Blood Mobile To Be Here Wed. July 16

CROSS-BLOOD BANK

Volunteers will soon be asking you to donate your energy, money and time to make it possible for the Blood Mobile to visit our hospital and our community to participate in the program. The Blood Mobile will be needed the most by the hospital as typists to keep and record, canteen workers to serve juice and sandwiches to donors and co-workers; nurses to witness signatures; clerks to greet donors on arrival and leaving; assistants at the donor tables; blood donors; and strong men to help load or unload blood mobile vans. This is a volunteer job you can do when you are unable to give blood. Donors will be asked to give blood. These recruits will be asking for every bodied man, woman and child over 18 years of age to pledge one unit of blood. This is a gift you can give because you can make it. And YOU, the big important one, YOU? You are the ones who give blood to give so others can live. When you are asked to give, do so! Make possible for those less fortunate, in poor health, victims of accident or the elderly to enjoy the benefits of a healthy body. Who may give? Those between the ages of 18 and 61 are eligible. Donors need parental consent if they are married or on active military duty or those away from home and self-supporting. What should your medical history be? The leading question is are you in good health? You must be free of existing acute respiratory disease, have not had hepatitis or exposed to hepatitis in the past six months, received blood plasma, serum or had a tattoo in the past six months, have never had malaria, traveled outside the U.S. within six months, pregnant in past six months, had a history of heart trouble or surgery or serious injury in past six months, had tuberculosis, diabetes controlled by medication, lymphatic disease, kidney disease, prolonged fever, allergy on record, epilepsy, fainting, convulsions, tooth extraction within 72 hours, vaccinations, a bleeding disease such as hemophilia, people

taking medications of a serious nature in the past six months such as antibiotics, sulfas, digitalis, etc., exposed to infectious disease such as measles in past three weeks unless you have previously had the disease. All you healthy people who do not fall under any of the above are eligible donors. Our local hospital has used 63 units of blood over the past year. The hospital has drawn 27 units from walking donors at the hospital. The hospital has given three units of Plasma. Our local quota for the upcoming blood mobile visit based on population figures of 2584 citizens will be 94 donated units. This does not seem unreasonable from the entire north end of the county. There has to be, there must be, 94 people who are healthy enough and will give a gift of blood. We must do this to keep the blood bank available to our local people. Now, will it hurt? What good will I be doing? These questions are best answered in this way. **I DON'T LIKE NEEDLES. DOESN'T IT HURT?** There may be a stinging sensation for moment, but that's all. **TAKE LONG?** Less than ten minutes for the donation. **IS THAT ALL?** Not quite - you'll be asked some questions about your health and will have your temperature, blood pressure and hemoglobin checked for your benefit as well as the recipient's. **NOBODY I KNOW NEEDS BLOOD. WHY SHOULD I GIVE?** Demand for blood is increasing - six million units a year are needed throughout the country. Someday your own life may depend on receiving blood. Help others now and they'll help you later if you need it. **DOES THE PATIENT PAY FOR THE BLOOD I DONATE?** Nothing is charged for Red Cross blood itself, but the patient may be asked to pay the hospital's share of collection and laboratory costs. **WILL DONATING WEAKEN ME?** The body makes new blood constantly and will replace the volume you've given within a few hours. Most donors feel no difference and go

about their normal activities. In fact, many donors who give regularly say they feel better afterwards. **HOW OFTEN CAN I GIVE?** About every eight weeks, not more than five times annually. And that reminds me when are you giving blood? The local Chapter of the American Red Cross will have the Wichita Regional Blood Bank \$181 for this visit. This is the local chapters share of blood mobile salaries, of nurses, traveling with unit, vans, storage of blood and equipment. Let's make it worth our money, it's your money too.

Wheeler Has Second Win Sat.

The Wheeler American Legion baseball team won their second game of the season and their first league game last Saturday, beating Spearman, 5 to 5. Mark Robinson pitched a fine game, giving up only 5 hits and striking out 10 in the seven inning game. Wheeler scored the winning run in the last half of the seventh inning without a hit. Berger got one run in the first inning and added five more in the second and Wheeler did not score until the fourth inning and only got four hits in the game. The next games for Wheeler are at home. Farm Ownership Loans Available

Farm Ownership loans are available to local farmers through the Farmers Home Administration according to John L. Manning, County Supervisor who serves Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties from his office in Wheeler. Mr. Manning stated that Farm Ownership loans are made to applicants for various purposes. Some loans enable tenant-operators to become owner-operators and others enable present owners to enlarge, improve or refinance their farms. Loans to purchase farms, in most cases, include funds to fully develop the farm.

In recent years one of the most prominent uses of loan funds has been purchase and improve farms for young tenant farmers who are trying to establish themselves more soundly in the farming industry. With loan terms at 5% interest and up to 40 years to repay, the young farmer will more likely be able to pay the land debt, meet operating expenses and realize a profit. Loans to young farmers can be repaid at the rate of \$58.28 per \$1000.00 per year and the loan can be up to \$60,000.00. The Wheeler office of the Farmers Home Administration has closed nine Farm Ownership Loans since July 1, 1968, totaling \$286,310. Two more loans have been approved and awaiting funding. The loans approved or closed since July 1, 1968 range from \$12,000 to \$60,000.

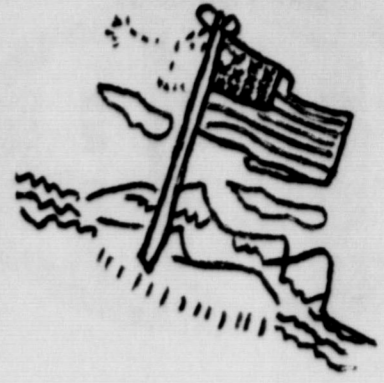

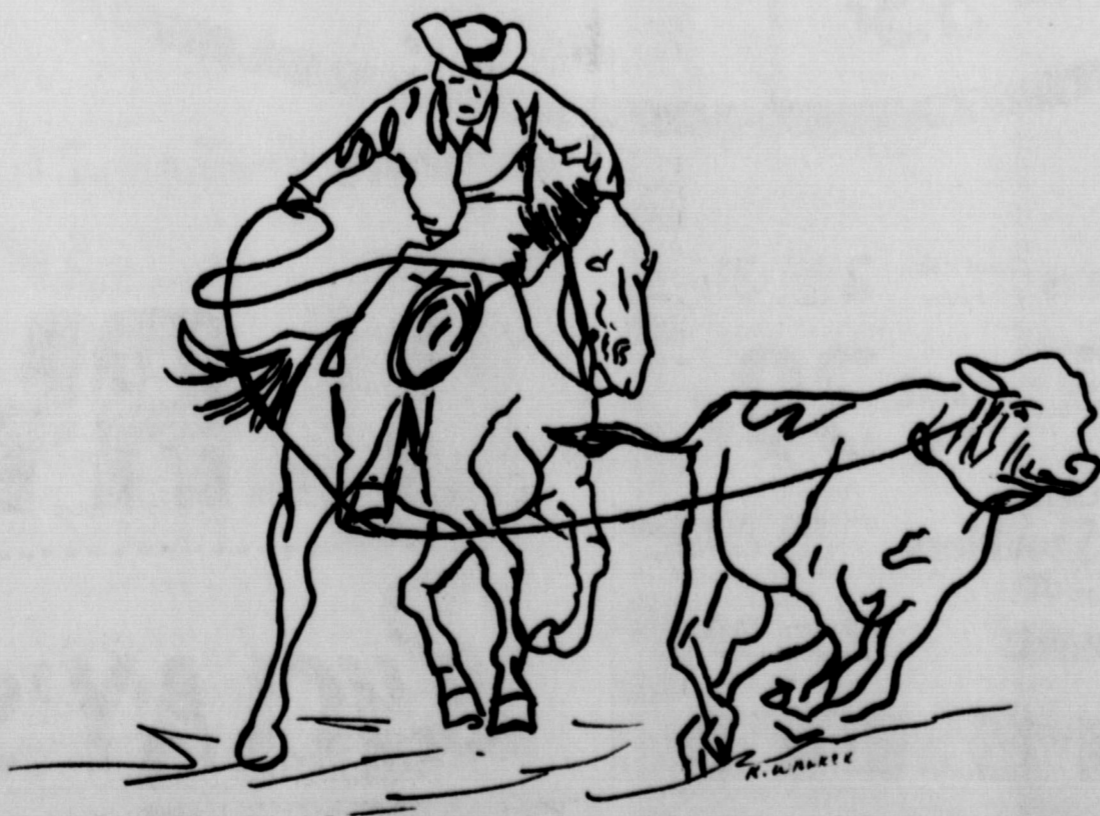

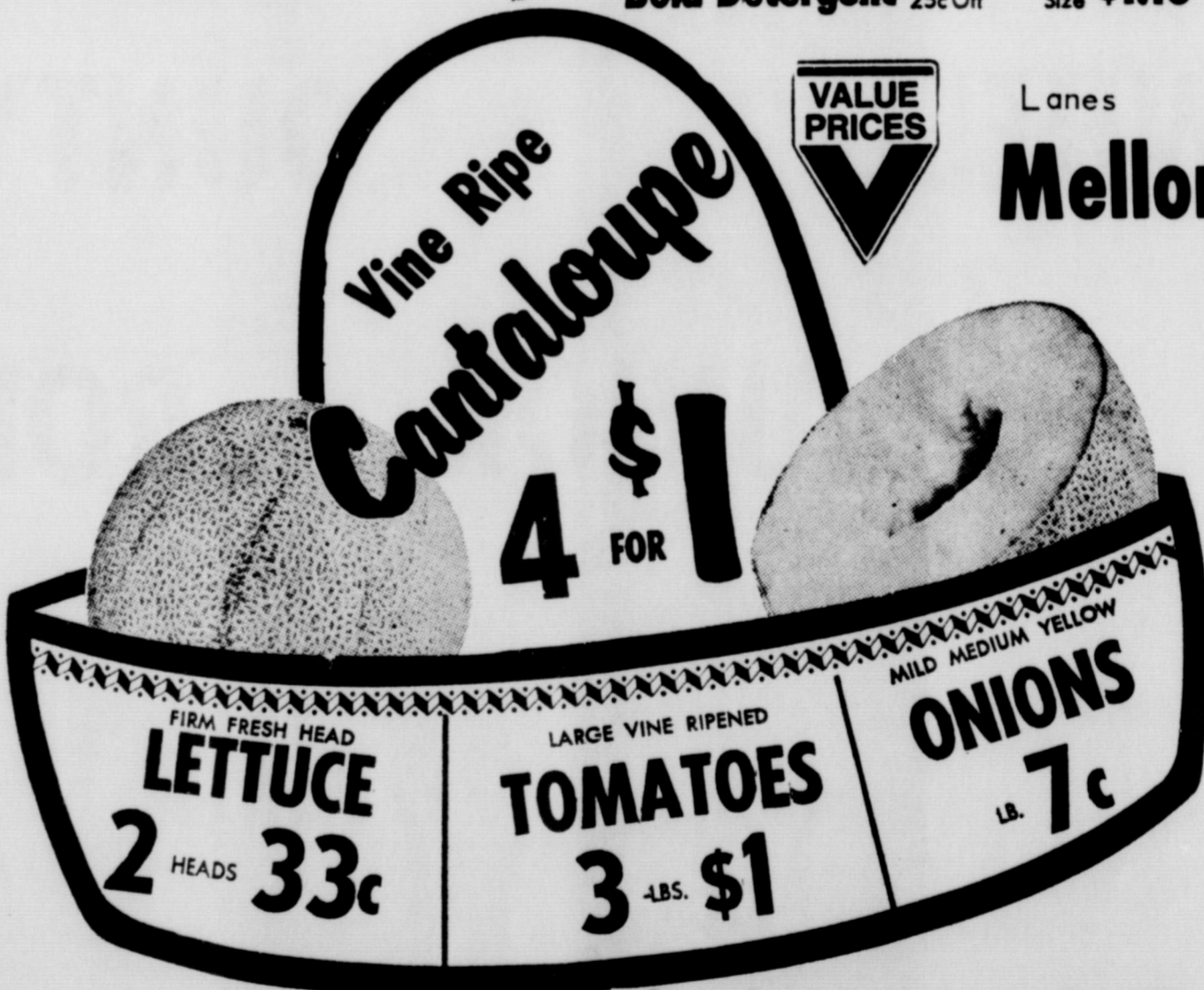
