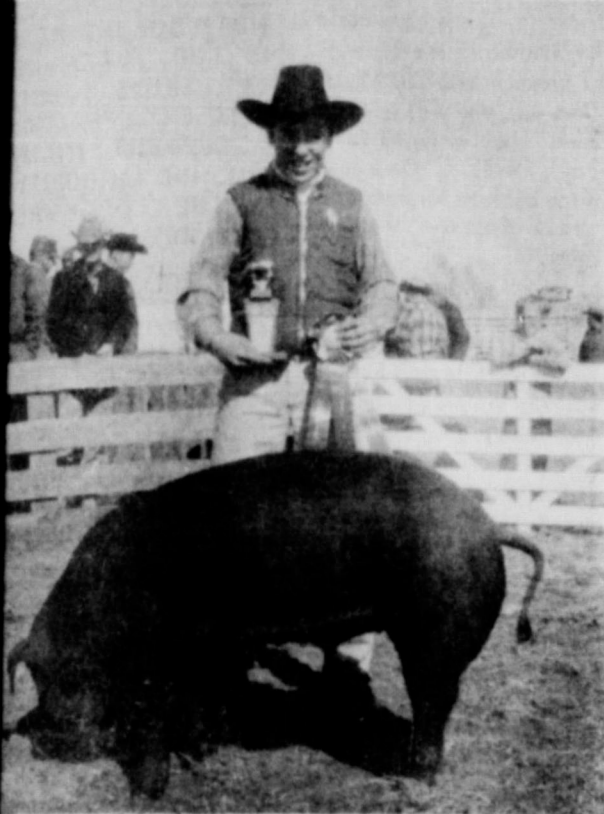

Archie Trimble of Wheeler showed the Grand Champion Barrow in the 2nd annual Wheeler County Pig Show held March 1st in Wheeler. H&H Milling Co. of Wheeler paid 70¢ per pound for the Wheeler Future Farmer's Pig.

Doug Dollar of Allison took Reserve Champion honors and his pig was sold to Harry Wofford for 40 cents per pound.

Grand Champion Gilt honors went to Bo Dunn, 4-H member from Mobeetie while Reserve Champion female honors went to Terry Grayson, Allison FFA.

Over three thousand dollars worth of hogs changed hands. The hogs averaged forty-one cents per pound in the sale or about eighty-three dollars per head. Shelby Pettit of Wheeler was the auc-

ioneer and Jerry Hawkins, Voc. Ag. teacher from Clarendon Junior College was the show judge.

Scott Luttrell, Wheeler FFA, won the showmanship trophy sponsored by the Wheeler office of Canadian Production Credit Association.

## TEXAS POLITICS

Rep. Malouf Abraham This past week marked the beginning of the real work in the Legislature. Six hundred and twenty bills have been introduced and the Committee hearings are underway. With about 60 bills being heard last week. Our sessions on the floor are beginning to show some signs of life. We had a couple of bills that created considerable sparks and a few stars for this early in the session.

The Governor has laid out his budget and his plan to raise the nearly \$250 million additional funds the next two years to finance the budget. Of course, he doesn't actually expect that his proposals will be the end result. This is just to get something before the House as it is primarily up to us.

Everyone is making very statesman-like comments about how it needs to be trimmed and as to how the tax should or shouldn't be raised. I know it would be extremely popular if such a thing as lowering spending and taxes were to happen. There just isn't any way of getting around the increased costs of government.

Inflation has taken about 10¢ out of every dollar the past 3 years and people continue to demand more and more services. We are a fast grow-

ing state and it takes money. Our only hope is that the present administration in Washington will be able to cut down some of the programs there that have expanded so much the past few years, and that require the states to come up with additional funds or else.

However, this isn't going to happen in the immediate future whether you like it or not. This mess didn't come about overnight nor is it going to be solved overnight either. I am convinced that we come nearer getting our money's worth out of our State taxes than from upstairs.

There is no question that Education is very essential to upgrading our economy. We have extreme shortages in Mental Health programs, Rehabilitation, Medical and Dental Schools and on and on. This all takes money and there's only one place to get it. Any Volunteers?

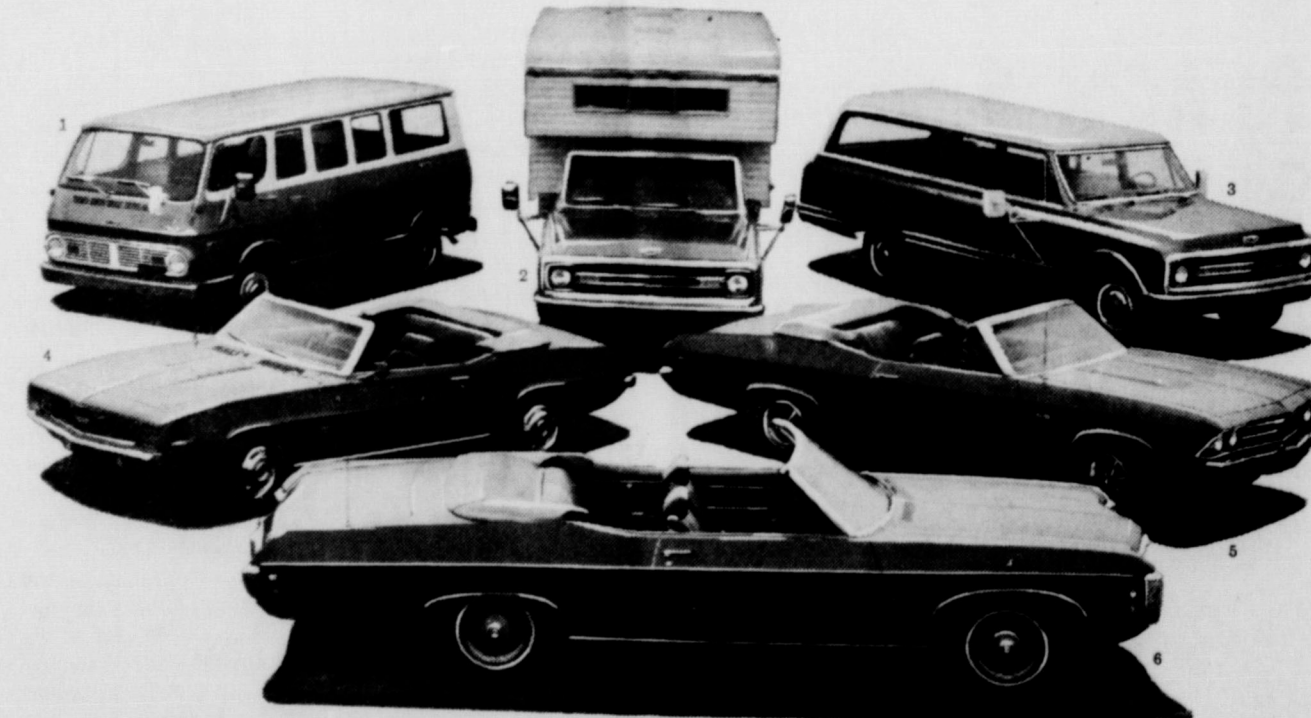

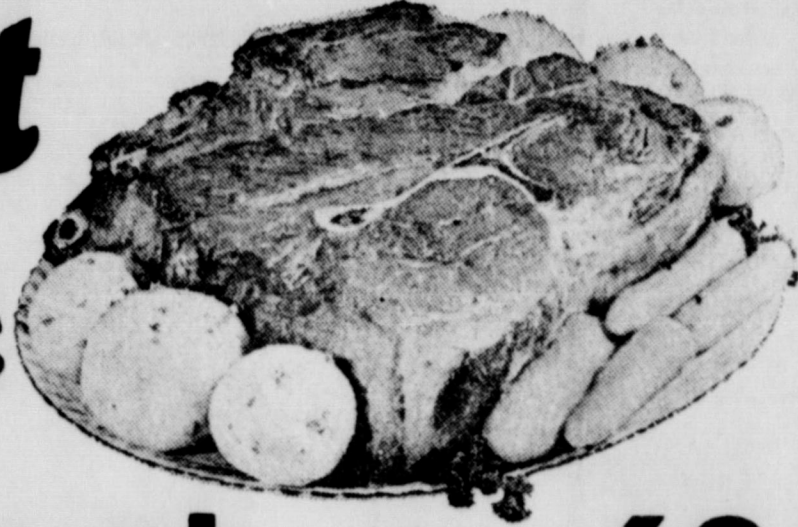
