## FHA NEWS Loans Made For Recreation Areas

The Farmers Home Administration can now make loans to farm and ranch owners or tenants for outdoor income producing recreational enterprises according to John L. Manning, County Supervisor. Loans of individuals can be made to convert all or a portion of their farms to recreational facilities. The recreational enterprise may supplement regular farm income or, in some cases, replace farm income by converting the entire farm to recreation.

Public recreational areas are increasing in number each year; however, the demand for such facilities still exceeds what is available. The purpose of this loan program is two-fold in that it will provide more recreational facilities and help farmers and ranchers to increase their income stated John L. Manning.

Loans may be made for camping, picnicking and hiking facilities, swimming, boating, skiing and fishing facilities, golf courses, riding stables or many other forms of outdoor recreation. Funds can be used to purchase necessary materials, supplies and animals, acquire and develop land and water resources, construct or improve modest essential buildings and to purchase and install needed equipment and fixtures.

Each loan will be scheduled for repayment over a period not to exceed 40 years. Interested individuals should contact John L. Manning, at Wheeler for further information.

The sheriff's department was notified of a beating taking place five miles west of the state line around 8:00 p. m. An investigation of the incident followed. Randolph's vehicle matched the description given the sheriff's department.

Randolph's wife was taken to Parkview Hospital where she was treated and released, for injuries received in the beating.

Randolph's family made bond at 3:00 a. m. and took him to an Oklahoma City psychiatric hospital.

Sheriff Bus Dorman has cuts, bruises and scratches resulting from an attack by Randolph in the jail cell.

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday evening at Nora's Cafe for their regular monthly meeting. The program was presented by Stanley Jagers, Superintendent of Wheeler Schools.

Questionaires were sent to everyone enrolled in Wheeler County Schools within the last ten years. The questions were related to the type of work and the amount of education or training the ex-student had received.

Only a portion of the complete information was available for Mr. Jagers to present at the meeting.

Wheeler County students, due to the small number in each school, can not enjoy vocational training while in high school. The survey pointed out the need for vocational training in the schools.

It is a possibility that on the job training can be offered Wheeler and Shamrock students through the school in cooperation with the business and professional men. The program, if enacted, would be a pilot program and would set the pattern for the state.

Russell Hull and Dan Luttrell of the Wheeler Riding Club met with the chamber and asked their help in soliciting the funds needed by the club to pay for the annual barbecue which kicks off the Wheeler rodeo. The rodeo is slated to be held July 17-18-19. Businessmen and Riding Club members will begin contacting the local people around the first of July.

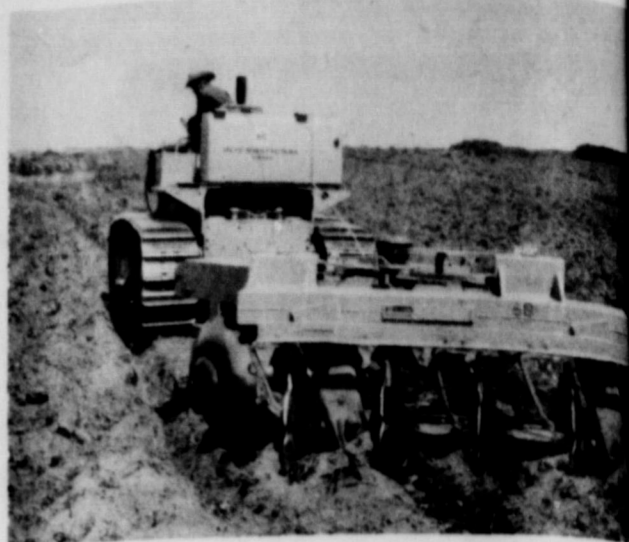

**BIG, BIG PLOW:** Shinnery plowing on about 50 acres of Thurman Calcote's land is being plowed by this two-way disk plow. Contractor Harold Elbert from Wellington, is trying out the plow. The plow has 36" cut out disk and weighs about 10,000 lbs. Average plowing depth is about 12" on this field. Mr. Elbert estimates the cost of plowing at about 10 dollars per acre. Roots and top brush are being chopped up by the plow, leaving trash on the soil surface for wind protection. The big plow is leaving the land in good shape and Thurman plans to seed forage sorghum without other plowing. The land will be farmed about two years to kill any regrowth and then seeded to grass. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service will assist farmers and ranchers on shinnery plowing by furnishing soils information, cost estimates, and other technical data.
