part of the manufacturer's original equip-

The inspection fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost of repairs and adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass in-




