## BURGLARS HIT HYLANDS, GARLANDS, AREA

### Loss Totals \$10,000 Retail

Wheeler and the Briscoe and Gageby Communities have been hit recently with a series of burglaries. Merchandise with a retail value of \$10,000 was stolen in the early hours Thursday morning from Hyland's Pharmacy and Garland's Men and Boys Wear. No estimate was given for the other burglaries.

Mrs. James Phillips unlocked Hyland's Pharmacy Thursday morning to find the business in shambles. The intruders made an attempt to enter through the back door. When they could not gain entry through the back door, they climbed onto the roof and with brace and bit and saw, cut their way through the roof. Taken in the burglary were 112 watches, three Elgin Radios, and \$30 worth of Demoral. The file of charge tickets was scattered over the store. Retail value of the loss was estimated at \$5,000.

Entry into Garland's Men and Boys Wear was made through the front door. The burglars took a complete rack of Curlee Suits, a rack of slacks, 4 doz. Manhattan Shirts, numerous jumpsuits, socks, bath robes and windbreakers. The loss at Garland's was estimated at \$5,000 retail. At this time he is still discovering items missing.

Twenty dresses were taken from Peggy Jo's Fashions. The dress shop is located in the back part of Garland's.

This is the third time Hyland's Pharmacy has been burglarized in four years.

Sheriff Bus Dorman reports they have a few good leads. A description of the

car was given by three persons who took notice of a strange car being in town.

An electric welder was taken May 14 from M&M Gin.

The E. Ray Miller house west of Briscoe was also entered. Clothes, two tool boxes, irrigation sprinkler heads and copper wire were taken, Thursday or Friday.

Two antique bedsteads were taken from a house owned by Bill Carson. The house

is used at intervals by hired hands. The house is located in the Gageby area.

The Gageby Church was burglarized Friday night.

Taken from the church were three electric heaters, two fans and number cards. The highline wire leading to the church was cut, and the wire was partially rolled, indicating the thieves had been scared away. The doors to the church were left open.

### PROPERTY OWNERS MEET WITH CITY COUNCIL; NIGHT WATCHMAN NEEDED

The Wheeler City Council met Monday, May 19 at the City Office. The purpose of the meeting was to give property owners who will be affected by the paving a chance to offer testimony.

A number of property owners met with the council. Following the open meeting, the council passed an ordinance closing the hearing and voted to continue with the paving as mapped prior to the election.

Present at the public hearing to answer questions concerning the type of paving and payment of assessment were Homer Davis and John David of Davis and David of Dalhart, and Bill McMorrise and Bud Bowie, engineers.

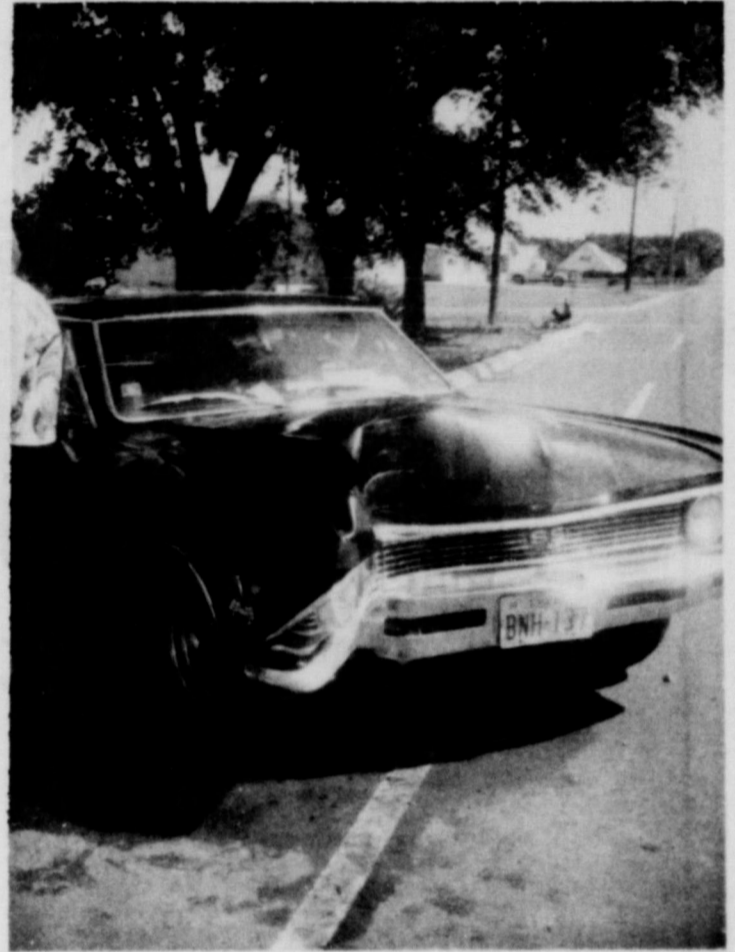

The council approved the payment of the bills and the meeting was adjourned.

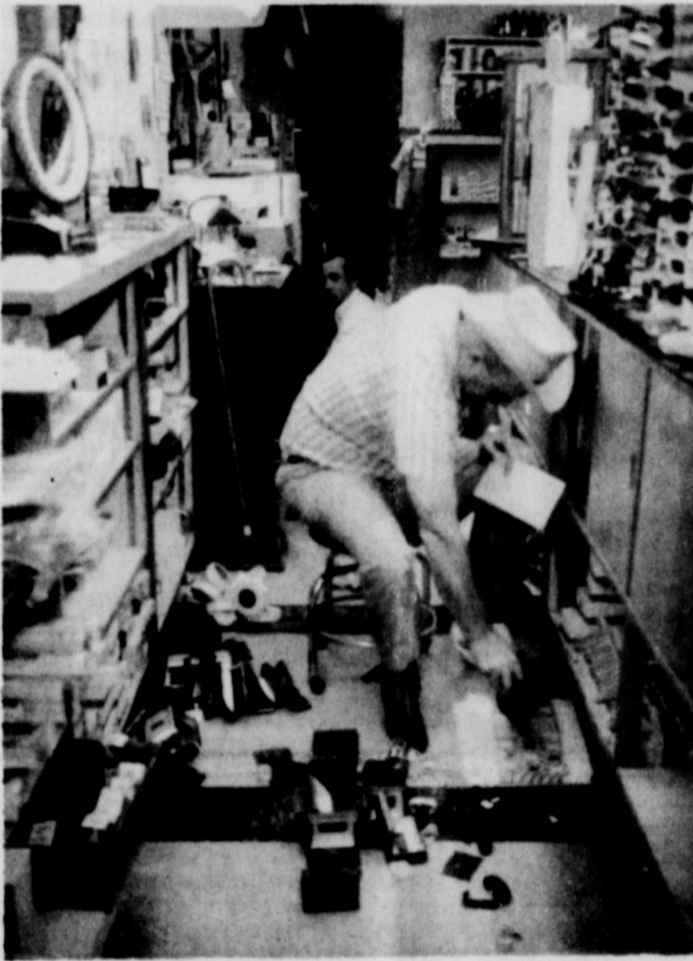

## TEXAS POLITICS

This was one of our busiest weeks. With just a couple of weeks left, everyone is getting nasty about their bills which have not passed yet. Lots of hollering about why someone else has gotten such and such a bill through while theirs is still hung up.

Probably the biggest fight on our side was the Minimum Wage bill. We battled this deal about seven hours Thursday and wound up a little before 11 p.m. on the losing side - but not a total loss. We were able to hold the wage to \$1.25 per hour and to eliminate businesses that take in less than \$150,000 per year.

There were also quite a number of other exceptions. The farmers exemptions will pretty well take care of those employing not over four employees. Of course, this still has to be worked out with Senate and the final bill remains to be seen.

The big fight in the Senate was on the Texas Tech Medical School. It was filibustered all day and all night and finally about the middle of Friday morning they gave up and let it pass.

I feel that our entire area will benefit greatly from this new school. Our hospital facilities throughout the Panhandle should improve and the Amarillo Medical Center will receive a boost. So, not only will we be able to help in the Doctor shortage, but we will be able to "grow" them closer to our area.

This last part of the Session holds crucial days. They are continuing to work on the one-year budget and I still think Governor Smith will veto it. This will cause a Special Session to work out a Budgetary Appropriation

and Tax bill. There is no way to plan ahead as to what will or won't happen.

I know that all of you are concerned about additional taxes and spending. There are so many needs and so much going on that it's almost impossible to see much hope so far as John Q. Citizen is involved.

We are besieged with all kinds of requests for money on the one hand and complaints about taxes on the other. We'll know what the final answers are before long. In the meantime, if you have something you want to tell me about let me know. Time is marching on.

Have enjoyed getting to see quite a few of you folks lately. Not only am I glad to see you, but it's always good to hear your ideas and try and explain some of the problems we have to face up to.

I hope that you have found these reports of some interest to you. It's hard to sit down at the end of the week and remember things that you would like to know about. About the best news I've had has been all of these good rains you folks are getting.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR1)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."  
Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding twelve dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.  
Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:  
"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.  
(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.  
(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.  
(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.  
(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."  
Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

We need some dry days now. Farmers want to get their maize and cotton in the ground.  
Earlier this week we attended a two-day meeting at the Busland Experiment station on grain sorghum. Several interesting items were covered on greenbug control, diseases and new techniques involved in feeding popped maize and high moisture grain to beef cattle.

**Screwworm Eradication Program:** We need your help! With very favorable weather conditions and a lack of proper livestock management on the part of some producers, we can expect a continuation and even an increase in the number of screwworm cases. We would like to encourage you to treat all man-made wounds with insecticides, checking your cattle closely, collecting worm samples and mailing to the Mission Laboratory for identification. Tom Puryear, Chairman of the County Screwworm Eradication Program, is asking all livestock producers in Wheeler County to cooperate in waging a more effective action campaign against screwworms. Tom wishes to emphasize that prevention of cases is more important than ever, since it costs about \$800 to produce enough sterile flies to treat a single screwworm case. Cases have spread to a wider portion of the state this spring than last and cases and fly migrations are increasing in Mexico. Collection vials can be obtained from my office or at the Production Credit Ass'n in Wheeler or the Federal Land Bank in Shamrock.

**Nematodes:** We would like to hear from several gardeners in Wheeler County who have a nematode problem. We have several hundred experimental lines of nematode resistant tomato plants that we wish to have tested. There would be no obligation in planting the tomatoes other than reporting to us the improved performance and yielding qualities of the experimental lines.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:  
"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:  
(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;  
(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;  
(3) Needy blind persons;  
(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.  
The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.  
The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.  
"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.  
"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.  
"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."  
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

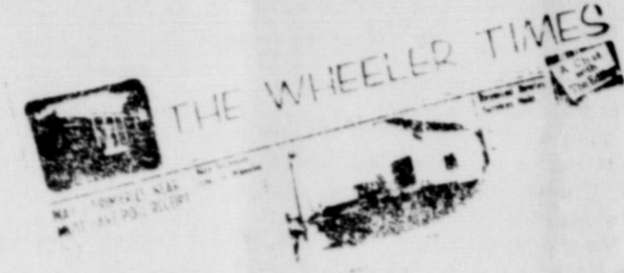

1/2 pound cooked shrimp, fresh or frozen  
12 slices bacon  
1 can (13 1/2 oz.) pineapple chunks, drained  
1 can (4 oz.) button mushrooms, drained  
1/4 cup soy sauce  
1/4 cup salad oil  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1/4 cup chopped parsley  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
dash pepper  
Thaw frozen cooked shrimp. Fry bacon slowly until cooked but not crisp. Cut each slice in half. Using long skewers, alternate shrimp, pineapple, mushrooms and bacon until skewers are filled. Combine soy sauce, salad oil, lemon juice, parsley, salt and pepper. Brush Kabobs generously with sauce and place on pre-heated barbecue grill about 4 inches from moderately hot coals. Broil 3 minutes, turn and brush with sauce. Broil 3 minutes longer or until lightly browned. Serves six.

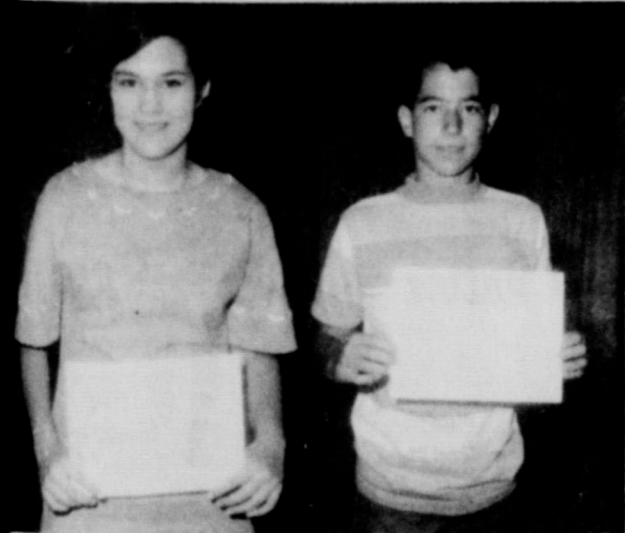

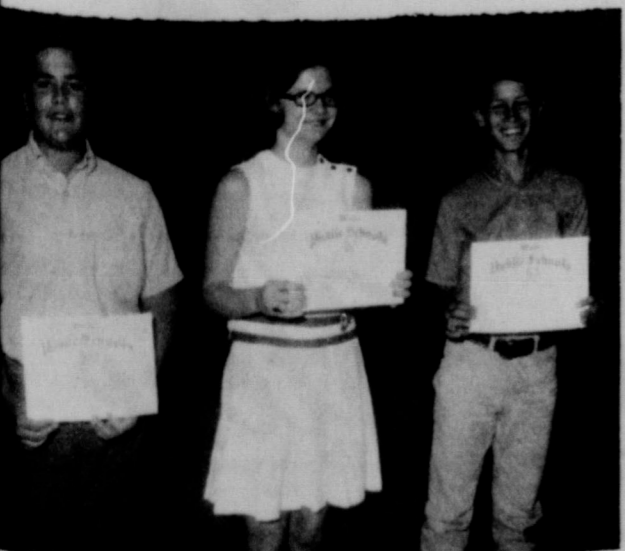
