BANQUET TO HONOR BEEF CATTLE CO., INC.

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will honor Beef Cattle Co., Inc., with a banquet Tuesday, July 15 in the cafeteria. The banquet is set for 7:30 p.m. with Foster Whaley, County Agricultural Agent, as speaker. Beef Cattle Co., Inc., last year began construction of a 1,000 head feedlot. The feedlot will be located 3 1/2 miles from Wheeler on high 152. The construction of the feedlot is set for January 70. Directors of Beef Cattle Co. are Darrel Cameron, president, Joe Terley, vice president, Charles Wright of Canada, secretary, Dick Waterhouse of Canadian, Bill Stock of Pampa, John Chambers of Canadian, Inc., John Chambers of Canadian, Inc., Osborn of Canadian, and Warren Fatheree of Pampa.

The feedlot, upon completion, will offer employment for 10-15 people and an approximate payroll of \$100,000. The value to Wheeler does not end with the payroll. In the construction, a number of people will live in Wheeler. Of the \$45,000 to \$500,000 spent in construction, a big portion of this will be spent in Wheeler. The farmers will benefit from the feedlot; it will offer a ready market for their hay and grain. The lot will feed in the neighborhood of 100 million pounds of feed per year—valued in the neighborhood of \$1 1/2 to \$2 million. All the local feed available will be included in this amount. The remainder will be shipped in for use by the lot. Wheeler county is one of the few areas which can produce alfalfa hay under irrigation. The feedlot will offer

a ready market for this hay. The feedlot will use 45,000 lbs. alfalfa hay daily. This amount is expected to double in 3-5 years. The production of grain sorghum and/or corn is expected to increase in the plains area. These products are used by area feedlots and will be needed by the Wheeler lot. There will be an estimated 15-20 visitors per day at the lot. These visitors will be cattle buyers, truckers, salesmen, etc. These people will have to eat, buy gas and use other services in Wheeler. This is industry—large industry. If you are one of the local skeptics, think about the figures given above. These are based on other feedlots in the area. According to the Texas Industrial Development Committee, the industry must fit the area.

They advise small towns to find out what resources are available—Wheeler County is a farming and ranching area. What about odor? This question of course, is one of the first things that comes to mind when we talk about a feed lot. Our prevailing winds are from the south and north and neither of these will carry this odor to Wheeler. This lot has been located in a direction from Wheeler so that we can expect very little odor from the lot. Possibly three or four days a year, someone may smell it. Someone made the comment that only one thing smells worse than a feed lot—that would be a dead town. We urge you to be at the banquet Tuesday evening and let these people know we appreciate their selecting Wheeler as a hometown for their feedlot.

DIET
PROPER DIET: It is important that you eat to maintain your strength, but avoid fatty food for four hours PRIOR to donation.
Suggested Breakfast: Fruit, fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar. Cream of Wheat or oatmeal with sugar and trim milk, toast with jam, jelly or honey. (no butter)
Suggested Lunch: Clear soups without fats, sandwiches (no butter or mayonnaise) roast beef, tongue, chicken, lettuce, tomato, onion or cucumber (catsup), eggs, if eaten, boiled or poached. Vegetables: prepared without fat. Bread: toast or crackers, no butter. Salad, Vegetable, fruit or dry cottage cheese (no mayonnaise or oil dressing) Use lemon juice, vinegar, salt or sugar.
Dessert: jello or fruit.
ADVISABLE TO FORCE

LIQUIDS: Any carbonated drink, coffee, tea (without cream) water.
FOODS EXCLUDED: Fried foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and chocolate.
Following are revisions of "Instructions to Blood Donors"
1. Proper Diet: While it is not desirable for donors to ingest heavy, fatty meals, they should not go with out food at the regular meal time prior to donation. Light refreshment such as fruit juices, bread crackers, dry toast, raw vegetables, jam, jelly or honey, skimmed milk, black coffee or tea is desirable during a 4 hour period prior to donation.
Please do "NOT" eat fats (such as cream, butter, fatty meats or fried food) for at least four hours before your appointment.

14th Annual Rodeo Slated For Thurs.-Fri.-Sat., 17-18-19

The 14th annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo will get underway Thursday, July 17. The three nights of riding, roping and steer wrestling will begin each night at 8:00. Kicking off the rodeo will be the annual parade at 4:00, followed by the barbecue at 6:00 at the rodeo grounds. Featured in this year's parade will be several riding clubs, wagons, wagon trains and commercial floats. The Pampa Wagon Train will make their appearance in the parade. Trophies will be awarded riding clubs, wagon trains and commercial floats. As has been the policy in the past, riding clubs entered in the parade will be judged and trophies will be presented to the top three clubs. A trophy will be given for the best commercial float.
The parade will take the same route as was taken last year. The parade will form at the vacant gin lot. The group will travel west to main street and turn south. At 10th street, the parade will turn east and go to Parkview Hospital. The paraders will disperse after the pass in front of the hospital.

The barbecue is scheduled to begin at 6:00 p.m. at the rodeo grounds. John Hodges will again be in charge of preparing and cooking the meat. Serving the barbecue will be Wheeler businessmen and Riding Club members.

A purse of \$3,850, plus all entry fees, will attract the top cowboys and cowgirls of the rodeo circuit. A special prize of \$250 will be awarded the All-Around Cowboys.
J. W. Stoker, nationally famous trick rider and roper will be among the specialty acts.
Senator Clem McSpadden of Claremore, Oklahoma will return to describe all events.

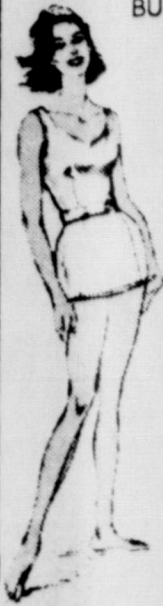

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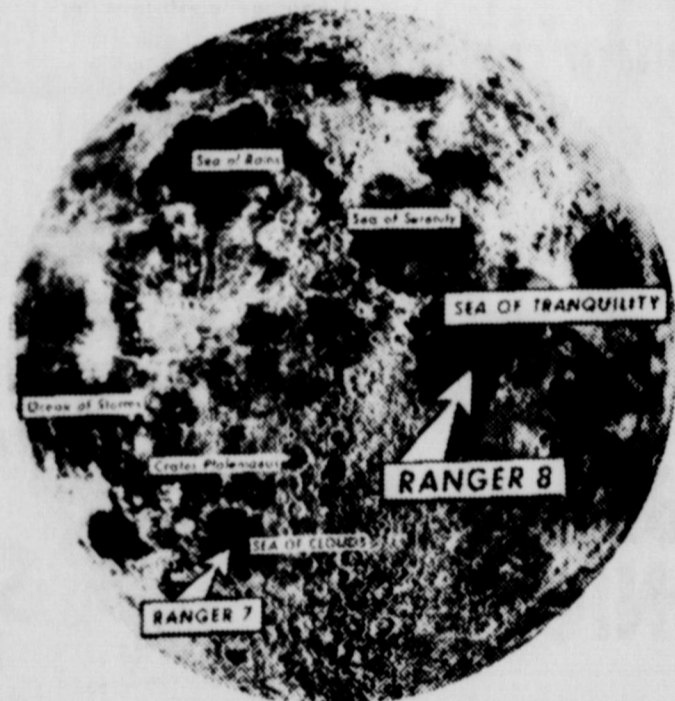

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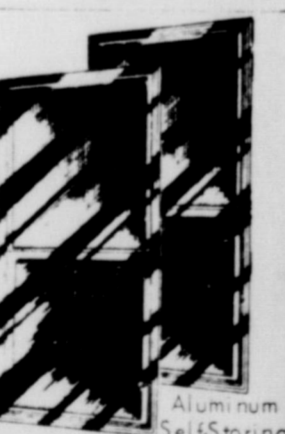

Garden Insects:
Leaf stealers known as the Harlequin bug, fire bug, the collar bug and the calico bug are at work in gardens now. Some gardens have reported complete defoliation of cabbage and broccoli plants. Sevin dust or sprays are very effective. The insects are brightly colored orange bugs with black spots on their backs. Squash bugs are also plentiful in gardens at the present time.

Greenbugs:
We encourage maize farmers to keep a close watch for greenbugs. When lady beetles, green lacewing flies, flies or parasitic wasps fail to keep the greenbug numbers in check, a spray containing ethyl parathion, systox, ethion or trithion can prevent a devastating build-up.

When should you spray? Plants from emergence up to about six inches in height should be treated if damage is visible and greenbug colonies are present on the lower leaf surface. Research data from last year indicates that larger plants, up to the
