### TEXAS POLITICS

Rep. Malouf Abraham We had a most inspiring ceremony this past week in a joint session. It was called to honor S. S. Clarence Sasser from Brazoria County. This young 21 year old Negro Soldier is the first of his race from Texas to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor which President Nixon presented him earlier this month.

He was an unarmed medic and went to the rescue of a large group of wounded men although he was also shot through the legs. This young man was an inspiration to all of us. His brief speech was just right and you could hear all the people in the House trying to swallow the lumps in their throats.

Governor Smith came back again to propose some other sources of revenue to replace the tax on chemicals and cigarettes sounds fine to everyone except the industries involved. His proposal to increase moving traffic violations by \$10 has considerable opposition.

We are now about halfway through this session - time-wise we are only about 15% done work-wise. The Governor's Committee Education Bill will be heard in Committee this week - all 368 pages of it. This will take a lot of hours and the old saying about the mind being only able to absorb as much as the seat can stand will hold true with this hearing which will probably last six hours or more. We are still in good shape as far as the forced consolidation matter goes.

You don't have any idea how fortunate we are to live up where we do. When you hear all of these problems that other people in Texas have that we don't you want to sigh with relief. Nearly every time I pick up a paper down here I see where they are either arresting or trying some young people on dope charges - I mean down to kids as young as 15. There have been 22 soldiers from Ft. Hood killed this year in traffic accidents. Hold-ups and shootings are too numerous to notice.

Actually I think we are probably doing a lot better job down here than most people think. All of these problems of the State are our responsibility, and finding the proper solutions and the money it takes is very difficult. It's real easy to "Monday morning Quarterback" the things we do when you don't have to hear the evidence and have to make the decisions. Keep me posted in your thinking about the various things we are trying to find answers to.

agencies, making available the valuable financial support needed for creative and innovative research.

With rancher support and interest, an effective attack can be made on brush similar to the recent screw worm campaign.

On November 23, at Austin, a Brush Control and Range Improvement Foundation was established with John Matthews of Abilene as Chairman, Bill Donnell of Marathon, Vice-Chairman and Robb Brown of Throckmorton as Secretary. The state has been divided, approximately along the lines of Extension districts and within each district, a leader has been chosen to represent the Foundation in its fund drive. The goal is to obtain 1¢ per acre yearly for 5 years from each owner of rangeland.

The funds collected will be distributed to various research organizations with the capability of solving brush control problems. The money will be distributed on the

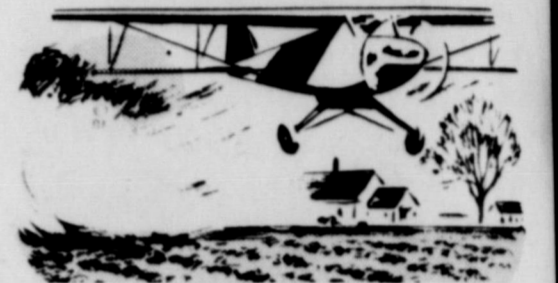

## ACROSS the FENCE

Our 1969 Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program Handbooks are printed and available at our office. Noticed that Red River 68, the new spring wheat, made 4 bushels to the acre in Wellington tests.

Interest in corn production in the Panhandle has increased rapidly during the past two years. We figure a man can make more money growing corn than he can raise - if he has the equipment to gather the corn with. Based on figures worked out by our Farm Management specialist in Amarillo, a man could make \$20 more money per acre growing corn than he can raise. The reason is that corn is worth 85 cents more per hundred pounds than maize.

An interesting new A&P publication that would pay a young farmer to study is "Investment Requirements for \$3,000 Labor-Management Return." It's got some information in it that we've known for a long time but it shows the hours of labor needed to make \$3,000 on the farm, the amount of money investment and the number of animal units. Included are beef cattle operations, hogs, dairy and broiler enterprises. A man can make \$3,000 from 20 sows with an investment of only \$4,800. This can be done with 640 hours of labor. On the other hand, it

takes \$100,000 with 200 mother cows to turn the same \$3,000 in the cow-calf business. Ironically it takes nearly 3 times as much labor 1600 hours to tend to the cows as it does to tend the pigs. This could be the reason we're seeing more pig operations here especially where the limiting factor is land, labor and capital.

What gardener doesn't have trouble with aphids? Scientists have found that aluminum foil more than doubles the yield of vegetables and flowers. Aluminum paint applied to Black Polyethylene sheets also gave similar results. The reflected ultraviolet rays, they say caused the flying insects to change their course. The foil is placed over the soil and around the plants.

It's about time to prune Hybrid tea roses. If they are not severely pruned, the bushes will become large and difficult to care for and the flowers will be small and poor quality. Be sure and cut back the top growth to within 12 to 15 inches above the ground. Retain from 4 to 6 of the healthy canes arising from the bus union or within 4 to 6 inches above the union. Prune climbing roses after the big flush of spring bloom. On climbers any cane over two years old should be removed and last year's growth should be thinned. Seal all cuts one-half inch or larger with a good tree

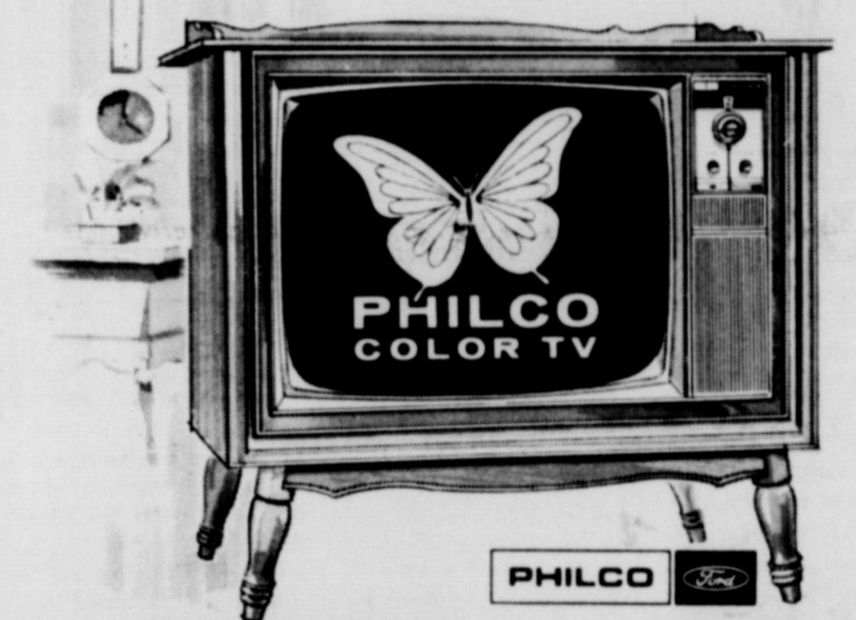

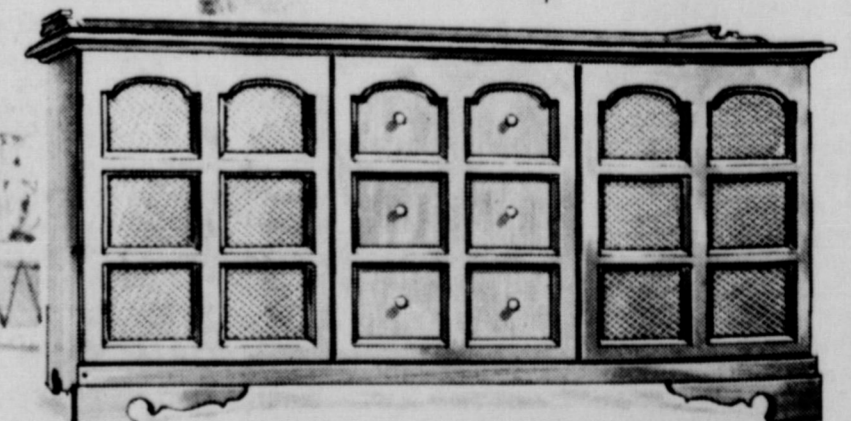

# Across the Fence

 Let's stamp out Brush! Our county is joining with ranchers across the state in an effort to find cheaper, more effective methods of controlling brush.

The decision was made last Thursday night by twenty community leaders meeting in the P.C.A. office in Wheeler. The name of their organization is the Wheeler County Brush Control and Range Improvement Association. Clarence Zybach, Briscoe, has been named chairman. Their association will be connected with the statewide brush control effort who will join hands with us to fight one of the state's major agricultural problems - brush invasion of land throughout Texas.

Their goal is to obtain 1 cent per acre each year, for five years from landowners and other interested individuals and organizations to greatly increase brush control research. We stopped the screwworm thanks to the support and concern of ranchers like yourselves all over the state working together. We can get on top of this brush problem the same way. Over the state, the carrying capacity of range land has decreased at least 50%. With the cost of brush control continually escalating, it is the feeling of our ranchers that we are losing ground even further. Surveys show that over 82% of Texas Rangelands are infested with brush. Despite over 30 years of past research by Texas A&M and others, greater financial help will be needed if the problem is to be solved.

John Reneau in Shamrock will be the official Secretary - Treasurer and contributions may be mailed to him. In Wheeler, James Verden will accept funds for the association. A section worth of brush will be figured at \$6.40. Contributions are tax-deductible and checks should be made to the Wheeler County Brush Control Association. Kick-off date for the official fund drive will be April 1 and funds will be solicited by committeemen until May 1.

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON THE BRUSH PROBLEM & THE NEW BRUSH CONTROL & RANGE IMPROVEMENT FOUNDATION**

In addition, the USDA supports the activities of several scientists, with a budget totaling nearly \$145,000 in Texas. Texas Tech has received a line appropriation from the legislature of \$100,000 for brush control.

Many of these studies have involved basic laboratory experiments, requiring large outlays for operating funds, equipment, chemicals, etc. Numerous field tests, many of which have been established with the cooperation of ranchers throughout the state, have studied the use of promising chemicals, root plowing, fire and other methods under actual range conditions.

Thanks to the cooperation of many ranchers, over 1,500 plots from 5 to 20 acres in size, have been established to test hundreds of new chemicals, techniques, methods of application and the development of more effective and economical means of control. Additional large-scale experimental tests are being conducted at 6 strategic locations in Texas to evaluate promising methods over a wide range of different kinds of brush, soils, rainfall and topography.

More than 135 reports dealing with the brush problem have been published by Texas A&M researchers since 1946. At present 9 professional staff members are engaged directly in brush research, or in projects that bear on range improvement where brush is a problem. Effective research requires highly skilled scientists, laboratories and scientific apparatus. About \$50,000 is required each year to maintain a highly qualified scientist and equip him with the necessary laboratory facilities and technicians. Federal and state monies help underwrite a broad, continuing program, but other sources must provide the NEW MONEY required to put a statewide brush program over the top.

Many commercial companies, such as those engaged in production of chemicals, and heavy machinery, have supported research with grants of money, equipment and materials. Many are willing to do more, with the prospect of new markets for their products, providing the right program is available to warrant such support.

**Rancher Support Is Vital**  
 Through the years, many ranchers have cooperated with research personnel and with industry by providing the range sites and resources necessary for field-testing promising materials and methods. But much more will be required in the future. A major source of additional money could be supplied by the ranchers themselves, plus livestock organizations and industries interested in the problem or from public-minded foundations.

Up to the present, no organized effort of a sustained nature has been developed to help in the attack on brush on a broad base. Logically, this should start with the people most concerned, the ranchers, since they will profit most from an effective brush control program.

More and more, it is evident that livestock producers must take an active part in solving their own problems, in cooperation with existing agencies. A vast reservoir of support is possible from more than 200,000 livestock producers in Texas. If as little as 1¢ per acre could be obtained yearly from ranchmen for brush research, a major source of funds would become available to mount an aggressive and massive assault on the brush problem.

Time is a big factor in brush control. Experiments started today may not bear fruit until 5 and even 10 to 15 years hence. Costly mistakes and recommendations based on too limited data must be avoided. Early treatment may be essential to an economical program.

Many difficulties arise in the clearance of certain promising chemicals, even though they have proved to be effective. A wide margin of safety is required, and damaging residues to other crops and in water supplies must be avoided or minimized. This is becoming a major factor, requiring much basic research above and beyond that necessary to demonstrate a kill of brush.

**A Brush Control Foundation Has Been Formed**  
 Recognizing the urgency of the problem and the need for financial support, a group of interested ranchers and producers started several years ago to build a unified and cohesive program of brush control research in Texas. Meetings were held at Spur and Abilene with representatives of the entire livestock industry present and participating. A Brush Control and Cont'd. P. 5 - Brush

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# Gelatin Salad, Spark, Variety

Nothing can add such spark and variety to a meal than a gelatin salad. It gives color, change of texture and coolness to a meal. There are so many different molds that can be used for variety of shapes. Add a sparkle to your meal, prepare a gelatin salad.

Gelatin salad can be made from sweetened flavored or unsweetened gelatin. Just be sure to use the one the recipe calls for. Sweetened flavored gelatin contains sugar and can be dissolved immediately with hot water. Unsweetened gelatin comes in a powder or granulated form and should be dissolved in 1/4 to 1/2 cup of cold water before putting in a hot liquid. When a recipe calls for sugar, it can be mixed with the powder gelatin. This mixture can be dissolved with hot water.

Fruits, vegetables, meats or nuts, are added to gelatin. The gelatin should be chilled to an unbeaten egg white consistency before folding in the ingredients. Fruits, that float are mandarin oranges, frozen blueberries, grapefruit, raspberries, peaches, melon balls and strawberries; fresh apples, bananas and pears. Fruits that have a tendency to sink are canned apricots, Bing cherries, peaches, pears, pineapple and plums. Never use fresh or frozen pineapple because it contains an enzyme that dissolves its gelling properties.

If the gelatin salad is to be served on a hot day, prepare it the day before. It does not melt as fast if it has aged some. It also keeps its gell longer if congealed with a moderate temperature.

**Strawberry Marshmallow Whip**  
1-3 oz. Pkg. strawberry gelatin  
1-Cup boiling water  
1-Cup cold water  
2-Cups prepared whipped topping  
1 1/2 cups miniature marshmallows  
1-13 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained  
Dissolve strawberry gelatin in boiling water. Add cold water. Chill until slightly thickened. Set bowl of gelatin firmly in a bowl of ice. Whip with a rotary beater until very light and fluffy. Fold into marshmallows and pineapple. Pour into 8 cup mold and chill until firm. Unmold. Yield 8 to 10 servings.

## Great Plains Conservation

"The Great Plains Conservation Program has proved that it has lasting influence," states Douglas Cunningham, Area Conservationist, Soil Con- servation Service in Pam- pa. We all know some of the outstanding benefits of the program, however, the true test of any con- servation program is how well the farmer and ranch- er maintains, improves, and keeps the conserva- tion program applied to the land after it is applied.

A recent analysis of 500 expired GP contracts in this area shows that only 16 or three percent are not being maintained. Most of these contracts that have not been main- tained have had a change in ownership. These had only a few acres of grass seedings being plowed out and put back to cropland where erosion will be a problem. This is very reas- suring as the GPCP is in its 11th year of operation and it is significant that the program is improv- ing effective in helping landowners complete last- ing conservation programs.

In reviewing conserva- tion plans on these expired contracts we were told by many that without GPCP assistance their conservation plans could never have been completed. Of special assistance has been the cooperation help of the Farmers Home Administration, Agricul- tural Conservation Pro- gram and the GPCP in helping young farmers stabilize their operations so they could stay on the farm. Other outstanding accomplishments have been the establishing of grass on submarginal croplands and eroding rangeland. Especially are the grass seedings out- standing on deep sands which were non-productive and eroding prior to stabilization.

# QUAIL HUNTING

As a result of recent bills introduced by Rep. Malouf Abraham in the state legislature to shorten the quail season in Wheeler Co., local Parks & Wildlife Department personnel were contacted to determine why they recommend the present long season. A summary of their reasons is given below.

The present quail season, second Saturday in November to January 31, was set only after years of accumulated research data, collected by field biologists, indicated that the longer season is best. They have found, by examining thousands of quail wings taken from birds harvested in Wheeler Co., that the majority of quail are hatched around July 1. These birds are mature and of har- vestable size by October first. However, in order to handle the possibility of a later hatch the above November opening date was set. This insures a minimum of immature birds in the hunter's bag.

According to Parks and Wildlife biologists, less than two percent of the quail harvested during the longer season have been immature birds. Approxi- mately ten percent of the annual quail population is harvested by hunters, the remainder is harvested by hunters, the remainder is harvested by nature.

The longer season has created a better land- owner - hunter relationship. The hunter has a longer period to select his place to hunt and the landowner to select his hunters. This has led to less trespass and property damage.

If the present season is satisfactory to you, please contact your County Commissioners and Rep. Malouf Abraham to prevent passing a bill which would disregard the recommendations of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

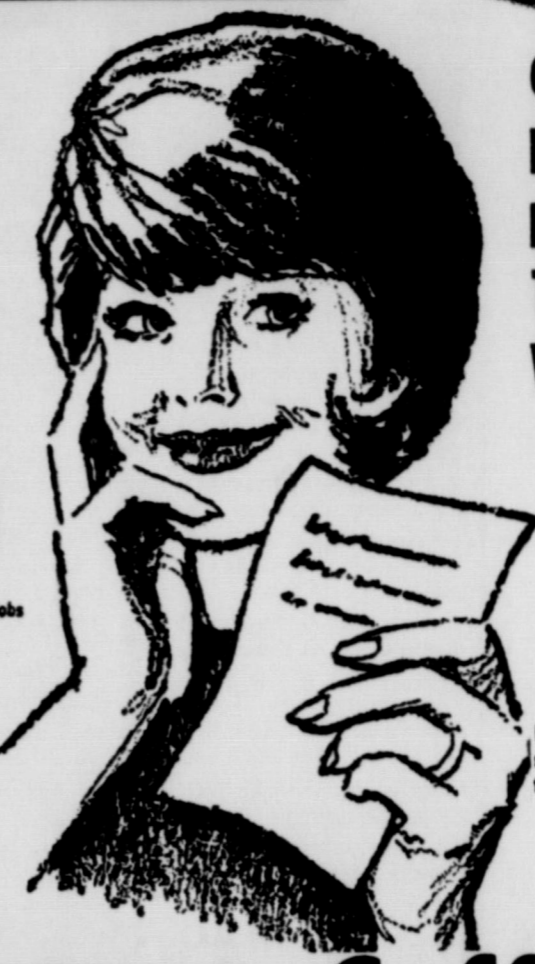
