### **TEXAS POLITICS**

By Rep. Malouf Abraham The Regular Session of the 61st Legislature has ended and we are real happy to be back home. We are going to Canada to a convention for a few days, but hope to get a chance to visit with you soon It takes a while to get readjusted and start tinding out something about your business after a five months absence.

We will soon know what Governor Smith's decision will be on the One Year Budget, I still think that we will find ourselves back in Austin before the summer is over. We had over 1,450 bills in the House and about 850 in the Senate to consider. Most of these bills died for various reasons and we passed less than half of the remainder. A few we passed

should have been killed. However, I think we passed a great deal of much needed legislation. The new Medical School at Texas Tech will be a tremendous thing for all of West Texas. We created another Medical School in Houston andhave contracted with Baylor Medical School for doubling their enrollment over the next ten years. We created new Dental Schools and additional Nursing facilities. Several new Junior and SeniorColleges were approved to help take care of the big increase expected over the next sev-

The Vocational Training School at Amarillo Air Force Base will be another big thing for our area. This is badly needed to take care of the big demand for trained vas taken in the robbery. people in our various industries. Texashas been way behind on Vocational and Technical training in all areas. Bi-lingual instruction the start of a kindergarten program, the teacher pay raise bill andmany other improvements in all phases of education should go a long way towards raising our standard of living in Texas. You will recall that we are one of the lowest states in per capita income. All of this takes a lot of money and I hope that we have made

a wise investment. During the summer, I would like to have an opportunity to discuss our overall problems of State Government with you. We are faced with many challenges and most of them are difficult and expensive to solve. There are no easy ways out, and it will get worse before it gets better. In spite of some of the things I don't like, I am convinced that we here in Texas can find the answers better and cheaper than Washington. There are two sides to every ones help to try and work

out what is best. You are all invited to be guests at the Governor's Mansion Monday June 23rd from 5 until 7 p.m. He has invited the Panhandle people to come and visit them and it will be a most enjoyable event. My wife and I will be in the House Party and we hape that a lot of you will make an effort to come donw. I would like for you to write and tell me if you can come and how many, so that I can let the Governor know. This would be most educational for your children. That's not long off, so talk it over and let me

### Announce **Final Notice**

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced today that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this require-

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Further information and forms for recording claims under the Water Rights Adjudication Act may be obtained from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396 Capital Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

### MINIGARDENS ARE IN!

By Brenda Hofmann, CHDA With all the minis in our world. I bet I have a new one - Minigarden for vegetables! This is excellent for people who live in a room, an apartment, or who live alone and need a small amount of food. Growing vege-

tables in the minigarden can be fun for youngsters as well as the not-so-young. The basic material needed for the minigarden are containers, synthetic soil and fresh and good quality seed.

The containers can be plastic or clay pots, an old pail, plastic bucket, bushel basket, wire basket or a wooden box. The size of container depends largely on what and how many you plant. Sx inch pot works well for chives, radishes and onions; whereas a ten inch pot works better for tomatoes. If a solid container is used, allow for drainage by drilling four or more 4 inch holes along the sides near the bottom. Don't drill holes in the bottom. Then place 1/2 inch of coarse gravel

Prepare the synthetic soil from a mixture of hotricultural vermiculite, pear moss and fertilizer. To do this add one bushel of horticul tural grade vermiculite, one bushel of pear moss, 14 ounces of groundlimestone, 4 ounces of 20% superphosphate, and 8 ounces of 5-10-5 fertilizer. This material should be mix-ed thoroughly. The synthetic soil has several advantages over soil because it is free ofplant disease organisms. weed seed, holds moisture,

in the bottom.

Good quality seed will be needed. Don't use last year's seed. When possible select di sease and insect
