Saturday, April 4, is election day in Wheeler and surrounding communities for School, Hospital and City Elections. The polls will open at 7:00 A.M. and close at 7:00 P.M.

**WHEELER**  
Wheeler citizens will to the polls Saturday, April 4, to elect School Board members, Hospital Directors and City Officials. Wheeler voters will vote in all three elections at the Wheeler Gym.

Two trustees are to be elected in the Wheeler School election. James Verden and W. D. Mitchell each have filed for re-election to the board of trustees.

Joe Rogers will be presiding judge with Ella Evans as clerk.

Voters in the Wheeler Hospital District will elect a director for Parkview Hospital. Two names appear on the ballot; they are C. B. Kirk and Jim Montgomery. Mrs. Fat Jones will be

election judge. Voters in the city election will vote for a Mayor and two aldermen. Mayor Pete Burton is seeking his first full term as mayor, having served one year of the unexpired term of Don Earney. Councilman Robert Denson is seeking election for a third term on the council and Louis Stas will be seeking his first full term as councilman.

Election judge for the city election will be Laura Guthrie. Mary Finsterwald and Ida Farmer will be clerks for the election.

### Census Takers Have I. D.

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, District Manager R. L. Butler pointed out today. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the area on April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks. Each census taker will

wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office, which is located at Amarillo.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary for her work.

### COALITION FARM BILL IN WASHINGTON

If major farm programs are allowed to expire at the end of this year, disaster will follow in the rural economy, a Fly-In group of some 260 farmers from eight states told members of the House and Senate here early this week.

Paul Hathaway was among farm and rural leaders from Texas, Minnesota, South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico, Kansas and Pennsylvania, making the House and Senate calls and delivering Farmers Union recommendations on major legislative needs of agriculture.

"The Farmers Union has worked with 25 other general farm and commodity groups to develop the coalition farm bill. This bill—the Purcell bill—is co-sponsored by more than 50 members of the House and Senate. It is not just that Farmers Union believes it is needed, but it provides the farmwork on which Congress can build an improved, long-range program," said Tony T. Dechant, national president of Farmers Union.

"Time is running short and we can no longer wait for an Administration farm bill. Members of Congress will have to go ahead and take the initiative and our coalition farm bill gives them the vehicle with which to start," he said.

"A year ago, they were telling the farm groups to get together. We did," declared Dechant. "Now, it is time to move the next step from coalition to consensus. One by one, the possible alternatives have been examined and rejected and the Coalition Farm Bill stands out as the one alternative which is broad in scope and would bring about a measurable improvement in farm prices and income."

Jay Naman, president of the Texas Farmers Union, warned against either elimination of parity as a basis for farm support levels or making the farm programs entirely discretionary with the Secretary of Agriculture. The 65-member Texas delegation headed by Naman met with ASCS Administrator Kenneth Frick to protest a

A 13 percent reduction in "projected yields" of cotton. The meeting was called by Congressman George Mahon of the 19th Congressional District of Texas.

A group of rice farmers in the Texas delegation also protested the reduction of rice acreage allotments for 1970. The grassroots lobbyists also urged restoration of advance payments in the 1970 farm programs, inclusion of a strengthened food stamp program in the farm bill and a rollback of the currently excessive interest rates.

Other issues on which the Fly-In delegates worked were approval of the Senate version of the G.I. education bill, now nearing a House-Senate conference; reduction of the premium fee in the voluntary doctor care part of the Medicare program, now scheduled to go from \$4.00 a month to \$5.30 a month on July 1; an increase in the

minimum monthly benefits under the Social Security program to \$100 a month for individuals and \$150 a month for couples; and an increase in federal aid to education to help alleviate the tax burden on local property taxpayers.

In a session at the Department of Agriculture Monday, the Fly-In group met with Secretary Clifford M. Hardin; his executive assistant, E. F. Behrens; Carl Farrington of the ASCS; Andrew Mair, specialist in international trade; Joseph Haspray of the Farmers Home Administration and Jan Greenstein of the Farm Credit Administration.

Also on Monday, the Fly-In members were given a briefing at the US State Department, by Irwin Hedges of the Food-Far-Peace program and Alfred Riefman of the Bureau of Economic Affairs. Special activities by the several state groups included breakfast sessions with House and Senate delega-

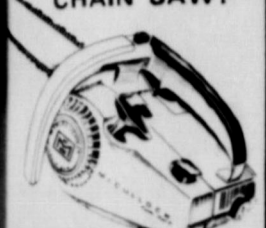
## Seminar On Family Life And Youth

precautionary measures. We to have resistant pears that may be used. Never plant Bartlett or other French-type pears in our area. They are very susceptible to fireblight. Magness, Moonglow, Kieffer and Orient should be used in new plantings of Pears. Trimming off affected limbs and branches, sterilizing the pruning shears with cloxol solution and burning the affected limbs and branches, is the suggested treatment. The spraying of trees with Bordeaux mixture that can be purchased at feed stores and garden centers has been used by many growers with much success.

Homeowners, as well as commercial growers, have been troubled with a fungal disease known as Peach scab or "freckles" on peaches. Sulfur or Captan can be used as a spray starting now and continuing until 14 days before harvest.

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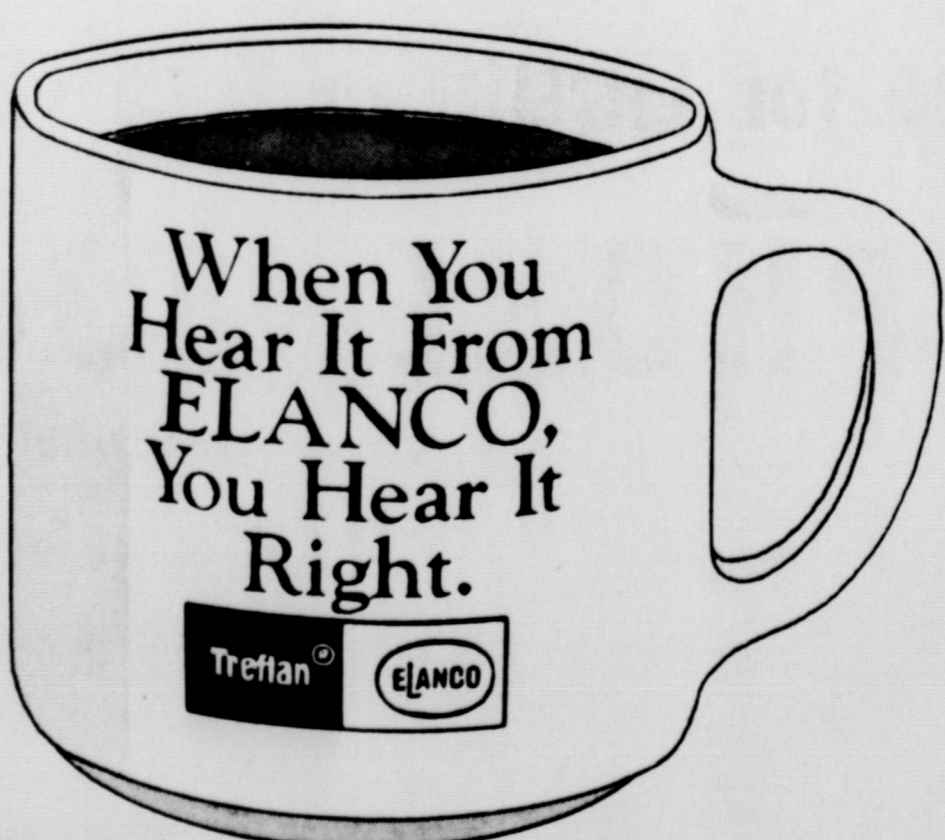

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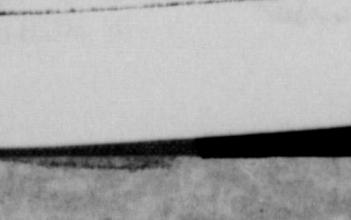
