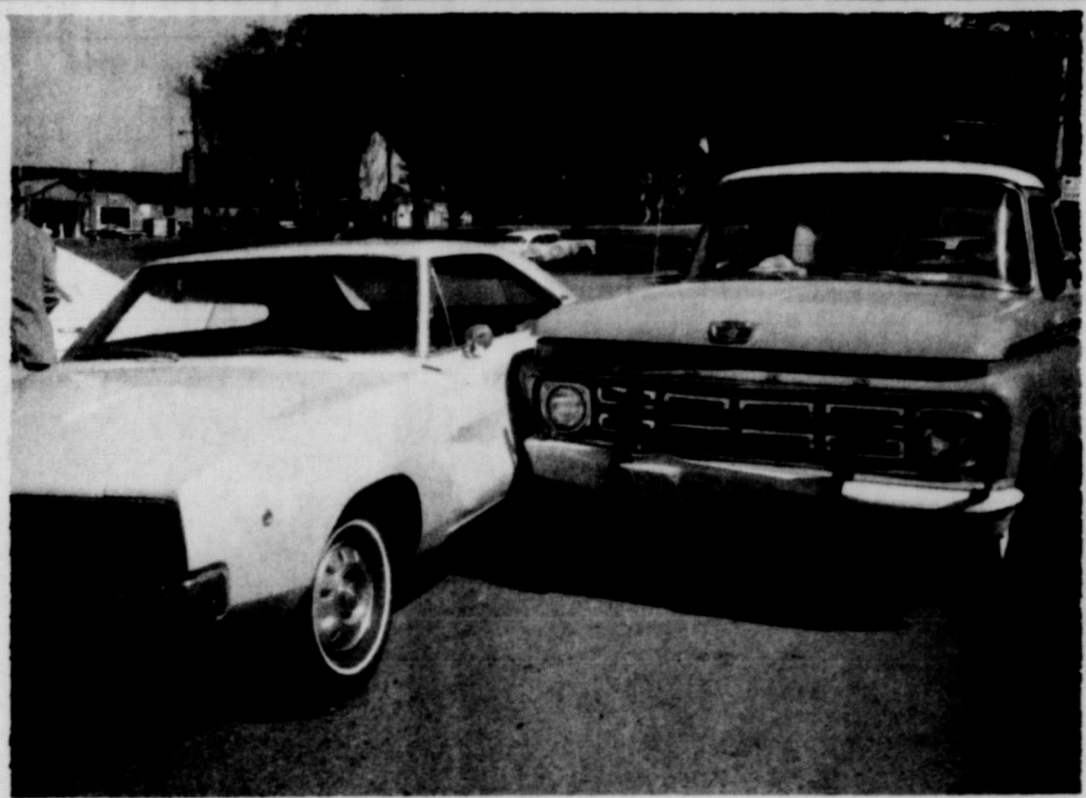

Post Office Announces Increase

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise the postage bill for residents of Wheeler, a spokesman for the Postmaster said today.

The Wheeler office has been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington, D.C. that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added public tax burden.

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third-class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by taxpayers, the spokesman said.

For bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 percent to 20 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million. The postmaster listed these other details on the proposed increases:

4 To Graduate

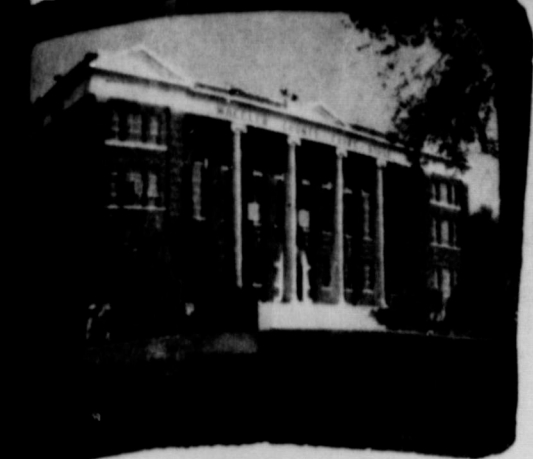

TEXAS POLITICS

Rep. Malouf Abraham... real hard and trying to get Speaker Muttscher out of the firing line and a lot of matters that can fall either way. You know the old saying that only a darn fool can predict the weather in Parkview, but trying to predict politics in Texas is even a bigger fool. Things could hit the fan in just a few weeks. The first item of big news is Governor Smith signing the Tort Bill. This bill that would make some bodies such as lawyers, doctors, etc. liable for injuries or damage to other people. The way it is now, they are not liable for certain things. It will pretty well make liable across the board. It would take a 2/3 majority both Houses to over-ride the veto. Although the bill is vetoed by a bigger majority than that, I don't think they will over-ride his veto. His argument was that the bill is too far, and I am in agreement with him. The big power play at moment is whether we try and pass a one year appropriation bill or not. Lt. Governor Barnes is pushing this

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More important than that, neither does Gov. Smith. In the first place he claims it's illegal not to adopt a two year budget. If we try it, he says he will veto it, and call a Special Session.

So, the question is if Barnes will butt heads with Smith or not. However this turns out, it will have a great bearing on the rest of the session. The things that go on behind the scenes are the controlling factors in the important issues. I am placing my bets on Smith.

With just a few weeks left, we still have most of the "gut issues" to solve. How much we spend, where we get it, the minimum wage bill, and the teachers pay raise are the main ones to try and work out. The Senate is pretty well dominated by the Liberals and that puts the heat on the House. The only way I can know what your thinking is, is to hear your views. This thing is pretty tough down here but it is sure an education.

HEALTHY BABY WEEK

Healthy Baby Week, May 11-17 is sponsored by the National Foundation - March of Dimes to emphasize the importance of prenatal care for pregnant women.
Remember the old saying.
"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Well this holds true in the prevention of birth defects. Birth defects strike every other minute of every day. That means children born blind, deaf, crippled, mentally retarded, many who often don't live to celebrate their first birthday.
But now there are two major breakthroughs that will help prevent birth defects from happening: two new life-saving vaccines. The Rh vaccine is the first and it can save thousands of lives that would otherwise be lost. This vaccine prevents Rh disease which is caused by a kind of blood incompatibility between a mother and the child she is carrying. If a mother gets an injection following each birth of Rh positive baby, this protects the next child she carries. The second vaccine is against German Measles. A mother who gets German measles during the first four weeks or so, stands a 50% chance of having a defective baby. Still epidemics of rubella can occur. Youngsters are most susceptible to the disease and can bring it home to their mothers. It is so important that young children and "could be mothers" be vaccinated for rubella - German Measles.
So please, do what you can to stop the tragedy of children born defective - insure all "mother's to be" receive good prenatal care.

Across The Fence

GRE ENBUGS: Greenbugs are letting up on wheat. However, greenbugs are now attacking grain sorghum in Denton, Grayson, Cook and Collin Counties in Central Texas. Prospects are good that they will be a problem on maize in our area when it is up and growing. We should watch our young maize closely after it's up. Plants from emergence up to about 6 inches in height, showing visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on the under leaf surface should be treated.
NEW WHEAT FOR TEXAS: Caprock, a hard red winter wheat and a sister selection to Sturdy, has been announced by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Crops Research Division, Agricultural Research Service, USDA. The new variety was developed cooperatively by the Station and Service. Seed from approximately 60 acres of foundation seed stock will be harvested this year and this seed will be released to certified seed producers for fall seeding in 1969. Yields have been equal to or better than Sturdy Wheat. It is a sister selection to 'Sturdy' by breeding but differs from it sufficiently to have merit in Texas as a companion variety, especially under irrigation in Northwest Texas. Hardiness, hail, tolerance and lodging are the same as Sturdy Wheat.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be imposed by the Legislature, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b). The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

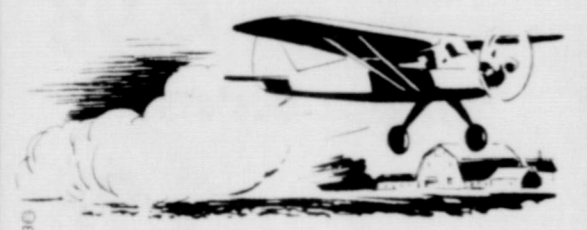
