Buffalo Wallow Plant Enlarged

Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America currently is constructing additional facili-ties at its Buffalo Wallow gas treatment plant in Hemphill County which will increase that plant's daily capacity fourfold to 200 million cubic feet. Natural is a subsidiary of Peoples Gas Company of Chicago. The new facilities, to be com-

pleted next month at an estimated cost of \$2.7 million, will process up to 150 million cubic feet of gas daily from the Washi ta Creek field in Hemphill County. The plant, which went into operation on Feb. 6, 1969, currently treats gas from the Buffalo Wallow area only.

The plant utilizes the Sulfinol process developed by Shell Development Company to remove acid gases-carbon dioxide and hydrogen sulfide, as well as mercaptans-from the raw gas. This process brings gas up to pipeline quality for more efficient transmission and ultimate consumption.

Gas is found in formations more than 19,000 below the surface in Hemphill County, the level from which Natural receives gas.


