GROUNDBREAKING FOR FEEDLOT PROJECT

The feedlot will be located on 226 acres of land and will cover 60 acres. The feedlot capacity will be 15,000 head. The feedmill at the feedlot will produce feed for 20,000 plus. January 1, 1970 has been set for completion

Upon completion, the feedlot will offer jobs for ten men with this to be increased to 15 when in full opera-

An industrial development committee was appointed by incoming Chamber of Commerce president, John C. Vise under the direction of the Texas State Industrial Commission in 1968l This committee was made up of Thomas Daughtry, Bill Owen, James verden, Lewis Lancaster and John C. Vise. The committee met and elected officers. They obtained a charter for \$10,000. Organized as Wheeler County Service, Inc. with 46 stockholders, the group set out to bring industry to Wheeler. Their success with the feedlot will not stop their efforts; it will only increase their enthusiasm.

The Wheeler airport was the spot picked to land by two glider pilots entered in glider competition at Persidio Co. Airport, near Temple, rexas. The pilots had been in he air between seven and eight hours and traveled a distance between 425 and 450 miles.

The gliders landed about the same time, the first having landed at 8:45 Friday evening. The pilot of the first glider to land was Graham Thomason of Los Angeles, was Michel Mercier of Angers, ance.

Afterlanding their gliders, the pilots registered at the local motel to wait for their ground team-following them in cars, to catch up with them. As soon as the ground team arrived, the gliders were loaded into trailers for the trip back to Persidio Co. Airport.

This particular event was Open Distance Day. There were 80 gliders in competition. Six of the gliders traveled over 500 miles! This distance gives the pilots two days for returning to "home base" and continue competition

This distance may be a ecord for a French citizen. If the distance traveled by Mercier is measured to be 450 miles, it will be a distance record for a French Citizen. Thelongest flight on record is 600 miles. The greatest distance of flight for Thomson is 444 miles.





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
