
Capt. Dennis Cross **Receives Award**

Capt. Dennis D. Cross, brother of David Cross, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for meritorious service in Vietnam. The citation, presented by Col. Joseph P. Kingston, chief of staff at Quan Loi,

Vietnam reads: "For heroism while participating in aerial flight evidenced by voluntary act ion above and beyond the call of duty in the Republic of Vietnam. "Capt. Dennis D. Cross distinguished himself by exceptional and valorous action on August 11, 1969 while serving as pilot during a resupply mission near Quan Loi." With his plane critically damaged, Cross made a successful emergency landing. This action saved the aircraft and the lives of his crew.

Cross is married and has a 16-month son. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. V. Cross of Guthrie.




