RIVES TWINS SIGN PRE-ENROLLMENT FOR TECH



County Officials Attend Meeting

County judges and commissioners from 108 Texas counties attended and participated in their 11th annual conference held here at Texas A&M University.

The conference, held Sunday Feb. 5 with registration and was concluded with the afternoon session Feb. 7th. As in past years, the conference was sponsored by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas and the Agricultural Extension Service.

Attending from Wheeler County were Commissioners N. L. Sechrist, Clois Hanner and E. E. Henderson.

This year's program was developed around problems of current concern to the county officials. Judge J.C. Davis, Jr. assistant Texas Attorney General, spoke on changes which have occurred in his field relating to county officials' responsibilities.

Dr. Kenross-Wright, commissioner, Texas Department of Mental Retardation and Mental Health, discussed the program he directs as it affects Texans.

Also, members of the University's Texas Transportation Institute presented a program on soil stabilizers, road base materials and other topics of prime concern to county commissioners.

The program was arranged to provide ample time for questions and answers and full participation by everyone attending, reported V.G. Young, assistant director for the Extension Service and coordinator for the conference, since its inception.

The pre-enrollment application in the Southwest Conference is for a four-year scholarship. This includes room board, books, fees, tuition and \$10.00 a month for laundry money. This is the maximum allowed by the Southwest Conference.

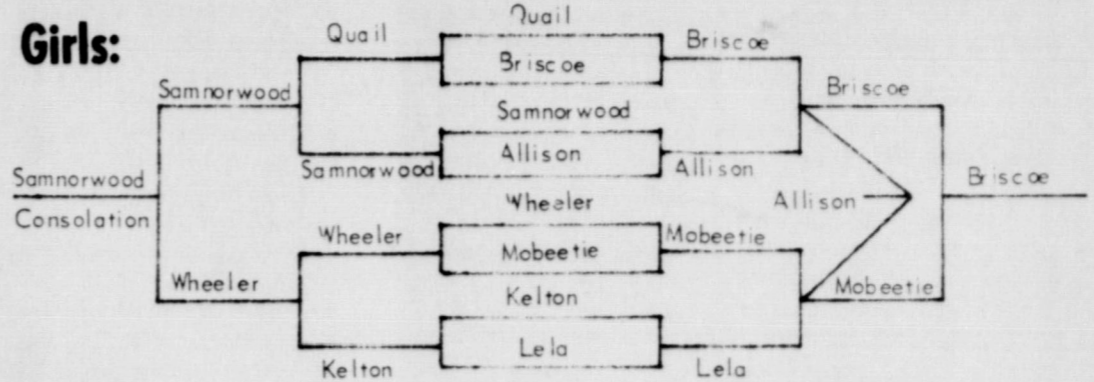

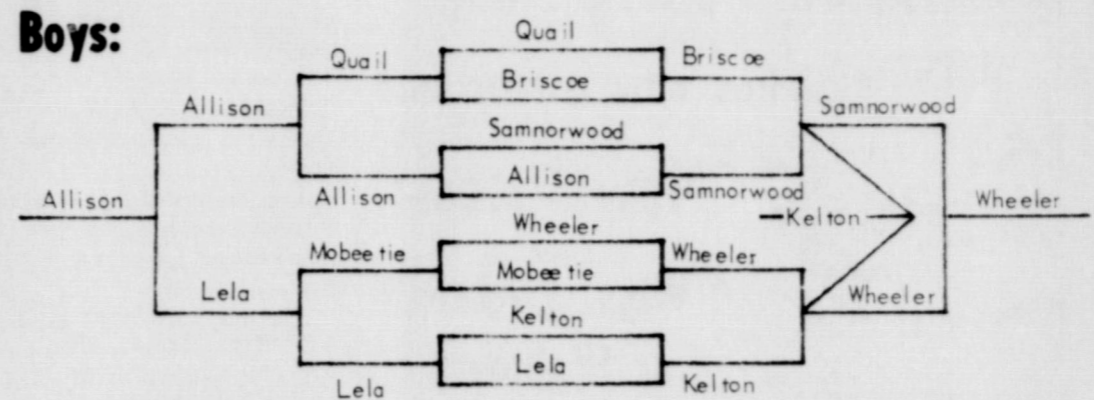

ACROSS THE FENCE

Green Up Wheat! Fog and moisture laden air did just that. However, we need moisture now in the form of rain or snow to be really set.

Each new year produces an array of new flowering annuals. It's not too early to begin planning for the colorful inexpensive easy to grow annuals. Some new petunias include "Harvest Moon", "Tangerine", "Scarlet Mound", "Lollipop", "Pink Bell" and many others. Comanche has been our most reliable Petunia here as it is low growing and tends to take high winds well. The popular "Carefree Geraniums" of last year adds the carefree crimson to its list for 1969.

Pruning: We suggest that major pruning on shade trees should be done during the winter months, while the trees are dormant. The first and foremost purpose of pruning is to maintain a strong framework for the future development of the tree. Other reasons are to reduce the size or to keep them within specific bounds. To remove dead, diseased or weak growth as well as broken limbs and rubbing branches or other reasons. A side benefit is the increasing of the size and quality of flowers and fruits. To protect pruning cuts and prevent the entry of disease and insect organisms, all cuts over one inch in diameter should be painted with a special tree paint obtainable at all garden stores. If there is any evidence of disease in the tree or shrub, dip the pruning shears or saw in a disinfectant to kill the disease organisms to prevent their spread to other portions of the tree. A 10% household bleach solution makes a very satisfactory disinfectant. Mix one part of

bleach to nine parts of water. Dip the pruning equipment after each cut is made.

Dale Dyon over at Mobeetie says he like the look of Alfalfa, mentioning intentions of planting more of it this year. Our acreage is steadily increasing. Our current estimate is around 2500 acres. Going prices ranged somewhere in the neighborhood of \$22-\$25 in the field and we've received many reports of folks netting \$50 and over on the average from each acre planted.

It could be possible that substantial savings in machinery operations and labor costs could be made with cotton. Recent Arizona research indicates that reduced pre-plant tillage can be used without necessarily cutting yields.

Almost any size feeder pig you buy will turn a profit on prospective slaughter hog markets. A 40 pound pig will cover all direct costs and leave \$7-\$8 for labor and overhead when sold next spring. Mabel Ault, near Allison, who raises her own pigs and feeds them out, tells us she can clear \$20 a head on present prices. An interesting innovation of her operation was that she feeds whole maize and figures the grinding is not justified in gain performance.

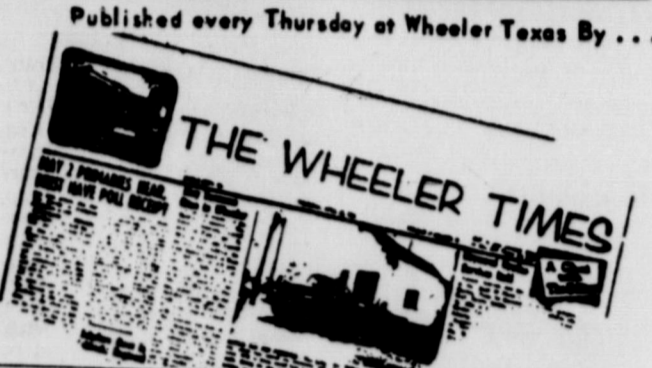

\$70 per acre. These varieties were double rowed, got \$14 to the acre worth of fertilizer and received 3 irrigations.
Duane Scott says our Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Handbooks will be out in March. These and some other real good ones will be in this year's handbook. We encourage you to get your copy.
Two years ago, wheat farmers were having trouble, here, with foot rot. An agricultural research soil scientist in Pullman Washington may have found an answer in Anhydrous Ammonia. At present, there is no adequate control of the disease which infects wheat yields, lowering them as much as 50 percent. After injection into the soil ammonia turns to nitrite and nitrate. Tests indicated that an application of anhydrous ammonia reduces the viability of the spores and could offer us a good control of foot rot. For additional grazing, folks here may wish to consider a top dressing of nitrogen this spring.
Feedlots with movies for steers? No, not quite, but feedlots will be supplying popcorn for feeder cattle in the near future. We understand that Volum papers will be built in Pampa to supply the feedlots.

Herbs Make Food Flavorable
By Brenda W. Hofmann, CHDA
The use of herbs and spices is an art. Long experience has indicated that certain foods are given a more pleasing flavor by combining them with herbs or spices. There isn't any set rule in using herbs or spices but some care should be taken. The most important factors in using them are interest, imagination and constant experimentation.
Some blend flavor effects are gained by combining a leading flavor with two or three that blend. The strongest flavors come from Rosemary, Sage and Savory. Herbs good for accent are Basil, Dill, Mint, Marjoram, Tarragon and Thyme. Others that are good in blends are Chervil, Chive and Parsley.
Storage of spices and herbs are very important. For best result keep spices in a cool dry place. Never store them near the range. Heat robs their flavor just as does exposure to the air. During the hottest periods of the year, it is practical to protect spices such as paprika, cayenne and chili pepper by placing them in the refrigerator. Whole spices have a much longer storage life than ground. Ground spices shouldn't be kept longer than six months. Strength, quality of flavor and color are the guides to good spices. Look for rich fresh color. If you have to do

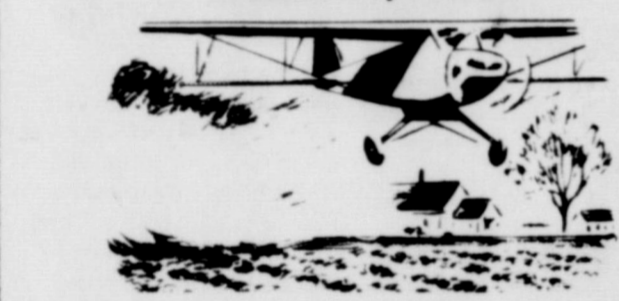

American Cancer Society News

"The American Cancer Society is beginning to win... the 1,500,000 Americans alive to day, who once had cancer and are cured... these are the measure of how far we have come in the battle against cancer," Dr. Paige Carruth, Ph. D. told the delegates at the District Crusade Meeting held in Amarillo on January 28, 1969.

Dr. Carruth told the delegates, "The ACS research investment in Texas is over \$1,154,000. This means that the Society is actually spending 13% more money on its programs of research, education and service than we raised in Texas last year." The extra money spent in Texas is due to the large sums allocated by the ACS National program of research to Texas institutions.

Dr. Carruth of Canyon is State Schools & Colleges Committee member. He is on the West Texas State College faculty and presided at the morning session. A copy of the Texas Division Annual Report, distributed during this session, summarized the accomplishments of the Society during its 1968 program year.

Services provided to 7,546 cancer patients in the form of volunteer transportation, dressings, sick room equipment and gift items.

Public education programs reached more than 1,250,000 people with film showings and physician speakers. Educational exhibits reached an additional 3,970,000. Educational messages and programs carried by the media; 7,319,000 exposures.

The support of 19 tumor clinics with a total of 94,427 cases reported as of September 1, 1968.

Clinical fellowships were awarded to 15 physicians and dentists to promote interest and research in the cancer field.

Professional programs reached an audience of 34,124 in the medical and allied health professions.

Want To Be A Patrolman?

An invitation has been issued to any high caliber young men of this area who feel that can compete for the position of patrolman with the Department of Public Safety. "The opportunity exists for several men to meet the challenge of the rigid qualifications for patrolmen in the four field services-Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Drivers License and Motor Vehicle Inspection," Major Luther Moore said today.

The DPS Commander stated, "If you are good enough, we can use you; however, we do not want anything but the best. If you cannot meet our standards there is no need of applying for the positions."

"Assignment to one of the above services will be made on the basis of aptitude, interest and ability at the conclusion of a period of intense basic training. Then specialized training in the assigned service will be given to those that qualify after which a home station will be designated," Moore said.

Applicants must be between 20 and 35 years old, at least 68 inches tall, weight not less than two pounds or more than 3 1/2 pounds per inch of height and be in sound physical condition. They must have a high school education or the equivalent and their record must be able to stand rigid examination pertaining to character and citizenship. Selection procedures will include written and oral examinations.

"The law enforcement field is a challenge to young men who are seeking a career and the Texas DPS is rated among the top law enforcement agencies in the world," Major Moore said.
