FOODS EXCLUDED: Fried avoid fatty food for four hours foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and chocolate.

I. Proper Diet: While it is not desirable

for donors to ingest heavy, fatty meals, they should not go with at food at the regular meal time prior to donation. Sevin dust or sprays are very effective. The insects are brightly colored orange bugs with blck spots on their backs. Squash bugs at the present time.

We encourage maize farmers to keep a close watch for greenbugs. When lady beetles, green lacewing flies, flies or parasitic wasps fail to keep the greenbug numbers in check, a spray containing ethyl parathian, systox, ethinin or trithnin can prevent a devastating build;

When should you spray? Plants from emergence up to about six inches in height should be treated if damage is visible and greenbug colonies are present on the lower leaf surface. Research data from last year indicates that larger plants, up to the
