JUDGE MCILHANY MAKES FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT STUDENTS TO COMPETE IN INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

District Judge Grainger McIlhany made his formal announcement of his candidacy as a Democrat for re-election to a second term as judge of the 31st Judicial District, which is made up of Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, and Wheeler counties.

By press release early in January he had previously been known to the voters of the 31st District that he was seeking their support for re-election.

Judge McIlhany stated that he is running on his record of efficient and fair conduct of the affairs of the District Court. During his first three years in office, he has disposed of a total of 1,918 cases which compares very favorably with the other multi-county district courts of Texas that carry civil, criminal and probate relations cases.

Before his election as District Judge, McIlhany served this area of Texas in the State House of Representatives for 18 years. He is a graduate of the University of Texas School of Law. He holds memberships both the American Bar Association and the Texas

State Bar. He is also a graduate of the National College of State Trial Judges held at the University of Pennsylvania School of Law and sponsored by the American Bar Association. He is married and has two sons and one daughter.

In soliciting the support of the voters of the 31st District in the Democratic Primary and in the November General Election, Judge McIlhany pledges his continued efforts to conduct the work of your District Court with fairness, efficiency and dignity.

A permanent executive committee is expected to be appointed when the PRPC meets at 1:45 April 16 at the Cafeteria in Sunset Center.

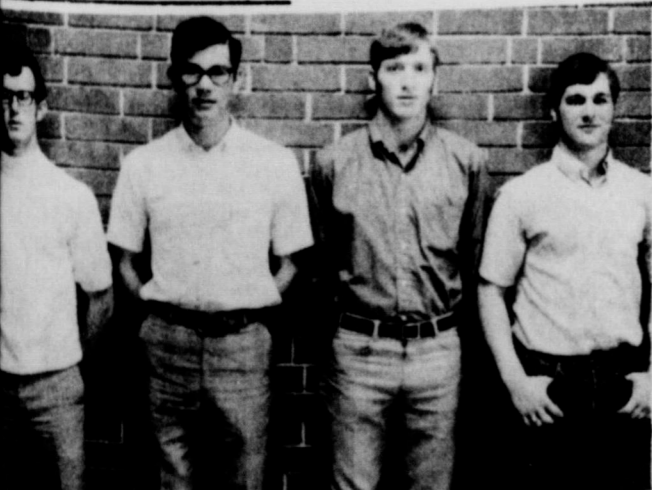
In other action Wednesday, the City of Shamrock was accepted into membership by City Councilmen A. D. Byard and Robert J. Adams

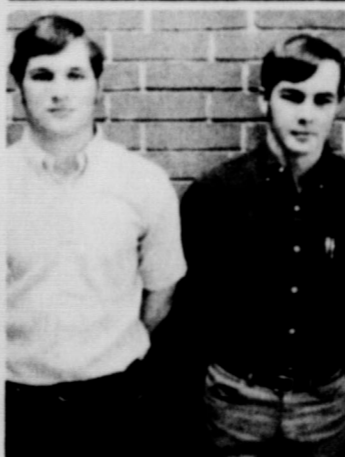

Capt. Dennis Cross Receives Award

Capt. Dennis D. Cross, brother of David Cross, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for meritorious service in Vietnam.

The citation, presented by Col. Joseph P. Kingston, chief of staff at Quan Loi, Vietnam reads:

"For heroism while participating in aerial flight evidenced by voluntary action above and beyond the call of duty in the Republic of Vietnam. "Capt. Dennis D. Cross distinguished himself by exceptional and valorous action on August 11, 1969 while serving as pilot during a resupply mission near Quan Loi." With his plane critically damaged, Cross made a successful emergency landing. This action saved the aircraft and the lives of his crew.

Cross is married and has a 16-month son. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. V. Cross of Guthrie.
