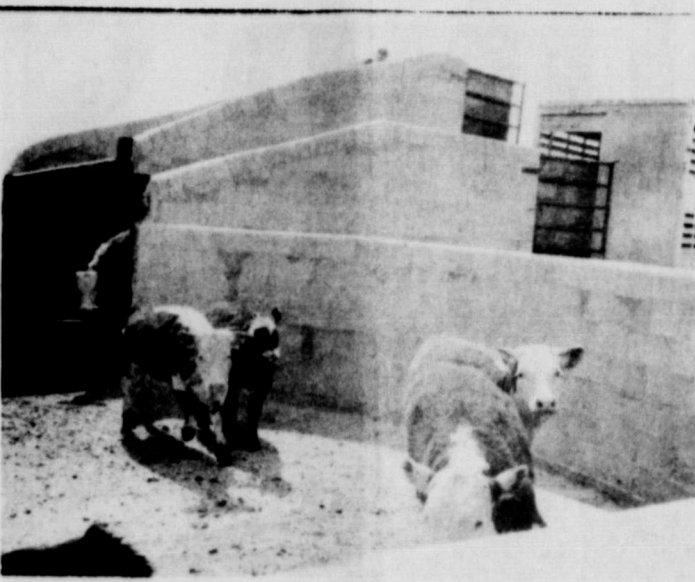

Buffalo Wallow Plant Enlarged

Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America currently is constructing additional facilities at its Buffalo Wallow gas treatment plant in Hemphill County which will increase that plant's daily capacity fourfold to 200 million cubic feet. Natural is a subsidiary of Peoples Gas Company of Chicago.

The new facilities, to be completed next month at an estimated cost of \$2.7 million, will process up to 150 million cubic feet of gas daily from the Washita Creek field in Hemphill County. The plant, which went into operation on Feb. 6, 1969, currently treats gas from the Buffalo Wallow area only.

The plant utilizes the Sulfinol process developed by Shell Development Company to remove acid gases—carbon dioxide and hydrogen sulfide, as well as mercaptans—from the raw gas. This process brings gas up to pipeline quality for more efficient transmission and ultimate consumption.

Gas is found in formations more than 19,000 feet below the surface in Hemphill County, the level from which Natural receives gas.

3 Million Homes In Next 10 Years

Administrator James V. Smith of the Farmers Home Administration has a National objective of building some 3 million rural homes with public assistance within the next decade. To achieve this we need new concepts in rural home building and new administrative procedures so we can commit more of our agency's resources to the private builders for housing development projects and other types of industrialized rural home building. Our aim is to triple last year's record this coming year.

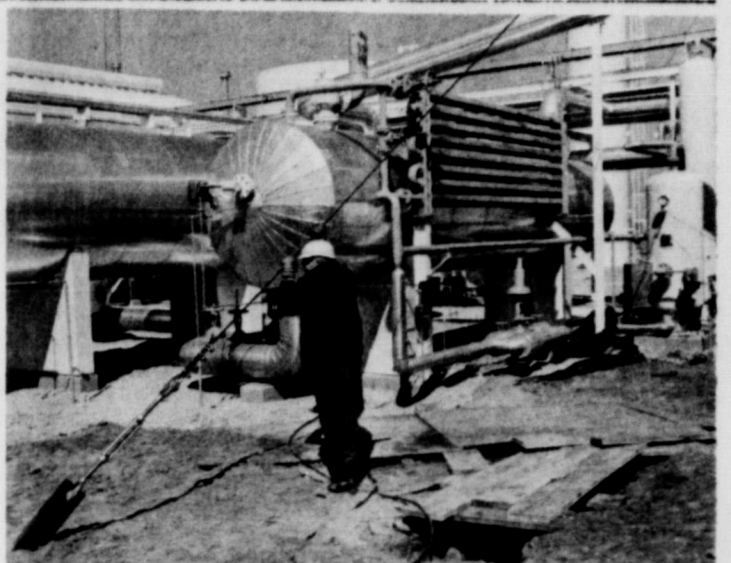
Farmers Home Administration has been authorized to issue conditional commitments on single-family dwellings in the open country and rural communities up to 5,500 population. The program is designed to encourage the construction or rehabilitation of single-family dwellings in rural areas for sale to low and moderate income families.

Representative Bob Price of Texas recently spoke out strongly in favor of the rural housing provisions in the 1969 housing bill. "Through its rural housing program," Representative Price said, "the Farmers Home Administration has been making substantial inroads on this problem, and it is vital that this activity not only be continued but accelerated."

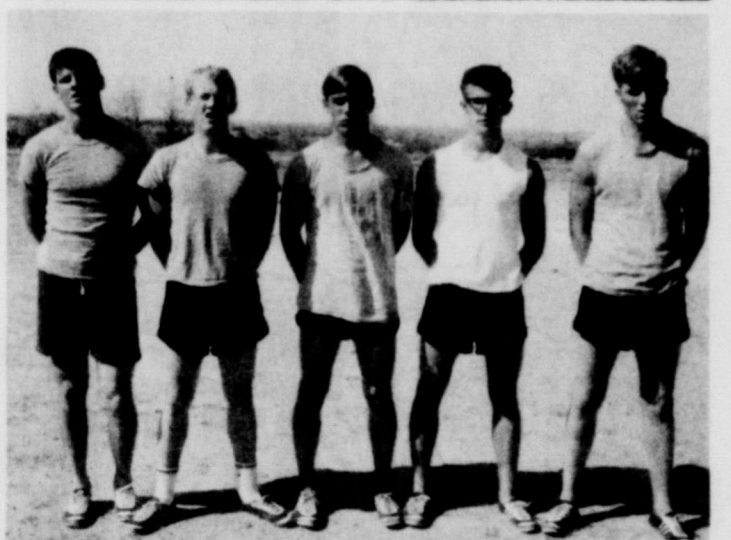
